The Recipient agrees to notify NIJ immediately upon any change in the accreditation status of its forensic science laboratory.

6. No research; nonsupplanting of State or local funds

The Recipient shall ensure that none of the funds provided under this award are used for research or statistical projects or activities as defined by 28 CFR Part 22 or for research as defined by 28 CFR Part 46. 7. (A) Quarterly performance metric reports

The Recipient agrees to submit quarterly performance metric reports that will be submitted within 45 days after the end of the calendar quarter. The reports shall be submitted on-line through the Office of Justice Programs Grants Management System. The reports should contain information regarding changes during the reporting quarter in (1) the number of days between submission of a DNA sample to a lab and the delivery of the test results to the requesting agency, and (2) the number of DNA samples analyzed per analyst.

(B) Final Report - DNA Capacity Enhancement

The Recipient shall submit a report within 90 days of the end of the award period. The report must include a summary and assessment of the program carried out with the Fiscal Year 2006 award and shall cite the reduction in the average number of days between submission of a DNA sample to the laboratory and delivery of the test results to the requesting agency and the increase in DNA analysis throughput for the laboratory as a result of the Fiscal Year 2006 award.

- 8. The recipient agrees to submit quarterly financial status reports to the Office of Justice Programs using Standard Form SF 269A on the Internet at https://grants.ojp.usdoj.gov. These reports shall be submitted on-line not later than 45 days after the end of each calendar quarter. The final report shall be submitted not later than 90 days following the end of the grant period.
- 9. The recipient shall submit semiannual progress reports. Progress reports shall be submitted within 30 days after the end of the reporting periods, which are June 30 and December 31, for the life of the award. These reports will be submitted to the Office of Justice Programs, on line-through the Internet at https://grants.ojp.usdoj.gov/.
- 10. Due to the substantial Federal involvement contemplated in completion of this project, the National Institute of Justice (NIJ) has elected to enter into a cooperative agreement rather than a grant. This decision is based on NIJ's ongoing responsibility to assist and coordinate projects that deal with DNA analysis and capacity enhancement. Responsibility for general oversight and redirection of the project, if necessary, rests with NIJ. In addition to its programmatic reporting requirements, the Recipient agrees to provide necessary information as requested by OJP and NIJ. These information requests may include, but are not limited to specific submissions related to: performance, including measurement of project outputs/outcomes; meeting performance specifications; developmental decision points; changes in project scope or personnel; budget modifications and/or coordination of related projects.



FY 2006 Forensic DNA Capacity Enhancement Program Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office

ABSTRACT

The past several grant years have provided a means to upgrade the laboratory for new equipment and supplies for the validation of new technologies including upgrading facilities, becoming more fully automated and validating new protocols. The goal of this grant is to continue to increase the efficiency of the laboratory through organization of crime scene stain evidence, increase bench space for conducting serological and DNA analysis and to primarily update the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office (PBSO) DNA Section's electronic data capture capabilities. These goals will accomplished by increasing storage facilities to include: purchasing sturdy, reliable metal shelving for the over 50 bins containing thousands of DNA stain cuttings, shelving for the Serology/DNA consumables, adding additional portable bench space for evidence screening and testing as well as book shelves for validation notebooks. In addition, software and equipment designed to provide a seamless electronic DNA document flow will be implemented.

PROGRAM NARRATIVE:

According to the 2004 UCR statistics for Palm Beach County there were 487 Sexual Assaults and 89 homicides. In the first five months of 2006, there have been 32 homicides reported which is 12 over the same time period last year. In order to better assist law enforcement using Serology/DNA technology, there are two main objectives the serology/DNA Section is trying to accomplish with this grant, improve the organization of storage for casework and initiation of a paperless analytical section. Both of these objectives have the same goal, to organize procedures in the laboratory.

Palm Beach County is the largest county in the state of Florida. The Evidence Custodians in the Technical Services Bureau accept casework evidence from over thirty-four law enforcement agencies within and including the county of Palm Beach and the Medical Examiners Office. An out-of-county case acceptance policy is also utilized upon approval. Currently the Serology/DNA Section has seven qualified DNA analysts including four full-time case working analysts, one CODIS Administrator (50% casework), one Technical Leader (50% casework), and one Supervisor (25% casework). PBSO has initiated the use of several time-consuming, efficiency-oriented protocols such as a robotic DNA extraction platform, quantification using PCR technology, amplification using a tri-Peltier Eppendorf Master Cycler system and detection of amplified DNA fragments

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using the new 50 megaWatt FMBIO III scanner. There have been through an exhaustive validation procedures conducted on DNA kits in which some have been rejected and others implemented in the laboratory protocols.

The DNA evidence storage facility used to be a very difficult place to find casework stains. They were located in four different areas of the Sheriff's office compound, they were not necessarily in alphabetic or numerical order and a considerable amount of time was spent tracking down old and new case evidence. During the summer of 2005, an intern spent nearly four months reorganizing every casework stain-cutting bag currently stored both within the DNA laboratory and in the Off-Site storage facility. While conducting this process, over 3,000 cases covering four decades were arranged numerically according to case chronology. When necessary, cases were re-packaged, re-labeled and bar coded. A "blue bin" container is used to store all of the cases and each of these bins has been barcoded. Any case may be located and accessed using the LIMS. The amount of work conducted by the intern was immeasurable as the time saved by the analyst in locating recent or old evidence has been greatly diminished. It was determined that the stain cuttings would be kept at ambient temperature in the airconditioned facility and not maintained at -20°C. As a result, there are nearly 50 blue bins stacked seven high in the Off-Site storage facility. It is not uncommon to add evidence to a previously worked case, retrieve a case for additional new technology analysis or screen evidence from an old case and make a new case stain cutting bag. It takes a ladder and two people handing the stacked blue bins to each other in order to retrieve the evidence. This is inherently unsafe, arduous

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and often difficult. As a result, it is proposed that a more accessible method of storing the blue bins be designed. This will be accomplished by ordering sturdy reliable shelving for the Off-Site facility.

The newly renovated laboratory inherited four jail holding cells that could not be demolished so they are being used for storage of Serology and DNA consumable items. Although the laboratory attempts to maintain some semblance of organization, it is difficult as confiscated old freezer shelves that were put into the jail cells do not fit appropriately in the jail cells and are subject to falling over. Therefore many boxes are stacked on the floors and on the original jail cell seats. It would be very beneficial to have a shelving system that will allow for the immediate identification and retrieval of materials stored in the jail cell.

The newly renovated laboratory also includes three areas in which a portable mobile lab bench would enhance the ability to screen casework evidence and prepare laboratory reagents. The reagent preparation room consists mainly of bench tops that are full to capacity leaving little room to temporarily store fresh reagents until they can be documented and stored. There is also benchtop space needed for data capture of semen confirmation tests using the PSA cards and Hematrace cards for blood as well as small pieces of evidence in the lab proper. In addition, the amplification preparation room likewise would benefit from the addition of a portable bench as items such as laboratory consumables are

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constantly used throughout the analytical process. These three portable bench systems would enhance the capabilities of the laboratory.

One of the goals of this grant will be to electronically capture all of the analytical data currently being collected by handwriting information on paper worksheets. In general, laboratory analysis includes completion of the following processes using paper worksheets: a) evidence screening, b) biological fluid confirmatory tests, c) DNA extraction, d) DNA quantification, e) DNA amplification, f) DNA electrophoresis, g) Review and h) report writing. In addition conducts witnessing throughout the analysis protocol. Specifically, for each analyst must ask a Secondary Observer (SO), to review the extraction sheet, verify the correct stain cutting envelopes contain the correct case number and item number as well as the test tube number with which the stain will be identified, verify the test tube have the appropriate numbers and are located in the appropriate designated areas of the laboratory, verify the tubes are positioned correctly on the robot for both extraction and quantification and verify the samples to be electrophoresed are in the correct order. Upon witnessing these steps, the SO must initial each of the items/tests tubes on the appropriate worksheet. The software and equipment to merge the technologies to electronically capture case information automatically on all of the worksheets plus document the witnessing steps have been conducted is available and may be customized for the laboratory. In addition, the reagent lot numbers should be barcoded and this data also captured for each of the cases. In order to achieve this goal, several companies engaged in this type of laboratory

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management merchandise have already been asked to present how their system works and cost estimates have been provided. The areas in the laboratory that will benefit from the efficiency of this type of technology include the time savings when completing worksheet forms, time savings for the witnessing steps, less errors when recording lot numbers for reagents, promotion of uniformity in the method in which the forms are completed, and savings on physical storage space for the case file.

In addition to the above goals and objectives, there are several validation studies that will need to be completed. Grant funds will be used to purchase the kits necessary to conduct these studies. This will include a new multiplex that will be available from the Promega Corporation called Plexor. The advantage of this multiplex is that there are two sets of quantification-based primers that allow for the quantification of total human DNA and Y-chromosome DNA. Currently it takes two different reactions and two separate sample aliquots of what at times are very precious samples. In addition there is a time savings of nearly three hours per run when both DNA quantifications are multiplexed versus the single primer set system. Validation of a faster differential system for extraction of semen is also an important goal of the laboratory. As a result, the Differex system will be evaluated as well. This system consists of a 96 well "basket-type plate" that will allow for the extraction of semen in a fraction of the time it currently takes to conduct a differential. The validation studies will also include conducting

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Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office

amplification and electrophoresis of validation samples to assure the correct profiles have been obtained.

The funds from this capacity Grant will greatly enhance the capabilities of the Serology/DNA section.

BUDGET NARRATIVE \$142,569.

1. Electronic data Capture: The most significant change in the laboratory will be the electronic organization of all laboratory analytical datasheets. This will be accomplished by hiring a private vendor for the design, evaluation, validation and implementation of custom electronic software that will integrate all of PBSO's Serological and DNA laboratory sheets which are currently in hard copy format. There will also be a biometric system tested, such as identification through a fingerprint that a Secondary Observer has completed this task. This will essentially eliminate paper in the laboratory and the storing of casework files with analytical sheets. There are a couple of laboratories that have implemented a "paperless" system into their analysis procedures and use electronic signatures. None of these systems have the flow of the analysis procedure totally paperless in which lot numbers from reagent, kits, signatures, procedures etc are all encompassed in the software and hardware. The monies from this grant will be used to provide a paperless work environment for the PBSO Serology/DNA section. This will include hardware (server for the database and application which is accessed via a web

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browser), software for the server and custom designed application development to provide automated gathering of data from one DNA analytical method to the next:

"DNA EXTRACTION (MICROCON IF NECESSARY) → QUANTIFICATION →
PREAMPLIFICATION → AMPLIFICATION → ALLELE DETECTION"

A user name/password software development will ensure that the program is secure. There will be a total of approximately 15 reporting screens planned knowing what is currently used in laboratories as well as screens to back up the documents for each of the steps shown above. This will include screens to enter what reagent type/lot #s have been quality controlled so that they are even available from which to select on the pull down

2. Shelving for the Off-Site Storage facility: The Off-site storage facility is a few hundred feet from the Technical Services building. It contains evidence from several disciplines of the Crime Laboratory including a room set aside for two large DNA freezers and Blue Bins containing bags of stain cuttings from all of the cases assigned to the DNA laboratory. There are 50 blue bins currently housed in the Off-site evidence storage facility. PBSO has made the storage of casework stain cutting evidence more efficient and convenient by the organization of the cuttings by year and case number and placing them into a barcoded container but it is now necessary to be sure the containers are more accessible. This will be accomplished by the addition of metal shelving in the Off-Site Storage facility. These shelves will be portable in case the room needs to be rearranged in the future.

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- 3. <u>Mobile Laboratory Benches.</u> There are three main areas of the laboratory that contain space that could be used for additional bench tops, 1) the reagent preparation room, 2) the pre-amplification room and 3) the laboratory proper. Portable laboratory bench units would allow more area for storage of consumables and preparation for data capture of serological results.
- 4. <u>Validation</u>: There are several protocols PBSO is interested in validating and if appropriate, implementing on casework evidence. Past grants have requested monies for Y-STR kits. The monies eventually were used to validate and implement qPCR technology and PowerPlex16 technology. The laboratory is now ready to validated Y-STR kits for those cases in which additional DNA data is needed and/or in cases in which the CODIS 13 STRs have not elicited results such as victim fingernail scrapings, low sperm or vasectomized individuals are involved. PBSO will also validate a more efficient Differential extraction technique, Differex by Promega as well as a new duplex quantification system, Plexor by Promega.
- 5. <u>Consumables:</u> The validation techniques will need consumable items for the extraction, quantification, amplification and detection of PCR products.
- 6. There are still two analyst laboratory benches in need of an Eppendorf microcentrifuge, pipetternan set and a microscope with Mideo capabilities. This is especially necessary in light of the two new analyst PBSO will be hiring as a direct result of the 2005 Casework grant.

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7. There is currently only 1 barcode printer for the entire section and it is located in the laboratory proper. An analyst must leave the administrative section to retrieve printed barcodes to place on the evidence disposition sheet. A new barcode printer is also needed for the Administrative section.

 - O (\$6,500= 3 x \$2,167) Shelving: "Long-term storage": The DNA evidence storage facility used to be a very difficult place to find casework stains. They were located in four different areas of the Sheriff's office compound, they were not necessarily in alphabetic or numerical order and a considerable amount of time was spent tracking down old and new case evidence. During the summer of 2005, an intern spent nearly four months reorganizing every casework stain-cutting bag currently stored both within the DNA laboratory and in the Off-Site storage facility. While conducting this process, over 3,000 cases covering four decades were arranged numerically according to case chronology. When necessary, cases were repackaged, re-labeled and bar coded. A "blue bin" container is used to store all of the cases and each of these bins has been barcoded. Any case may be located and accessed using the

LIMS. The amount of work conducted by the intern was immeasurable as the time saved by the analyst in locating recent or old evidence has been greatly diminished. It was determined that the stain cuttings would be kept at ambient temperature in the air-conditioned facility and not maintained at -20°C. As a result, there are nearly 50 blue bins stacked seven high in the Off-Site storage facility. It takes a ladder and two people handing the stacked blue bins to each other in order to retrieve the evidence. This is inherently unsafe, arduous and often difficult. As a result, it is proposed that a more accessible method of storing the blue bins be designed. This will be accomplished by ordering sturdy reliable shelving for the Off-Site facility.

(\$2,000 = 1 x \$1000) Shelving: "Short-term storage": The newly renovated laboratory inherited four jail holding cells that could not be demolished so they are being used for storage of Serology and DNA consumable items. Although the laboratory attempts to maintain some semblance of organization, it is difficult as confiscated old freezer shelves that were put into the jail cells do not fit appropriately in the jail cells and are subject to falling over. Therefore many boxes are stacked on the floors and on the original jail cell seats. It would be very beneficial to have a shelving system that will

- allow for the immediate identification and retrieval of materials stored in the jail cell.
- O (\$1,563.29) Shelving: "Short-term storage": The Quality Assurance manager for the DNA section is in need of storage units to keep the massive amount of documents used routinely for compliance with ASCLD-LAB and the FBI National DNA Standards as well as discovery including grant, audits, proficiencies, manuals and other important DNA documents. These documents must be maintained for a certain number of years then may be transferred to PBSO long-term storage.

EQUIPMENT (\$46,970)

- (\$30,000) Stratagene MX3005P: The latest qPCR technology will allow for the simultaneous amplification and quantification of total human DNA and Y-DNA. The ABI 7000 does not support this new technology and the need to run 2 analytical tests, such as is needed for Quantifiler and Quantifiler-Y is laborious and consumes more sample than is sometimes available. The switch to a more versatile and less expensive instrument is important in maintaining full capacity and efficiency in the laboratory.
- (\$7,400= 2 x 3,700) <u>Microscope</u>: The two new analysts will each need a microscope for confirmation of semen.

- (\$5,070 = 2 x \$2535) Microcentrifuge: The two new analyst need microcentifuges at their workbench in order to keep from having to traverse the laboratory with their samples.
- (\$4,500) <u>Bar-Code Scanner:</u> The new electronic system will allow for barcoding plates for placement on the BioMek NX DNA extraction workstation. These scanners will allow for the tracking of casework samples.

OTHER: (\$5,930) Grant funds may be used to "Provide basic infrastructure support" to assist with "material to conduct the basic processes of DNA analysis". The laboratory benches requested in this grant as well as new areas assigned to validation studies need chairs to allow the work to be conducted.

Materials: Laboratory Bench-grade chairs: (\$5,930 = 12 X \$456.15)
 Twelve different areas have been identified within the laboratory that will need laboratory-grade bench chairs. This category was used as these materials are not considered supplies, equipment or contracts.

In addition to the above goals and objectives, there are several validation studies that will need to be completed. Grant funds will be used to purchase the kits necessary to conduct these studies. This will include a new multiplex that will be available from the Promega Corporation called Plexor. The advantage of this multiplex is that there are two sets of quantification-based primers that allow for the quantification of total

human DNA and Y-chromosome DNA. Currently it takes two different reactions and two separate sample aliquots of what at times are very precious samples. In addition there is a time savings of nearly three hours per run when both DNA quantifications are multiplexed versus the single primer set system. Validation of a faster differential system for extraction of semen is also an important goal of the laboratory. As a result, the Differex system will be evaluated as well. This system consists of a 96 well "basket-type plate" that will allow for the extraction of semen in a fraction of the time it currently takes to conduct a differential. The validation studies will also include conducting amplification and electrophoresis of validation samples to assure the correct profiles have been obtained.

The funds from this capacity Grant will greatly enhance the capabilities of the Serology/DNA section.
