I. EXECUTIVE BRIEF

Motion and Title: Staff recommends motion to ratify: the Chairperson' signature on a Refunding Application for Federal assistance for the period of October 1, 2007, through September 30, 2008, in an amount of \$14,331,041 (Head Start \$12,611,541 & Early Head Start \$1,719,500) to operate the Full Day/Full Year Head Start and Early Head Start programs.

Summary: The FY 2008 Full Day/Full Year Head Start/Early Head Start programs will provide comprehensive child development services to 1,871 economically disadvantaged 3-5 year olds and 180 pregnant women, infants and toddlers in Palm Beach County. Total funding of \$23,119,640 consists of Federal funds of \$14,331,041; Children's Services Council funds of \$454,964; County required funding of \$3,582,760 and County overmatch of \$4,750,875. The emergency authorization process was utilized because there was not sufficient time to submit the application through the regular agenda process, as it was due to the Administration for Children, Youth, and Families (ACYF), U.S. Department of Health & Human Services by July 20, 2007. The County's portion has been requested in the FY 2008 budget process. (Head Start) Countywide (TKF)

Background and Justification: In accordance with the Head Start Act, The Palm Beach County Head Start/Early Head Start & Children's Services Division operates programs funded by (ACYF). The division will operate the FY 2008 program to serve 2,051 economically disadvantaged children (0-5 years) at 14 County operated child care centers and 10 contractually operated child care agencies. The funding distribution is summarized below:

This is a Continuation Application to provide center-based, full day/full year Head Start and Early Head Start services which comply with HHS/ACF Performance Standards, Palm Beach County Child Care Regulations, Board of County Commissioners (Palm Beach County Policies and Procedures and other program specific goals and objectives as outlined in the Division's Management by Objective (MBO) Service Area Plans).

1. Objectives, Need for Assistance and Geographic Area

Data for the 07/08 Continuation Application is derived from Palm Beach County Head Start/Early Head Start (HS/EHS) 2006 Community Assessment conducted by Consulting for Results. Additional sources of data includes 2006 State of the Child in Palm Beach County by Children's Services Council; For the Children: The Economic Wellbeing of Families with Children in Palm Beach County and Data Briefs: State of the Child in Palm Beach County; Birth outcomes update by Children's Services Council.

Objectives and Need for Assistance

Palm Beach County HS/EHS serves the entire Palm Beach County with directly managed, delegates and contracted child care provider centers and family child care homes strategically located in twenty-six (26) cities and neighborhoods throughout the county. ATTACHMENT I

Palm Beach County (PBC) is one of the largest counties in the country with land area occupying 2,385 square miles in the South Florida Region. Based on the most recent Census of year 2000, the county's population is ranked 31st of 3,141 counties in the county. Ranked fifteenth in the nation for numeric population change during the period 1990 to 2000, PBC is the third largest and continues to be the third fastest growing county in Florida. The population increased 31% to 1,131,184 from 1990 to 2000. The University of Florida Bureau of Economic & Business Research projects that PBC will experience the highest rate of growth in the state between the years 2000 and 2020. The projected 70% increase will surpass both Dade and Broward Counties. PBC population estimated for 2007 is 1,242,270 (PBC HS/EHS Community Assessment).

A summary of findings from the 2006 Community Assessment which follows, indicate that the need for HS/EHS services in the targeted communities remains high.

Summary of 2006 Community Assessment

An affordable housing crisis exists. Although in the county there is job growth, most existing and new jobs are low paying, unskilled, and/or part-time or temporary positions. Seventy-nine percent of respondents report an annual household income of less than \$20,000, compared to 50% last year. This may be an anomaly, but is cause for concern and will be monitored in upcoming annual assessments. With an average of 3.75 people per household, this income is at poverty level and well below the county average of \$43,540. Meanwhile, the average cost of used housing in the county is currently approaching \$400,000, compared to \$261,000 in 2004.

The number of Single Parent Households is at 56% of the total, up from 44% last year. Thirty-one percent are Mother and Father Households, down from 40% last year. The combination composes the

two predominant types of households in the county. Ninety percent of survey respondents are female. Almost two-thirds of the average county household population is made up of females compared to 52% of the households surveyed (1.6 females per 3.0 people per household). The number of respondents indicating head of household status is down, from 82% to 75% compared to last year.

Population growth projections continue to be realistic and robust, compared to last year. The County's population is becoming increasingly diverse. It can be characterized as a mix of white, black African-American, Caribbean, and Central/South American Hispanic. The combination of various cultures presents a variety of challenges concerning projection and application of trends on demographic effects, family lifestyles, economic well-being, health care issues, and delivery of quality education.

A trend to watch is the increasing desire – or demand – for higher educational attainment. Last year, 51.5% of respondents had a high school diploma, this year 60.5% do. Respondents this year indicated 38% are currently enrolled in some type of educational course, up from 27% last year. Although the client population has shown an increasing educational level over a three year period, income levels actually declined during the same period. Simultaneously, housing costs continue to spiral higher, well beyond the affordable level, making property ownership an unachievable goal. The unavoidable implication is that in spite of a continuously improving education level, the typical quality of life for the target population is continually declining.

There are no program changes resulting from a reconsideration of the decisions described in the following six (6) areas listed in 45CFR 1305.3 (c)

- 1. Help determine the grantee's philosophy, and its long range and short-range program objectives;
- 2. Determine the type of component services that are most needed and the program option or options that will be implemented;
- 3. Determine the recruitment area that will be served by the grantee, if limitations in the amount of resources make it impossible to serve the entire service area.
- 4. If there are Delegate Agencies, determine the recruitment area that will be served by the grantee and the recruitment area that will be served by the Delegate Agency.
- 5. Determine appropriate locations for centers and the areas to be served by home-based programs; and
- 6. Set criteria that define the types of children and families who will be given priority for recruitment and selection.

Program Approach and Results or Benefits Expected

Program Approach

There are no changes to the long-range goals and shorter-term program objectives presented in the 2006 Continuation Application.

There are four (4) major proposed program changes as follows:

1. Reduce the length of the Head Start day to six-and-half (6 ½) hours for the four (4) year old children.

Currently our programs operate five (5) days/week, ten (10) hours/day for a full year. Federal Head Start funding has failed to keep pace with inflation and rising operational costs. Palm Beach County Head Start was able to maintain the level of services because of the significant cash overmatch provided by its Grantee, the Board of County Commissioners. Recent state property tax legislation has resulted in significant reductions in the County budget. It has now become impossible to continue the present level of services at the present funded enrollment.

We are therefore proposing the following:

Decrease the length of the Head Start day to 6 ½ hours for the four (4) year olds and 6 ½ -up to 10 hours for the three (3) year olds as needed. The length of the EHS day will remain at ten (10) hours. This change will allow us to prevent reducing our funded enrollment, operate a full day/full year program, and clears the way for PBCHS to apply for State Voluntary Pre-K (VPK) funds to provide the additional three (3) hours/day to the four (4) year olds.

2. <u>Adjustment in Early Head Start Agreement with Hispanic Human Resources Council Inc. (HHRC)</u>

The Grantee currently maintains a Delegate Agency Agreement with Hispanic Human Resources Council (HHRC, Inc) to serve twenty-four (24) Early Head Start children and families. This agreement will be re-negotiated and converted to a contract provider (child care partner). This will ensure that the children and families enrolled in this program receive the highest quality services with additional support from the Grantee.

3. Termination of contractual agreement with Apostolic Children's Academy for Growth and Education and extension of contracts with existing Delegate/Contract Agencies to serve the thirty-two (32) slots.

Apostolic Children's Academy for Growth and Education which currently serves thirty-two (32) Head Start children is losing the lease to their present facility. A new agreement will not be sought and the thirty-two (32) slots will be distributed among Grantee and other present Delegate and Contracted Agencies as follows:

4. Termination of Lease with Easter Seals

PBCHS currently leases space for two (2) Head Start classrooms from Easter Seals Center in West Palm Beach. The lease will be terminated and the children transferred to the Grantee owned West Palm Beach Center which has been renovated to accommodate two (2) more classrooms.

The Grantee currently maintains a Delegate Agency agency agreement with Hispanic Human Resources Council (HHRC, Inc.) to serve twenty-four (24) Early Head Start children and families. This agreement will be re-negotiated and converted to a contract provider (child care partners). This will ensure that the children and families enrolled in this program receive the highest quality services with additional support from the grantee.

Results or Benefits Expected

PBC HS/EHS has made significant progress towards meeting goals and objectives established for the previous program year. This culminated in successful application for recertification as a NHSA Program of Excellence (POE) for the fourth (4) time.

Six major goals were established for the program as follows:

Strategic Goal I: To Improve Business Management and internal Synthesis and Integration

Strategic Goal II: To Enhance the Use of Technology

Strategic Goal III: To Improve Quality Assurance and Outcomes

Strategic Goal IV: To place an Increased Focus on Human Resources and Organizational Development (HRD/OD)

Strategic Goal V: To Implement Value Added Family and Community Partnering

Strategic Goal VI: To Augment Facilities

Progress for Goals I, III and IV will be discussed as they relate to a special initiative that was titled, "Staying Federally Fit." This special initiative is designed to ensure that the Delegates and Contracted Agencies meet and/or exceed all HSPS and other requirements at all times. Four (4) major strategies towards this end were successfully implemented. They are:

1. Development and full implementation of a new ongoing monitoring system called Quality Assurance and Service Reliability System (QA&SRS) - this is a planned systematic way of identifying and correcting potential non-compliance with HSPS in directly operated programs, Delegate Agencies and contracted services agencies; PBCHS/EHS programs policies and procedures; and finding and eliminating the root causes of quality problems in management and service delivery.

Both Grantee Delegates and Contracted Agencies are doing a better job with ongoing monitoring utilizing the knowledge, experience and desire of a matrix of Quality Assurance teams to identify, document and correct management and service delivery problems. There is a daily, weekly, bi-weekly, monthly, quarterly and bi-annual cycle of monitoring. ATTACHMENT II

2. Reorganization
The organization was restructured to "establish dynamic and cohesive management systems that support continuous improvement and foster commitment to providing the highest level of services to children and families in accordance with legislation, regulations and policies."

Previously the organizational chart had an Outcomes and Quality (O&QA) unit. This unit was managed by the O&QA supervisor and had a complement of five (5) other staff including the Training and Technical Assistance Coordinator, Training Specialist, and three (3) Program Monitors. One of the consultant recommendations from the 2005 Strategic Plan is as follows: "Transfer the HR functions from O&QA. This serves to enable focus on the primary function of providing excellent products to the decision makers. The change offers full ability to center on the role of providing meaningful and useful feedback for guided decision making; and, to meet all compliance requirements along with fulfilling the strategic goal and its associated action plan."

As a result, the T&TA unit was moved under the supervision of the Assistant Director. PBCHS/EHS was found out of compliance with ongoing monitoring in the May/June 2005 Federal Review. The consultant who was hired to help us remediate the findings recommended shifting the function of monitoring from O&QA to the experts, i.e. the service area supervisors.

This was done and the capacity of their units strengthened to be able to conduct more frequent monitoring and technical assistance activities. The following adjustments were made to the organizational structure.

Health - Health Specialist was upgraded to Health Coordinator and given additional responsibilities. This brings the number of Health Coordinators to three (3). **Inclusion -** Disabilities Specialist was upgraded to Disabilities Coordinator and this increased the number to two (2). The Mental Health contract was also extended.

Early Childhood Education - A fourth curriculum specialist was added to this unit.

Early Head Start - A curriculum specialist was added to the unit.

The Program monitors and O&QA supervisor positions were deleted from the staff complement. Family & Community Partnership - This unit was split to create a Family and Parent Services Unit and an ERESA and Community Partnership Unit. Additional Outreach Workers and Family Service staff were added as needed to more effectively serve, monitor and provide technical assistance and training to all grantee and partner agencies.

These changes have resulted in monitoring being conducted according to the QA&SRS ongoing monitoring chart. Better corrective action plans (CAPs) are being written and implemented by conducting root cause analysis and proper follow-up. ATTACHMENT III

3. Evaluation of Organizational Capacity of Delegates and Contracted Services Agencies - The organizational capacity of all Delegates and Contracted Services Agencies was evaluated. This evaluation included programmatic as well as an audit of their Fiscal Management Systems.

Four (4) Head Start and two (2) EHS Delegates failed to meet the minimum threshold and their contracts were renegotiated to Contracted Services Agreements. Contracts were terminated two (2) others and Contracted Services were negotiated with two (2) new agencies. In addition, the Delegate Agency agreements were reviewed and modified to ensure that the language is adequate to hold delegates accountable for compliance with Head Start financial management rules and regulations.

These changes have resulted in all partner agencies providing higher quality services that match their capacity and experience. The grantee also has more control over the quality of their services and is more effectively using the agency's human resources to monitor and provide technical assistance and other support.

4. Training on Program Design and Management and Fiscal Management Systems and strengthening the partnership between the Grantee, Delegates and Contracted Agencies - Beginning January 2005, PBCHS/EHS began intensive retraining of Delegates and Contracted Agencies. Particular emphasis was placed on improving the leadership in these organizations. To that end, a 3-1/2 day retreat was conducted October 31-November 2, 2006 for the Grantee's management staff and the top leadership (Board, Directors, Policy Committee) of the Delegates and Contracted Services Agencies. A two (2) day follow-up Retreat was conducted in January 2007.

The purpose of the Staying Federally Fit Retreat is to:

Further enhance the partnership between the Grantee, Delegates and Contracted Child Care partners through better communication, effective interpersonal relationships, shared value, increased trust and creative synergy.

Further enhance partner agency's capacity to operate well-functioning programs and deliver high-quality services to children and families in accordance with Head Start and Early Head Start legislation, regulations and policies (HSPS 1304.50-1304.53, Subpart D; Fiscal Management i.e. part 1301, Part 74 & OMB Circular OMB A-122).

The progress of the partnership is being evaluated with a partnership survey which is done every six months. The survey has shown that we are making progress in the areas measured by the survey i.e., Communication, Collaboration, Teamwork, Decision Making, Conflict Resolution, Sensitivity to Time, Flexibility, Trust, Confidence and Leadership. ATTACHMENT IV

<u>Progress towards Goal II: To enhance the use of technology,</u> included implementation of the new ChildPlus engine and E-DECA. PBCHS/EHS also purchased the Talk System by Talk Technology which allows for communication in multiple languages simultaneously.

Progress towards Goal V: To implement Value Added Family and Community Partnership.

PBCHS/EHS has seen tremendous increases in Male Involvement during this period. This was made possible by strategies such as monthly events, field trips, annual conference and tee-ball league. We continue to forge new partnerships and strengthen existing ones throughout the community. This was aided by such special initiatives as parent Internship and Work Experience, Youth Crime Prevention Summit and Partnership with Beacon Schools etc.

Progress towards Goal VI: To augment facilities, include:

- Major renovation of one center (Westgate)
- Enhanced ongoing monitoring of facilities and play grounds
- Installation of closed circuit television (CCTV) in several more of centers.
- Planning for expansion of one center (WPB), construction of a new replacement facility for Delray HS and EHS and administrative head quarters continues.

PBC HS is confident that we are making strides towards realizing the intended results:

- Head Start and Early Head Start children will be prepared for school and have better
 academic, social, emotional and health outcomes. Special initiatives such as Excelled
 Learners, Language Enrichment, Family Literacy and Kids Smart Computers are helping
 to realize this result. (Goals I-VI).
- Families will be helped towards economic independence and otherwise strengthened in their ability to care for and advocate for their children. (Goal V)
- HS and EHS communities will be strengthened as HS/EHS families and program collaborate with schools and other community agencies to tackle issues of drugs, violence, substandard housing and other destructive forces in the communities in which our families live. (Goal V)
- Through the partnerships with community child care agencies, it is expected that more children will be the beneficiary of the comprehensive services provided by Head Start and Early Head Start program. (Goals I, III, IV)
- The Grantee, Delegates and Contract for Services HS/EHS programs will be engaged in effective ongoing monitoring and continuous improvement and remain in full compliance with Performance Standards and other regulations at all times. (Goals I, III, IV)
- Fathers and significant males in the lives of The Head Start/EHS children will become more involved in the children's lives. (Goal V)
- The gap in minority academic, health and other outcomes will be narrowed and removed. (Goals I-VI)

• Palm Beach County HS/EHS staff will develop their skills and qualifications, work in environments more conducive to learning, thus ensuring better outcomes for the children and families. Other Special initiatives towards this include enhance new employee orientation, career counseling and advisement. (Goal VI)

In Fiscal year 07/08, Palm Beach County HS/EHS intends to "invest in present and future generations". We intend to continue striving to fulfill our mission "to provide world class comprehensive services that will empower the children, families and the communities" we serve.

There were no add-on's or deletions to the agenda.

MOTION TO APPROVE AGENDA - JUNE 27, 2007

A motion to approve the agenda of June 27, 2007 as is was made by Retha Lowe and seconded by Nancy Ramos. The motion carried.

READING AND/OR APPROVAL OF MINUTES - MAY 23, 2007

The minutes were motioned for approval by Retha Lowe and seconded by Nancy Ramos. The motion carried.

REPORTS

Director's Report - May, 2007 - Approval

Dr. Nicholas announced that this is the last meeting for this school year. You received a package in the mail which included her report. Dr. Nicholas stated that the only thing she would like to thoroughly explain is the 2007-2008 School Calendar that Michele Troy put together.

Dr. Nicholas explained what is going to take place during the Summer break 1 and Summer break 2. One half of the Head Start/EHS centers will be open for five days for Summer break one(1) with reduced attendance from July 28 through August 1, 2008 and the other half will be closed. The other half of the centers for summer break two(2) will be open for five days with reduced attendance from August 4 through August 8, 2008 and the other half will be closed. All children needing care during both periods will receive services either in their own center or another center. The teachers will also have time to prepare their classrooms during that time. The school year will start August 19, 2007. There were some discussions regarding the school year calendar.

Mr. Higgins requested a motion to approve the May, 2007 Director's report.

A motion was made to approve the May, 2007 Director's report by Juliet Murdock and seconded by Sharon Watson Grant. Motion carried.

Fiscal Report - May, 2007 - Approval

Dr. Nicholas discussed the Head Start and Early Head Start Budgets separately. She described how much has been spent for Salaries and Benefits as well as Operating Costs. Dr. Dr. Nicholas stated that we are on target with our spending. Overall spending is 54% for the Early Head Start Budget. Dr. Nicholas talked about the nurse that they are trying to get for Early Head Start. Dr. Nicholas has been unsuccessful in hiring a nurse. Because of the budget situation, Dr. Nicholas found another way to get a nurse by getting a sub-contract. Some questions were raised: Is it a Registered nurse or LPN nurse? What a nurse does? Dr. Nicholas gave a brief overview of the duties. Dr. Nicholas asked if there were any questions.

Mr. Higgins requested a motion to approve the May, 2007 Fiscal Report for Head Start and Early Head Start.

A motion was made to approve the Fiscal Report for HS/EHS for May, 2007 by Juliet Murdock and seconded by Retha Lowe. Motion carried.

Personnel Committee Reports - June, 2007 - Approval

The Staff Issues/New hire list was distributed. Mr. Higgins stated that a justification must be submitted before filling any position because of the budget situation. Mr. Higgins also stated that position 6690 Child Development Associate I is not a vacancy and is not a promotion.

Dr. Nicholas explained the reason why a Justification Form has to be submitted with each Requisition. Dr. Nicholas also explained the reason why some positions are on hold or were deleted from the complement. One member asked about why EHS South Bay doesn't have a CDA II position? Dr. Nicholas explained that HS South Bay and EHS South Bay are in the same building therefore, one CDA 11 is over the all center. There are others alternatives that Dr. Nicholas is working on to upgrade CDA II who are in the larger centers.

Mr. Higgins requested a motion to approve the June, 2007 Personnel Committee Reports with the changes.

Ms. Murdock made a motion to approve the Personnel Committee Reports for June, 2007 and seconded by Ms. Lowe. The motion carried.

FY 2006/2007 COLA Application - Approval

Dr. Nicholas stated that we received the COLA Application on June 19, 2007. COLA stands for "Cost of Living Adjustment." Dr. Nicholas stated that we received this year a 1.5% Cost of Living Adjustment and the county will match 20% to it. We are required by law to give the Delegate Agencies the same percentage under the award that we received. We have four(4) Delegate Agencies (Florence Fuller, Hispanic Human Resources, Delray Full Service and YWCA). We are also giving this to the contract providers.

Mr. Higgins requested a motion to approve the FY 2006/2007 COLA Application.

A motion was made by Mr. Stewart to approve the 2006/2007 COLA Application and seconded by Ms. Murdock. Motion carried.

2007-2008 Refunding Application - Approval

Dr. Nicholas stated that the Refunding Application is due to the Regional Office no later than June 30, 2007. We requested an extension of the deadline to submit the Refunding Application, as well as a reduction of the length of day for the four(4) year olds, or decrease in funded enrollment.

Dr. Nicholas stated that she was required to present four(4) different versions of budget reductions in anticipation of property tax reductions. Dr. Nicholas gave a detailed review of the 2007/2008 Refunding Application.

Mr. Higgins requested a motion to approve the 2007/2008 Refunding Application.

A motion to approve the 2007/2008 Refunding Application was made by Ms. Lowe and seconded by Ms. Ramos. Motion carried.

Delegate Agency/Contract Provider Changes - Approval

Dr. Nicholas stated that the contractual agreement with Apostolic Academy for Growth and Education (1125 Grant Street) to serve thirty-two(32) Head Start children will be terminated June 30th, 2007, due to the fact that they are losing the lease on the building. The thirty-two slots will be distributed as follows:

- Three (3) at Riviera Beach/Delray Head Start
- Five (5) Union Baptist
- Six (6) at YWCA
- Eight (8) My First Steps
- Ten (10) Florence Fuller

Some questions were raised regarding location and teachers. Dr. Nicholas explained that some of the children were transitioned to Public School and the teachers are not Head Start teachers. This decision saves the Grantee \$19,000.00.

A motion to approve the Delegate Agency/Contract Provider Changes was made by Ms. Stephanie Taylor and seconded by Ms. Yolanda Warren. Motion carried.

New Curriculum - Approval

Dr. Nicholas stated that a Curriculum change was needed to be more consistent with VPK certified curricula. The Education Committee conducted a review and has recommended "The Creative Curriculum for Preschool" by Teaching Strategies Inc. which addresses all areas of development. Curriculum Training for thirty (30) Administrators will be provided by Teaching Strategies Inc. July 16, 17, and 18, 2007. Kaplan will provide additional training at half price at Pre-Service. Everyone is invited to participate at the training. Policy Council members and Volunteers are welcome.

During the Pre-Service Conference, there will be special track sessions for Family Service Specialists, Supervisors and staff to learn how to communicate and work with parents.

Mr. Quatrini talked about the Pre-Service Conference at the Northwood University from July 25-27, 2007. The theme is "Strengthening Families by Building Positive Relationships." Dr. Nicholas mentioned that there will be special sessions on Wednesday Thursday and Friday morning for the parents.

Ms. Murdock made a motion to approve the New Curriculum as presented. Seconded by Ms. Taylor. Motion carried.

OTHER/COMMENTS/SUGGESTIONS

A member requested to have the meeting at night at South Bay. Dr. Nicholas said that at the beginning of each year, Policy Council members have the opportunity to determine "by survey" the location and time they would like to have those meetings. In September, we will have this opportunity.

Dr. Nicholas stated that Policy Council members are still seated even though we are in recess until September. They should be available when called upon for "Emergency Meetings" such as Pre-Termination hearings and so on.
