MOTION AND TITLE: Staff recommends motion to approve:

- A) Palm Beach County's electronic submittal and approval of the FY2008 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) application, previously called the Local Law Enforcement Block Grant (LLEBG), for the period October 1, 2007 to September 30, 2011, totaling \$94,140 in federal funds;
- Authorization for the County Administrator or his designee to execute electronically all related documents for Palm B) Beach County's FY2008 JAG and to execute all necessary forms and documents as required by the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs.

SUMMARY: Palm Beach County is eligible to receive a direct award of \$94,140 for the following two (2) proposals: 1) the State Attorney's Office in the amount of \$60,000 for the Community-Based Anti-Crime Unit (COMBAT), and 2) the Public Defender's Office in the amount of \$34,140 for the Ex-Offender Re-Entry Program. The two proposals are included in the FY2009 budget and there is no requirement for match with the JAG funds. Countywide (DW)

BACKGROUND AND JUSTIFICATION: The JAG Program replaces the Byrne Grant formula and the Local Law Enforcement Block Grant with a single funding source. The purpose of the JAG Program is to provide local units of government with funds to underwrite projects to reduce crime and improve public safety. The Criminal Justice Commission (CJC) staff provides program oversight and grant administration. On June 9, 2008, the CJC members approved the recommendation made by staff for the FY2008 JAG Funds. They voted to recommend submittal of two (2) grant program proposals. JAG funds may be expended over a 48-month period to use within general federally mandated purpose areas.

A public notification was listed on the CJC website and a public hearing is no longer mandated. The interest-bearing trust fund account required by the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) was established by the BCC on August 20, 1996, to deposit and disperse all federal payments received under this Block Grant Program. This is the thirteenth (13th) fiscal year in which the Bureau of Justice Assistance, US Department of Justice, is able to provide JAG/LLEBG funds through Congressional appropriations.

Summary of Programs to be Funded by Justice Assistance Grant (JAG)

COMBAT PROGRAM SUMMARY

Community Based Anti-Crime Task Force (COMBAT) is a program to fund four prosecutors to handle crime cases in targeted gang areas, Youth Violence Prevention zones as well as Weed and Seed areas. The JAG purpose area is prosecution and court programs. Coordination is needed within the community, law enforcement and courts to rid certain neighborhoods of persistent crime. The ultimate goal of the program is to assist local citizens in taking control of their neighborhoods and restore safety and security. There will be a strategy and coordinated effort to address gang and violent crime in the community, prosecute criminal cases, revitalize neighborhoods and empower the citizens in a particular neighborhood.

COMBAT Program Detail

Program

I.

The Palm Beach County State Attorney's Office created the Community Based Anti-Crime Tasks Force (COMBAT) that funds four prosecutors to handle cases in the Weed and Seed area and Youth Violence Prevention zones as well as gang violence cases in targeted areas. This funding will pay a portion of the prosecutors' salaries and benefits and the State Attorney's Office will cover the rest of the expense of the program. These areas are designated as having more significantly more crime than any other areas of the county. Assistant State Attorneys (A.S.A.) will improve the level of awareness of legislative changes and advise the police department personnel regarding best practices, to improve the likelihood of successful prosecution after arrest. The percentage of cases filed and successfully prosecuted remains much higher in the Weed & Seed areas than the rest of Palm Beach County, and continued support from dedicated full time A.S.A.'s will insure the continuation of that trend.

The objectives of the program is establishing a liaison with the local community in order to better understand public safety and crime issues in local neighborhoods, assisting local law enforcement in the preparation of criminal cases in order to improve quality of justice in local communities and addressing local problem areas on as needed basis by immediately bringing all local resources to help with public safety. This requires coordination with community, courts and law enforcement and assists local citizens in taking back responsibility for enhancing public safety in their own neighborhoods.

Project Activities

The assigned attorneys will work on the following activities;

• Filing and review of all felony cases arising from the Weed and Seed geographical area. Filing and reviewing all gang and violent crimes handled through the Violent Crimes Task Force.

Vertically prosecute all cases that have a significant impact on the Weed
 & Seed areas and the targeted gang violence areas.

These cases may include areas that have been targeted for particular increased enforcement or individuals who pose a particularly significant problem in the community.

- To conduct routine training sessions with officers assigned to the Weed & Seed areas and the Violent Crimes Task Force in an effort to increase their effectiveness and insure successful prosecution.
- To attend community meetings and keep the residents informed regarding the progress made toward the goals of the Weed & Seed project and the Violent Crimes Task Force and to channel their energy into productive, useful, efforts that achieve the goals of the project.
- Continue to stay aware of the new and creative efforts of community prosecution in other jurisdictions to insure that the county of Palm Beach applies the best practices from across the country to our problems at home.
- To coordinate the efforts of all available state, local and federal agencies to form an alliance of interested parties to achieve the best result possible for the projects and issues undertaken by the Weed & Seed participants, the Violent Crimes Task Force and the Youth Violence Prevention Project.

Goals and Objectives

A. Goal – Implementation of an innovative, comprehensive and integrated multi-agency strategy for law enforcement and community revitalization in order to control and prevent crime, drug abuse and associated open air drug markets, and gang activity.

1. **Objectives**: Effective crime reduction efforts must include effective use of resources on a local, state and federal level to insure the likelihood of achieving the desired goals of returning control of the streets to the community residents and eliminate the drugs and violence from the neighborhoods in the Weed and Seed project areas and the Youth Violence Prevention Zones. Utilize long term investigations to identify and prosecute king pins in the criminal enterprise responsible for the drug dealing and associated violence in the Weed and Seed areas and targeted gang violence areas. Utilize long term investigations to identify and prosecute king pins in the criminal enterprise responsible for the drug dealing and associated violence in these areas. Target the most violent and most successful criminals for increased effort and allocation of additional resources to insure swift and successful prosecution.

- 2. **Objectives:** To change the perception within the community from fear of the negative elements to one of control and pride in the community and to increase the level of "expectation of apprehension" in the mind of the criminal element as a crime reduction strategy. Once law enforcement accomplishes these two strategies the power in the community will shift to the positive catalysts in the community and the seeding process can flourish.
- B. Goal: To facilitate a revitalization effort in the Weed and Seed areas and the targeted gang violence areas, that will create a hospitable environment that is conducive to raising a family and living without fear in a neighborhood that exudes pride and a sense of community.
 - Objective: To insure availability of services to reduce the social ills within the community and to provide opportunities for the betterment of the individuals within the community through educational programs, treatment programs, and recreational opportunities for youth.

2. **Objective**: To create business opportunity in the specified neighborhoods and revitalize the economic base to create opportunity and growth by actively working with the business community and effectively communicating the positive changes to the area and the commitment to continue to maintain that positive trend.

C. Program Evaluation and Performance Measures

The community is asked to complete questionnaires to determine, both problems and successes in the respective areas. Statistics are kept about number of cases, what types of crimes are handled, numbers of cases prosecuted, average length of sentence, numbers of cases with formal federal indictments, cases with a federal sentence and community outreach. Utilization of crime mapping information from the Criminal Justice Commission to more efficiently apply available resources to the indicated problem areas.

JAG (07/11) PROGRAMS FOR CRIMINAL JUSTICE COMMISSION INITATIVES

Summary of Programs to be Funded by Justice Assistance Grant (JAG)

EX OFFENDER REENTRY PROGRAM SUMMARY

This is a comprehensive program to provide services to county jail inmates in an effort to provide successful re-enty back into the community. The JAG purpose area is prevention and education. A successful program could reduce recidivism, reduce the jail population, provide stable family relationships and reduce crime. Counselors help by offering services and by keeping in contact with the client to see that they complete the stated goals of the program.

Ex Offender Re-Entry Program Detail

Program Description and Program Goals and Objectives

The Palm Beach County Criminal Justice Commission identified the need for a comprehensive network of services to be provided to county jail inmates in an effort to provide a successful re-entry back into the community. The Program is operated by the Public Defenders Office. This Reentry Initiative assists in the reintegration of offenders back into the community after being released from the county jail. The goals are to reduce recidivism by providing services including literacy, job training and placement, temporary food and housing, life skill assistance and other social service needs in an attempt to aid in the reintegration process. An important first phase is to determine self-sufficiency and the level of family support provided.

Research indicates offenders cost the county approximately \$80 to \$85 per day to house at the county jail. Upon release, offenders for the most part lack the necessary skills, education and resources to sustain themselves and as a result, return to their previous lifestyle. A goal of the reentry program is to work with the local judiciary and other

criminal justice system components to provide services to clients in the jail and assist them for up to six months after their release from incarceration. The program is voluntary.

In jail substance abuse counseling, mental health counseling, drug education and other social services exist and the reentry program is designed to provide a seamless entry from jail into the reentry program to continue and expand those services. Through job training and placement, skills and vocational opportunities, family support and counseling, the reentry program will provide assistance for offenders to become gainfully employed and law abiding citizens.

Project Activities

The program will have one social worker and one job developer and this grant will be used to pay for the staff, minimal treatment expenses and staff training. The social worker will offer counseling and pre-release planning for offenders who are released from jail to facilitate their re-integration into society. The program will also pay for contracted drug treatment and mental health services on a limited basis.

The Re-Entry Program helps offenders successfully reintegrate back into society at the end of their incarceration and the program reduces crime and recidivism rates. The case manager helps the offenders with housing, jobs, family relationships and referrals to community agencies. The staff has formed Project REAP Success (Rebuilding, Empowering, Achieving and Prospering) and successful graduates talk at meetings and encourage others to achieve success.

All applicants who enter the program are interviewed and assessed and are entered into the program if they are chosen to participate in the program. Services that are available include Psych-Social Assessment, individual life course planning, employment counseling and housing assessment. Services also include housing help, individual and group counseling, literacy help, GED counseling and referrals to vocational training. Referrals to other agencies to get specific help are made to the health department, Social Security Office, Department of Children and Families (DCF), food stamps, Palm Tran for bus passes, etc. Employment services are a big part of the program and services include job development, referrals to job interviews and job counseling sessions.

Performance Measures and Program Evaluation

Statistics will be kept concerning number of prisoners released and the number that are in this program. Also the number of services and types of services will be kept and how many successfully completed the program and accomplished the stated goals. Information will be kept about the ratio of job hires to number of jail releases as well as how many are employed who are in this program. Statistics will be kept to see if inmates who go through this program are incarcerated again in the future. Surveys will be sent to people in the program to see if they are getting all the help that they need. There is oversight of the program by the Criminal Justice Commission and there is a Re-Entry Advisory Committee that meets periodically to review all aspects of the program.

Criminal Justice Commission (CJC) staff submitted the proposal of programs that would use Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) funds to the Criminal Justice Commission on Monday, June 9, 2008. They voted unanimously to approve the recommendation of the CJC staff.

I. EXECUTIVE BRIEF

MOTION AND TITLE: Staff recommends motion to approve:

- A) Palm Beach County's electronic submittal and approval of the FY2008 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) application, previously called the Local Law Enforcement Block Grant (LLEBG), for the period October 1, 2007 to September 30, 2011, totaling \$94,140 in federal funds;
- B) Authorization for the County Administrator or his designee to execute electronically all related documents for Palm Beach County's FY2008 JAG and to execute all necessary forms and documents as required by the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs.

SUMMARY: Palm Beach County is eligible to receive a direct award of \$94,140 for the following two (2) proposals: 1) the State Attorney's Office in the amount of \$60,000 for the Community-Based Anti-Crime Unit (COMBAT), and 2) the Public Defender's Office in the amount of \$34,140 for the Ex-Offender Re-Entry Program. The two proposals are included in the FY2009 budget and there is no requirement for match with the JAG funds. <u>Countywide</u> (DW)

BACKGROUND AND JUSTIFICATION: The JAG Program replaces the Byrne Grant formula and the Local Law Enforcement Block Grant with a single funding source. The purpose of the JAG Program is to provide local units of government with funds to underwrite projects to reduce crime and improve public safety. The Criminal Justice Commission (CJC) staff provides program oversight and grant administration. On June 9, 2008, the CJC members approved the recommendation made by staff for the FY2008 JAG Funds. They voted to recommend submittal of two (2) grant program proposals. JAG funds may be expended over a 48-month period to use within federally mandated purpose areas.

A public notification was listed on the CJC website and a public hearing is no longer mandated. The interest-bearing trust fund account required by the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) was established by the BCC on August 20, 1996, to deposit and disperse all federal payments received under this Block Grant Program. This is the thirteenth (13th) fiscal year in which the Bureau of Justice Assistance, US Department of Justice, is able to provide JAG/LLEBG funds through Congressional appropriations.

SUBJECT: Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program

The U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs' Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) has announced the availability of grant funds to states and local units of government through the Edward Byrne Memorial JAG. The JAG replaces the Byrne Grant Formula and Local Law Enforcement Block Grant with a single funding mechanism and the allocation process is through a formula based on population and crime rate.

JAG allows state and local governments to support a broad range of activities to prevent and control crime and to improve the justice system. The general purpose areas under JAG include:

- Law enforcement programs.
- Prosecution and court programs.
- Prevention and education programs.
- Corrections and community corrections programs.
- Drug treatment programs.
- Planning, evaluation, and technology improvement programs.
- Crime victim and witness programs (other than compensation).

On June 9, 2008, the Criminal Justice Commission (CJC) voted unanimously that the current \$94,140 allocation of JAG funds be used to support on-going programs as follows:
