I. EXECUTIVE BRIEF

MOTION AND TITLE: Staff recommends motion to receive and file: the report of the second year findings of the Youth Violence Prevention Project presented by Florida State University, College of Criminology and Criminal Justice.

SUMMARY: The first year findings were presented to the Board of County Commissioners on April 22, 2008. As a partner in the evaluation process, Florida State University has collected and analyzed data, provided program development assistance and produced an evaluation report by creating deliverables in the form of written reports, statistics, charts, graphs, maps, and presentations. The evaluation conducted by Florida State University has established outcome measures for each program area and they have compiled data from the monthly reports to evaluate the effectiveness of each component. They have prepared an analysis of baseline data, measures of fidelity to the model, conducted interviews and surveys with key staff and clients and identified impediments to implementation for the second year. The evaluation describes overall positive outcomes and makes the recommendation that based on the improvements and their cost benefit analysis the project should continue to be funded and expanded to additional sites. Countywide (DW)

BACKGROUND AND JUSTIFICATION: On February 27, 2007, the Board of County Commissioners approved the Criminal Justice Commission to develop a comprehensive evaluation of the Youth Violence Prevention Project, including the commitment to participate from Florida State University's Center for Criminology and Public Policy Research.

Lake Worth, West Palm Beach, Riviera Beach and Boynton Beach have implemented major components of their comprehensive plan that addresses youth violence. Youth Empowerment Centers in Lake Worth, West Palm Beach, Boynton Beach and Riviera Beach are providing activities and programs for teenage youth to keep them off the streets and involved in positive activities. In 2008, over 950 youth have completed structured programs through the four centers. The fifth identified site, Belle Glade, should be operational by March 31, 2009. Riviera Beach is in the second year of operating of a Community Justice Service Center serving over 800 adults on probation or released from incarceration.

The Law Enforcement component of the Youth Violence Prevention Project, has initiated a plan which includes: the purchase of equipment including ballistics identification software and license plate recognition cameras to be utilized by local law enforcement, the County's Crime Lab and Violent Crimes Task Force. The number of NIBIN hits has increased from nine in 2007 to eighty-one in 2008 as a result of this project.

Background

- In 2004, Palm Beach County experienced a significant increase in the rate of violent crime in the county.
- Subsequently, Palm Beach County developed a comprehensive, coordinated strategy to be implemented and evaluated over a three-year period (beginning in FY2006-07).
- The Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention's Comprehensive Gang Model served as the basis for the county's Youth Violence Prevention Program.

Components of the national model (Spergel's gang model):

Community mobilization: mobilizing community stakeholders to plan, strengthen, & create new opportunities for gang-involved or at-risk youth

- Social intervention: outreach to engage gang-involved & at-risk youth
- **Provision of social opportunities:** facilitate access to academic, social, & economic opportunities
- **Suppression:** conduct gang and violent crime suppression activities & initiatives (training, equipment, collaboration)

Organizational change and development of local

agencies: utilize a team, problem-solving approach consistent with the philosophy of community-oriented policing

PREVENTION:

Goal: Youth empowerment through youth leadership (Teen councils); crime prevention

LAW ENFORCEMENT:

Goal: reduction in violent crime

COURTS:

Goal: Increase successful prosecutions; reduction violent crime

CORRECTIONS:

Goal: Successful community reintegration; reduced recidivism

Background

- 5 cities were selected on the basis of being violent crime "hot spots" to implement the identified strategy.
- 5 comparable cities were selected utilizing crime and census data to serve as the matched control sites.
- 2007 served as the first year of implementation for this initiative.
- The 5 program sites and matched control sites are:

- The program components are:
 - Prevention (implemented in 4 of 5 sites)
 - Law Enforcement (countywide and site specific initiatives)
 - Law Enforcement Workgroup and the Violent Crimes Task Force
 - Courts (countywide and site specific initiatives)
 - Combat Unit, Office of the State Attorney, and the Office of Statewide Prosecution
 - Corrections (implemented in 1 of 5 sites)
- The goals of the <u>Courts</u> component have shifted over the initial two years of implementation. This component has been implemented through the Office of the State Attorney and the Office of Statewide Prosecution. The findings are presented with the <u>Law Enforcement</u> component due to the high level of integration involved with their activities.





Lake Worth Youth Empowerment Center - Youth Served in 2008



- In 2008, the Youth Empowerment Centers were fully operational in 4 of the 5 sites: Boynton Beach, Lake Worth, Riviera Beach, and West Palm Beach.
- Together, the four centers provided 23,575 sessions of structured education, employment, and life skills programming for 733 youth in 2008.
- Combined, the 4 centers offered approximately 50 named, structured programs in 2008:
 - 15 education programs
 - 27 employment programs
 - 8 life skills programs
- Pre/post programming outcomes are presented for 3 programs:
 - 50% (36) of the youth receiving school homework assistance experienced grade improvements (at Lake Worth provided by For the Children).
 - 100% of the 27 youth who completed the computer building program increased their pre/post test scores and received computers at the program's graduation (18 youth at West Palm Beach, 9 youth at Riviera Beach).
 - 100% of the 17 youth enrolled in the audio visual life skills program improved their pre/post test scores (West Palm Beach provided by Taylor Productions).
- Youth who served as members of the Youth Empowerment Centers' <u>Youth Councils</u> experienced significant gains in their pre/post self-determination measures (autonomy, self-regulation, psychological empowerment, problem solving, and goal setting).





Members of 3 youth councils were given a pre- and post-assessment to measure levels of self-determination at three points in time:

- Time 1 Pre-test = \leq 5 mos. of YEC involvement
- Time 2 Post-test = 6-17 mos. of YEC involvement
- Time 3 Post-test = 18-24 mos. of YEC involvement



Outcomes: Survey National Institute of Justice Gang Threat Assessment Law Enforcement

The survey was completed by the Violent Crimes Task Force and the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office during Yr 1 (baseline) and at the end of Yr 2. The survey addresses perceptions of crime and gang problems.

- There was no change in the rating of the perceived overall crime problem (Yr 1 - Yr 2).
- There was a significant decrease in the number of active gangs reported in year 2.
- There was a slight increase in the number of gang members for the same time period
- Effective strategies identified:
 - Violent gang crime strategies (during Yrs 1 & 2):
 - Pro-active policing
 - Violent Crimes Task Force collaborative efforts
 - Over last 12 months (Yr 2), the most effective strategies were:
 - Saturation patrols
 - RICO (Office the State Attorney and Office of Statewide Prosecution)




Outcomes: Survey Florida Department of Law Enforcement Gang Assessment Office of the State Attorney and the Office of Statewide Prosecution

The survey was completed by the Violent Crimes Task Force and the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office during Yr 1 (baseline) and at the end of Yr 2. The survey addresses perceptions of crime and gang problems.

- Implementation (and continuation of) tracking gang member involvement in violent crime prosecutions through their STAC system was reported as an important tool.
- In Yr 2, the use of RICO (by the Office of Statewide Prosecution) and Ch.874, F.S., for penalty enhancements by the Office of the State Attorney was reported as an important tool. Prior to the YVPP, these tools were not utilized.
- In Yr 1, baseline year, respondents reported the gang problem as "getting worse"; in Yr 2, it was reported as "staying about the same."
- An increase in the number of criminal gang cases being filed was reported in Yr 1; in year 2, a decrease in these cases was reported.
- Effective strategies identified:
 - Vertical prosecutions
 - Organized and collaborative approach to gang violence
 - Training specific to criminal gang activity/prosecution

Number of gang related prosecutions per month




Services Provided <u>Corrections: Justice Service Centers</u>

- Riviera Beach is the only site that has implemented a Justice Service Center.
- The Riviera Beach Justice Service Center served 767 adults in 2008 (up from 105 in 2007).
- Clients ranged in age from 17 to 72 years.
- Services included: intake processing, re-entry (assistance with civil rights restoration, driver's license, banking, etc.), and employment assistance.
- The Justice Service Center provides structured, on-going programs (e.g., employment counseling) as well as short-term services such as referrals and assistance with obtaining counsel, restoring civil rights, job referrals, etc.
- Riviera Beach's Justice Service Center provided 1,237 sessions of services in 2008.

Outcomes: Arrest Histories

Youth Empowerment Centers:

- 93% of the youth served in 2007 and 2008 in the centers had no arrest histories.
- 68 youth had arrest histories either before, during, or after their involvement with the centers (7% of the 950 total youth served in 2007 and 2008).
- 23 of the 68 youth with prior arrest histories -- had <u>no</u> <u>further arrests once they became involved in the centers.</u>
- 45 youth had arrests after they became involved in the centers.

Outcomes: Arrest Histories

Youth Empowerment Centers

- 68 matches for the youth
- Number of youth with arrest histories by site:
 - Boynton Beach: 24
 - Lake Worth: 2
 - Riviera Beach: 29
 - West Palm Beach: 13
- 68 youth represented 297 arrest charges
- Felonies: 42% Misdemeanors: 45% Unknown: 13%
- Violent: 18% Nonviolent: 82%
- Note: This data reflects arrest charges only not charges for which youth were prosecuted or convicted.

Outcomes: Arrest Histories

Justice Service Centers:

- 458 out of 872 participating adults had arrest histories -(872 participants for 2007 and 2008 combined).
- 343 (75%) experienced <u>no further arrests after they</u> <u>became involved</u> in the Justice Service Center.
- 12% of the arrest charges were for violent offenses and the remainder were property (including burglary), drugs, or other offenses.
- 42% of the arrest charges were for felonies, 33% were for misdemeanors, and 25% were unknown.
- Note: There were 8,756 arrest charges which does not necessarily reflect the offenses for which these individuals were prosecuted or convicted.

Outcomes: UCR Crime Data - 2007 and 2008 Rate Change

- Rate change in <u>Total Crime Rate</u> between 2007 and 2008:
 - Four program sites fared better than the matched control sites in the rate change for total crime:
 - Lake Worth, Riviera Beach, West Palm Beach, and Belle Glade experienced greater reductions than the rate reductions in their respective control sites.
 - Boynton Beach experienced a <u>slight increase</u>; however, the control site experienced a greater increase.
- Rate change in <u>Violent Crime Rate</u> between 2007 and 2008:
 - Three of the program sites fared better than the matched control sites in the rate change for violent crime; all program sites experienced decreases in rates of violent crime:
 - Lake Worth, Riviera Beach, and West Palm Beach experienced <u>decreases</u> in violent crimes; two of the three control sites experienced less significant decreases and one control site had a significant increase in violent crime.
 - Boynton Beach experienced a <u>decrease</u>; however, the control site had a greater decrease.
 - Belle Glade experienced a significant <u>decrease</u> in violent crime while the control site experienced a greater decrease in violent crime.

Outcomes: Projected Economic Impact

- Utilizing 6 years of UCR crime data, projections were made to estimate the violent crime rates in 2008 – if the Youth Violence Prevention Program had not been implemented.
- Violent offenses include: murder, rape, robbery, and assault.
- Costs for each violent crime was determined in a National Institute of Justice report.
- Countywide:
 - Violent crime rate projections resulted in an estimated life-time cost savings of \$22,431,933
- <u>5 program sites/cities</u>:
 - Violent crime rate projections resulted in an estimated life-time cost savings of \$5,701,333.

Cost-Benefit Estimates

- Additional cost-benefit estimates can be associated with this program.
- Estimated Cost (per youth) for the Youth Empowerment Centers:
- By site, the per youth cost is:
 - Boynton Beach \$6,781
 - Lake Worth \$4,518
 - Riviera Beach\$5,955
 - West Palm Beach \$18,355
 - Averages to \$10,825 per youth
- (Note: Belle Glade was allocated \$756,470 but hasn't served youth; the cost per client for Riviera Beach's Justice Service Center is \$1,334)
- If 1 youth stays crime-free and chemical-free, it saves \$2.2 million over his/her lifetime, if this program is successful for the following percentages of youth, the cost savings would be:
- 10% (88 youth) would save \$194 million
- 20% (176 youth) would save \$388 million
- 30% (582 youth) would save \$582 million

(Source: Cohen, 1998, Journal of Quantitative Criminology. Calculation: 950 youth minus 68 with arrest histories = 882 x10% x\$2.2m)

This includes tracking the location of the charged crime and the arrest as well as identification of cases as YVP or gang related. If identified as gang related, gang affiliation is entered into STAC for tracking purposes.
- **Collaboration/partnerships**: The identification of specific gang affiliation is a joint effort by law enforcement and courts and includes both manual identification, by law enforcement, as well as electronic tracking through the SA's STAC system.

Courts (juvenile)

A specific plan to develop the juvenile courts component of YVPP was put forth by the CJC. The focus of the courts component is to target youth during all stages of their involvement in the juvenile justice system (diversion, intervention, and reentry/transition). The goals of this plan are outlined below.

<u>Timeline</u>: Courts component goals and objectives for implementation and completion are to take place over the course of the project (3 years).

Criminal Justice Commission Oversight Activities

YVPP Oversight Activities:

- On September 9, an inter-local agreement extending the 07-08 funding and adding an additional \$300,000 was executed by the Board of County Commissioners (BCC). CJC worked with the City of Belle Glade to secure a site for the YEC.
- CJC worked with cities to develop Interlocal Agreements for year three funding. These agreements were approved by the BCC on September 23, 2008. Each city's budget was reduced by 10 percent due to budget restrictions.
- The committee unanimously recommended approval of the purchase of an extended warranty for the BrassTRAX system
