#### I. EXECUTIVE BRIEF

#### **MOTION AND TITLE: Staff recommends motion to:**

- Approve the submittal of the FY2009 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) **A)** Formula Program: Local Solicitation application, previously called the Local Law Enforcement Block Grant (LLEBG), for the period October 1, 2008 to September 30, 2012, totaling \$303,005 in federal funds;
- B) Authorize the Criminal Justice Commission's Executive Director, through the County Administrator, to execute electronically all related documents for the FY2009 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program and to execute all necessary forms, documents and the resulting grant agreement as required by U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Justice Programs.

SUMMARY: Palm Beach County is eligible to receive a direct award of \$303,005 for the following proposal: 1) the Criminal Justice Commission (CJC) Youth Violence Prevention Project (YVPP) for \$272,705. The proposal above equals 90% of the eligible award amount. The remaining 10% of the award amount (\$30,300) will be used by the CJC for costs associated with administering JAG funds. There is no requirement for match with the JAG funds. Countywide (DW)

BACKGROUND AND JUSTIFICATION: The JAG Program replaces the Byrne Grant formula and the Local Law Enforcement Block Grant with a single funding source. The purpose of the JAG Program is to provide local units of government with funds to underwrite projects to reduce crime and improve public safety. The Criminal Justice Commission (CJC) staff provides program oversight and grant administration. On July 13, 2009, the CJC members approved the recommendation made by the CJC Finance Committee for the FY2009 JAG Funds. They voted to recommend submittal of the one grant program proposal. JAG funds may be expended over a 48-month period to use within general federally mandated purpose areas.

A public notification was listed on the CJC website and a public hearing is no longer mandated. The interest-bearing trust fund account required by the Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) was established by the BCC on August 20, 1996, to deposit and disperse all federal payments received under this Block Grant Program. This is the fourteenth (14<sup>th</sup>) fiscal year in which the Bureau of Justice Assistance, US Department of Justice, is able to provide JAG/LLEBG funds through Congressional appropriations.





#### Program Narrative Palm Beach County JAG Program (Attachment 1)

Palm Beach County (PBC) responded to near epidemic levels of violence with a comprehensive youth violence prevention project (Project) modeled after the Comprehensive Gang Model which is derived from the research of Irving Spergel and his colleagues at the University of Chicago.

Based on the findings from a study of violent crime in the county, five program sites or violent crime "hot spots" were identified and these cities agreed to implement the Project. The Criminal Justice Commission (CJC), who acts as the advisory board to the county on all criminal justice matters, identified cities that were chosen based on crime data to implement the plan, namely: Riviera Beach, West Palm Beach, Lake Worth, Boynton Beach, and Belle Glade.

Professionals from the criminal justice system, education, human services, and local youth contributed to the planning for the County's comprehensive approach to youth violence reduction. Under the leadership of the CJC, four subcommittees were formed, namely, crime prevention, law enforcement, courts, and corrections, and charged with developing a strategic plan. The recommendations from the four subcommittees were examined and used to support the county's implementation of a multi-agency comprehensive program model.

The CJC invited the cities of Boynton Beach, West Palm Beach, Lake Worth, Riviera Beach and Belle Glade to implement the program and agree to the following conditions:

- Abide by the requirement that all city-related projects and efforts will service the residents within the identified geographic areas as outlined by GIS mapping.
- Make a commitment of building space for services within the identified geographical areas.
- Design a phase-in plan, including timeline, for the creation of a Youth Empowerment Center.
- Design a phase-in plan, including timeline, for a Justice Service Center.
- Participate in the multi-agency task force law enforcement component of the Youth Violence Prevention Project.
- Utilize the findings of the Project's 500 youth surveys to develop and prioritize youth empowerment programs.
- Pay the city's portion of all goods, services, and personnel used in connection with this project.
- Develop separate community advisory boards for youth and young adults.
- Participate in all aspects of evaluation including data collection, data sharing, site monitoring, and visits.

Each of the five sites has implement Youth Empowerment Centers (YEC) to varying degrees that offer programs for at-risk youth who may or may not be involved in the justice system. In addition, the model requires a component for juveniles or adults on probation or re-entering

the county from jails or institutions, called Justice Service Centers (JSC). Only two of the five JSC exist today. While each of the participating municipalities and the county value the project, funding is not available to develop the JSC or to augment the Project.

On-going suppression efforts include: special operations; shared data systems; countywide training on evidence collection and interviewing techniques; and enhanced use of technology to suppress and prosecute gun-related crimes. Suppression efforts are funded completely by local, state and federal law enforcement agencies.

While the Criminal Justice Commission (CJC) has served as the convener of the Project, its success is largely due to the efforts of the Steering Committee, Committees and many partners including the Board of County Commissioners, five municipalities (Boynton Beach, Riviera Beach, West Palm Beach, Belle Glade and Lake Worth), local, state and federal law enforcement, educators, Workforce Alliance, and community and faith-based organizations. To this end, several community service agencies and foundations provide funding and/or in-kind services to the Centers, including:

- The Community Foundation donated \$56,000 to the Belle Glade Site.
- Palm Beach County Commissioner Santamaria contributed \$100,000 from local funds to the Belle Glade Site.
- Creative Learning Center, Inc provides in-kind services such as etiquette class to the West Palm Beach (WPB) Site.
- Delray Photographic Center provides free photography classes at the WPB Site.
- The Sun-Sentinel Children's Fund contributed \$6,000 to the Lake Worth (LW) Site.
- The Center for Creative Education donated \$3,000 to the LW Site.
- Prime Time, Inc donated \$3,000 to the LW Site.
- The Children Services Council provides a half-time position at the LW Site.

In addition, The CJC has an existing partnership with the Florida State University's (FSU) Center for Criminology and Public Policy Research who provides on-going evaluation of the Youth Violence Prevention Program.

The following notification requirements were originally presented to the governing body and public as required by the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act grant previously submitted. This award amount of \$303,005 will be added to the amount previously allocated (\$1,691,582) for the Youth Violence Prevention Project.

#### Governing Body Notification - 30 days before the application is submitted

Criminal Justice Commission (CJC) Finance Committee submitted the proposal of programs that would use Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) funds to the Criminal Justice Commission on Monday, May 11, 2009. They voted unanimously to approve the recommendation of the CJC Finance Committee.

On May 15, 2009, a letter was written to Jeff Koons, Chair of the Palm Beach County Board of County Commissioners. The letter explained the JAG Program, jurisdictions eligible and the plan to use the JAG funds. The following programs were allocated the JAG funds of \$2,471,582:

#### **Overview of the JAG Program**

The Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program (42 U.S.C. 3751(a)) is the primary provider of federal criminal justice funding to state and local jurisdictions. JAG funds support all components of the criminal justice system, from multijurisdictional drug and gang task forces to crime prevention and domestic violence programs, courts, corrections, treatment, and justice information sharing initiatives. JAG funded projects may address crime through the provision of services directly to individuals and/or communities and by improving the effectiveness and efficiency of criminal justice systems, processes, and procedures.

#### **Deadline: Registration**

Applicants must register with the Office of Justice Programs' (OJP) Grants Management System (GMS) prior to applying.

#### **Deadline:** Applications

The due date for applying for funding under this announcement is 8:00 p.m. e.t. on July 9, 2009.

#### Eligibility

Applicants are limited to units of local government appearing on the FY 2009 JAG Allocations List. To view this list, go to <u>www.oip.usdoj.gov/BJA/grant/09jagallocations.html</u>. For JAG program purposes, a unit of local government is: a town, township, village, parish, city, county, borough, or other general purpose political subdivision of a state; or, it may also be a federally recognized Indian tribe or Alaskan Native organization that performs law enforcement functions as determined by the Secretary of the Interior. Otherwise a unit of local government may be any law enforcement district or judicial enforcement district established under state law with authority to independently establish a budget and impose taxes. In Louisiana, a unit of local government means the office of a district attorney or a parish sheriff. In the District of Columbia or any United States Trust Territory, a unit of local government is any agency of the District of Columbia or Federal government performing law enforcement functions for the District of Columbia or Trust Territories of the United States. #### JAG Program—Specific Information

All awards are subject to the availability of appropriated funds and any modifications or additional requirements that may be imposed by law.

Established to streamline justice funding and grant administration, the JAG Program allows states, tribes, and local governments to support a broad range of activities to prevent and control crime based on their own local needs and conditions. JAG blends the previous Byrne

Formula and Local Law Enforcement Block Grant (LLEBG) Programs to provide agencies with the flexibility to prioritize and place justice funds where they are needed most.

#### Formula

The Bureau of Justice Statistics (BJS) calculates, for each *state and territory, a* minimum base allocation which, based on the statutory JAG formula, can be enhanced by (1) the state's share of the national population and (2) the state's share of the country's Part 1 violent crime statistics. Once the state funding is calculated, 60 percent of the allocation is awarded to the state and 40 percent to eligible units of local government.

States also have a variable percentage of the allocation that is required *to* "pass through" to units of local government. This amount, also calculated by BJS, is based on each state's crime expenditures. In addition, the formula calculates direct allocations for local governments within each state, based on their share of the total violent crime reported within the state. Local governments that are entitled to at least \$10,000 awards may apply directly to BJA for local JAG funds.

#### Purpose Areas

JAG funds may be used for state and local initiatives, technical assistance, training, personnel, equipment, supplies, contractual support, information systems for criminal justice, and criminal justice related research and evaluation activities that will improve or enhance:

- Law enforcement programs.
- Prosecution and court programs.
- Prevention and education programs.
- Corrections and community corrections programs.
- Drug treatment and enforcement programs.
- Planning, evaluation, and technology improvement programs.
- Crime victim and witness programs (other than compensation).

#### Responsibilities

The Chief Executive Officer (CEO) of an eligible unit of local government or a local agency designated by the CEO must submit the application for JAG funds. A unit of local government receiving a JAG award will be responsible for the administration of the funds including: distributing the funds; monitoring the award; submitting reports including performance measures and program assessment data; and providing ongoing oversight and assistance to any subrecipients of the funds.

#### Administrative Funds

A unit of local government may use up to 10 percent of the award, plus any interest accrued, for costs associated with administering JAG funds.  $\frac{4303,005}{50} \times 10\% = \frac{430,300}{50}$

#### **Disparate Certification**

A disparate allocation occurs when a city or municipality is scheduled to receive one-and-onehalf times (150 percent) more than the county, while the county bears more than 50 percent of the costs associated with prosecution or incarceration of the municipality's Part 1 violent crime. Multiple disparate allocations occur when multiple cities or municipalities are collectively eligible to receive four times (400 percent) more than the county. Jurisdictions certified as disparate must identify a fiscal agent that will submit a joint application for the total eligible allocation. The joint application must specify the award .
 distribution to each unit of local government and the purposes for which the funds will be used. When beginning the JAG application process, a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) that identifies which jurisdiction will serve as the applicant/fiscal agent for joint funds, must be completed, and signed by the Authorized Representative for each participating jurisdiction. #### Governing Body Review

The applicant agency (fiscal agent) must make the grant application available for review by the governing body (or to the organization designated by the governing body) not fewer than 30 days before the application is submitted to BJA.

#### **Public Comment**

The Local JAG application must include a statement that the application was made public and that, to the extent of applicable law or established procedure, an opportunity to comment was provided to citizens and neighborhood or community organizations.

#### Supplanting

Federal funds may be used to supplement appropriated funds, in an effort to augment program activities. However, federal funds cannot replace or supplant nonfederal funds that have been appropriated for the grant's purpose.

#### Award Amount

The FY 2009 JAG Allocations List indicates the amount for which each unit of local government is eligible to apply. #### Length of Awards

Awards are made in the first fiscal year of the appropriation and may be expended during the following 3 years, for a total of 4 years. Extensions may be granted at the discretion of the BJA Director and must be requested via GMS no less than 30 days prior to the grant's end date.

#### **Trust Fund**

Each unit of local government may draw down any and all JAG funds after acceptance of the award. To do so, a trust fund must be established in which to deposit the funds. The trust fund may or may not be an interest- bearing account. If subrecipients draw down JAG funds in advance, they also must establish a trust fund in which to deposit funds.

#### **Prohibited Uses**

No JAG funds may be expended outside of JAG purpose areas. Even within these purpose areas, however, JAG funds cannot be used directly or indirectly for security enhancements or equipment for nongovernmental entities not engaged in criminal justice or public safety. Nor may JAG funds be used directly or indirectly to provide for any of the following matters unless BJA certifies that extraordinary and exigent circumstances exist, making them essential to the maintenance of public safety and good order:

- Vehicles (excluding police cruisers), vessels (excluding police boats), or aircraft (excluding police helicopters).
- Luxury items.

- Real estate.
- Construction projects (other than penal or correctional institutions).
- Any similar matters.

#### **Reporting Requirements**

- Once an award is accepted, quarterly financial status reports (SF-269s), quarterly
  performance metrics reports, and an annual progress report must be submitted to BJA.

#### Match Requirement

While match is not required with the JAG Program, match is an effective strategy for states and units of local government to expand justice funds and build buy-in for local criminal justice initiatives.

#### **Performance Measures**

To assist in fulfilling the Department's responsibilities under the Government Performance and Results Act of 1993 (GPRA), P.L. 103-62, applicants who receive funding under this solicitation must provide data that measure the results of their work. In addition, applicants must discuss their data collection methods in the application. New performance measures have been developed by BJA with input from criminal justice members in the field (including SAAs). #### How to Apply

**Grants Management System Instructions**. Applications must be submitted through OJP's online Grants Management System (GMS). #### **Program Narrative (Attachment 1)**

Applicants must submit a program narrative that generally describes the proposed program activities for the 4-year grant period. The narrative must outline the type of programs to be funded by the JAG award and provide a brief analysis of the need for the programs. Narratives must also identify anticipated coordination efforts involving JAG and related justice funds. Certified disparate jurisdictions submitting a **joint application** must specify the funding distribution to each disparate unit of local government and the purposes for which the funds will be used.

#### Budget and Budget Narrative (Attachment 2)

Applicants must submit a budget and budget narrative outlining how JAG funds, including administrative funds if applicable, will be used to support and implement the program. A sample budget form may be found at <u>www.ojp.usdoj.gov/funding/forms/budget\_detail.pdf</u>.

#### **Abstract (Attachment 4)**

Applicants must provide an abstract that includes the applicant's name, title of the project, goals of the project, and a description of the strategies to be used. The abstract must not exceed a half-page, or 400-500 words.
