I. EXECUTIVE BRIEF

MOTION AND TITLE: Staff recommends motion to: (A) Receive and file the Quantum Neighborhood Initiative Grant in the amount of \$56,375 for the West Palm Beach Community Justice Service Center for the period of September 1, 2009 to September 1, 2010; and **(B)** approve a Budget Amendment of \$56,375 in the Quantum Foundation Neighborhood Initiative Grant Fund to establish funds for this grant project.

SUMMARY: This is a Quantum Neighborhood Initiative Fund Grant in the amount of \$56,375 to provide employment readiness skills, job coaching and job development at the West Palm Beach Community Justice Service Center. The goal is to work with 90 clients prepare them for work and obtain employment. The Grant is to hire a job coach/developer and provide classes in employability skills, develop employers willing to give people a chance and then provide support to maintain employment. This is a collaborative effort with numerous organizations in the area. The Grant is for one year with the option to apply for a second year if funding is available. There is no match requirement. (District 7) (DW)

BACKGROUND AND JUSTIFICATION:

The West Palm beach Community Justice Service Center (CJSC) has doubled the walk-in clients in 2009. Most of the clients are seeking employment and many of them lack the requisite skills to obtain and maintain employment. The CJSC addresses low-level, non-violent misdemeanor crimes and ordinance violations. It diverts offenders from county jail by providing assistance through a wide array of social and clinical services including substance abuse treatment. The CJSC emphasizes community service sanctions rather than fines or incarceration. The goal is for those who harm the community, to give back through community service. In addition the CJSC is a resource center in the community to provide a myriad of service to residents who walk in.

Today, the CJC is recognized throughout the state as a unique and effective forum to deal with crime and its associated costs, both in terms of victimization and financial impact. There are 33 members, 21 of whom are public sector criminal justice agency heads and there are 12 private sector members. The CJC makes recommendations to the BCC that accomplish the following objectives: 1: To provide overall coordination to law enforcement and crime prevention efforts 2: To provide an efficient, cost effective and timely criminal justice system in the County. 3: To effect the reduction of crime in the County on a permanent basis. Some of the major accomplishments of the CJC are: * The Law Enforcement Planning Council * The Civil Drug Court/Pretrial Intervention Program * Created the Probation Advisory Board * Established five Weed and Seed Programs * Created the Citizens Criminal Justice Academy * Established the first Community Court in Florida * Planned and implemented the first Drug Court * Developed and Implemented the Youth Violence Prevention Project The Community Justice Service Center was established on August 10, 1999. It is much more than a court; it addresses the quality-of-life issues of the community. The Community Justice Service Center is a part of the community. The Center has presented an effective alternative to revolving-door justice by taking a resultsoriented approach to low-level crimes by restoring neighborhoods victimized by petty crime, as well as helping offenders relinquish criminal behavior. A Community Advisory Board meets regularly on how the Centers could better serve the community. The Boards serve as the voice of the community and provides input on services needed, and local concerns.

QNI Fund Community Health Need/Issue Local Data (required)	According to the 2000 census tract information on income and poverty status, thirty-nine percent of the individuals living in our targeted area were living below the poverty level. Of that 65% are African American. Over fifty percent of the families are single parent, female-headed households.
	The median wage and salary income is \$19,408. Eighteen percent of the households receive public assistance and thirty percent of the households receive a social security income. Children under the age of five constitute the largest group living in poverty. The high poverty rate is also reflected in the percentage of children free or reduced school lunches, which is approximately seventy-five percent. It should be noted that cost of living is extensively greater in Palm Beach County than in most of the other counties throughout Florida.
	The unemployment rate is approximately 18% in the target area. Small businesses located in the area are "mom and pop" restaurants, grocery and convenience stores, service stations and game rooms. The lack of large businesses in the area further contributes to the unemployment problem. Nearly thirdy percent of the employed residents work as unskilled laborers, 28 % of the adults 16 and over are not in the labor force, less than 8% of the residents have a college degree.

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The Commuity Justice Service Center located at 2107 Tamarind Avenue has been providing services in this neighborhood since 1999. The target population is the residents and the Community Justice Service Center has a Community Advisory Board that is chaired by Edith Bush. The Board consists of area residents and service providers in the neighborhood. The Board has identified employment as a critical issue of concern. They direct the activities of the center and they have been involved in this proposal development and will continue advising staff on the implementation.

Project Activities

The activities in Project Ready (PR) will be delivered to at least 80% of 30 Job Seekers, with or without criminal history and other barriers to employment, per 3-Month Session for a total of 90 partivcipants. A tracking system (Job Seeker Tracker) will be developed to monitor activities, progress and accomplishments.

The Project's activities will include job preparation, job development and job coaching and case management for the purpose of job retention:

Job preparation – A 12-week Module of Educational Groups will be provided at a rate of 3 days per week for a total of 36 Sessions. These groups will teach skills related to identifying marketable job skills, matching job skills to occupation/jobs, conducting a job search, completing and submitting an application, self-awareness and self esteem, family relationships, resolving childcare issues, time management, interviewing etiquette and protocol, managing employer/supervisor-employee relationships, managing co-worker relationships

A curriculum will be developed/modified (PEVM) to facilitate group presentation Job development – Employers will be engaged for partnership agreement (MOU) to secure commitment to the hiring of PR prepared Job Seekers. Project Ready will offer to complete background checks as an incentive to this collaboration. Additionally, PR will utilize WorkForce Alliance's job placement resources to promote the linking of Job Seekers to Employers.

Job Coaching -- The Project will provide supportive contacts, on-the-job in the first 30 days of employment (and as needed, thereafter) to promote job familiarity and competency, and successful completion of the probationary period. Mediation of employer-employee relationship will also be a job coaching activity.

Case Management – Case management will be made available to all PR Job Seekers at all level of involvement. During the initial phase while participating in groups a case manager will be available 3 days per week to address any obstacle to group participation. During job search and initial phase of employment (first 30 days) the Case Manager will be available to facilitate the job search in collaboration with the Job Developer. Case management services will continue to be available throughout the first year of employment to facilitate job retention, (at least) through monthly contacts (or as needed). These services will be provided by Community Justice Service Center Social Workers. This will an additional workload for the social workers, however, providing the services will lessen the load of the help with job search. It will refocus their efforts toward maintaining the job rather than dealing with the food and housing issues when they do not have a job. We will also be utilizing interns from Florida Atlantic University School of Social Work.

Project Outcome & Impact

It is anticipated that this Project will prepare 90 Job Seekers for work. The 90 Job Seekers will be both new clients and existing clients of the Community Justice Service Center. Employers will be identified and engaged in agreement through Memorandum of Understanding (MOU). A significant number, 90% of those who complete the job preparedness groups (12-week Module of Educational Groups) will be employed and remain employed for up to 1 year.

A cadre of Employers committed to this difficult to employ population will remain available after 1 year.

A "Job Seeker Tracker" system will be developed to monitor and record the activities, progress and accomplishment of the participants in the Project.

 Provide job readiness training and education to job seekers; 2) form a collaboration with employers to bridge the gap/enhance communication between the unemployed and available jobs; 3) Secure commitment for employment of difficult to place job seekers.

90% of those who complete the job preparedness groups (12-week Module of Educational Groups) will be employed and remain employed for up to 1 year

Treatment will be made available to Job Seekers as needed and requested through any of the three
	programs with which CJC now contracts for recovery from substance abuse.
	Child Care: A partnership with Family Central and or a subsidy to support private child care is needed.
	Timeliness (need for alarm clocks): Time Management education and the
	availability of an alarm clock will be applied to address this challenge. Retention in preparation: An incentive to complete the 12-Week Module of
	Educational Groups is needed.
	Clothing and Equipment (work boots, gloves, tools): An agreement between two community services agencies: Nelson's Outreach and Dress For Success has been reached. These agencies will provide PR'S Job Seekers with work boots, gloves, tools and clothing with the support of funding from the Project.
	Transportation: Clients will need bus passes and or gas cards to facilitate transportation to and from the Project and eventually to get to and from work in the first 30 days of employment.
QNI Fund Organization Info (required)	The Criminal Justice Commission has managed the Community Justice Service Center since 1999. The Center evolved from a community court to a resource center for the neighborhood. As unemployment has increased the number of residents seeking help with jobs has increased dramatically. Many of the residents who are unemployed are lacking the skills to get a job. The CJSC is in the neighborhood and is seen as a community resource where they are comfortable seeking assistance. Sustainibility will be through funding from the city of West Palm beach when they see the success of the program or seeking a grant.



CONDITIONS OF GRANT

Following are the conditions applying to grants made by The Quantum Foundation ("the Foundation"). You should read these conditions carefully prior to signing this form. Your signature on the Grant Award Letter constitutes your acceptance in full of all conditions contained herein. To induce the Foundation to make the grant requested hereby, the entity requesting support from the Foundation ("the grantee") accepts and agrees to comply with the following conditions in the event that such grant is awarded. As used throughout this form, the term "grant" shall include the income, if any, arising there from unless the context otherwise requires.

1. PURPOSE AND ADMINISTRATION.

The grant shall be used exclusively for the purposes specified in the grantee's proposal submitted on 07/01/09 and related documents, all as approved by the Foundation. The grantee will directly administer the project or program being supported by the grant and agrees that no grant funds shall be disbursed to any organization or entity, whether or not formed by the grantee, other than as specifically set forth in the preceding paragraph.

2. USE OF GRANT FUNDS.

A. Except for a general operating support grant, no part of the grant shall be used to carry on propaganda or otherwise attempt to influence legislation [within the meaning of Section 4945(d)(1) of the Internal Revenue Code].

B. No part of the grant shall be used to attempt to influence the outcome of any specific public election or to carry on, directly or indirectly, any voter registration drive [within the meaning of Section 4945(d)(2) of the Internal Revenue Code].

C. No part of the grant shall be used to provide a grant to an individual for travel, study, or similar purpose without complying with the requirements of Section 4945(g) of the Internal Revenue Code as if the grant were made by the Foundation and without prior written approval of the Foundation. Payments of salaries, other compensation, or expense reimbursement to employee of the grantee within the scope of their employment do not constitute "grants" for these purposes and are not subject to these restrictions.

D. No part of the grant shall be used for a grant to another organization without complying with the requirements of Section 4945(d)(4), and, if applicable, Section 4945(h) of the Internal Revenue Code as if the grant were made by the Foundation and without prior written approval of the Foundation.

E. No part of the grant shall be used for purposes other than religious, charitable, scientific, literacy, or educational purposes or the prevention of cruelty to children [within the meaning of Section 170(c)(2)(B) of the Internal Revenue Code].

F. The grantee shall, within fifteen (15) days of a request by the Foundation to do so, repay any portion of the grant which for any reason is not used exclusively for the purposes of the grant. The grantee shall repay to the Foundation any portion of the grant which is not used exclusively for the purposes described in Section 1 hereof within the time specified in the grantee's proposal or within any approved extension of said time period, said repayment to be made within fifteen (15) days after such specified time or such extension. If the Foundation terminates the grant pursuant to Section 9 hereof, the grantee shall repay, within the lesser of thirty (30) days after a written request by the Foundation, or by the date specified in the written request by the Foundation, (i) all grant funds unexpended as of the effective date of termination, (ii) all grant funds expended as of the effective date of

In the event that any portion of the grant is used for purposes other than those described in Section 170(c)(2)(B) of the Internal Revenue Code, grantee shall repay to the Foundation that portion of the grant as well as any additional amount in excess of such portion necessary to effect a correction under Section 4945 of the Internal Revenue Code. In the event grantee does not comply with the provisions of this Section 2.F., grantee agrees that such breach would irreparably injure the Foundation and leave the Foundation with an inadequate remedy at law and grantee further agrees, that if legal proceedings should have to be brought by the Foundation against grantee to enforce any portion of this Section 2.F. the Foundation shall be entitled to preliminary injunctive relief requiring grantee to place into the registry of the court any funds at issue until resolution of the issue (whether by court decision or mutual agreement of grantee and the Foundation) and grantee further agrees that with respect to such relief, a bond furnished by the Foundation (or deposit of funds in the registry of the court) in the amount of \$500 shall be deemed adequate compliance with any requirement for a bond in connection with relief sought by the Foundation. Nothing in this Section 2.F. shall be construed as prohibiting the Foundation from pursuing any other legal or equitable remedies available to it for the breach or threatened breach of these Conditions of Grant. Any litigation arising out of or in connection with the grant shall be governed, interpreted and construed in accordance with the laws of the State of Florida. Any litigation arising out of or in connection with the grant shall be had only in the state or federal courts of Palm Beach County, Florida, and in any such litigation where the Foundation seeks to recover funds due it pursuant to this Section 2.F., the Foundation shall be entitled to all costs and expenses of such litigation including, but not limited to, attorneys' fees at the trial, appellate and post-judgment level proceedings.

3. BUDGET.

Expenditures of the grant funds must adhere to the specific line items in the grantee's approved grant budget. Transfers among line items (increases and decreases) must be requested in writing and approved by the Foundation.

4. ACCOUNTING AND AUDIT.

Funds provided by the Foundation, together with any interest thereon, shall be accounted for seperately in teh grantees records and books of account. A systematic accounting record shall be kept by the grantee of the receipt and disbursement of funds and expenditures incurred under the terms of the grant, and the substantiating documents such as bills, invoices, canceled checks, and receipts shall be retained in the grantee's files for a period of not less than four (4) years after expiration of the grant period or, if an audit has been initiated and audit findings have not been resolved at the end of such four year period, the records shall be retained until resolution of all audit findings. The grantee agrees promptly to furnish the Foundation with copies of such documents upon the Foundation's request. The grantee agrees to make its books and records available to the Foundation at reasonable times. The Foundation, at its expense, may audit or have audited the books and records of the grantee insofar as they relate to the disposition of the funds granted by the Foundation, and the grantee shall provide all necessary assistance in connection therewith. The Foundation may request upon completion of the project a Financial and Compliance Audit (the "Audit"), complete with Management Letter and /or a Form 990, within one hundred twenty (120) days of grantee's fiscal year-end. In the event that grantee's fiscal year-end occurs prior to completion of the project, the Foundation may request an Audit and accompany Management Letter and / or Form 990 for each of the grantee's fiscal years occurring during the term of this grant.

5. REPORTS.

Narrative and financial reports shall be furnished by the grantee to the Foundation for each budget period of the grant and upon expiration, repayment (pursuant to Section 2F hereof), or termination of the grant (pursuant to Section 9 hereof). Such reports shall be furnished to the Foundation within a reasonable period of time, not to

exceed thirty (30) days after the close of the period for which such reports are made. The narrative report shall include a report on the progress made by the grantee towards achieving the grant purposes and any problems or obstacles encountered in the effort to achieve the grant purposes. The financial report shall show actual expenditures reported as of the date of the report against the approved line item budget. Such reports shall be retained in the grantee's files for a period of not less than four (4) years after expiration of the grant period. The Foundation may, at its expense, monitor and conduct an evaluation of operations under the grant, which may include visits by representatives of the Foundation to observe the grantee's program procedures and operators and to discuss the program with the grantee's personnel.

6. COPYRIGHT AND FOUNDATION USE OF DATA.

All copyright interests in materials produced as a result of this grant are owned by the grantee. The grantee hereby grants to the Foundation a nonexclusive, irrevocable, perpetual, royalty-free license to reproduce, publish, copy, alter, or otherwise use and to license others to use any and all such materials, including any and all data collected in connection with the grant in any and all forms in which said data are fixed.

7. PUBLIC REPORTING.

The Foundation will report this grant, if made, as it deems appropriate. The Foundation may issue press releases on individual grants, and, should the Foundation elect to do so, it would discuss the press release with the grantee in advance of dissemination. The grantee may issue its own press announcement but shall obtain in writing prior approval of the announcement from the Foundation before distribution. In addition, the grantee will be asked to review and approve a Program Summary briefly describing the grantee's activity which will be used by the Foundation to respond to inquiries and for other public information purposes. The grantee's approval shall not be unreasonably withheld. The grantee shall send to the Foundation's Communication Staff copies of all papers, manuscripts, and other information materials which it produces that are related to the project supported by the Foundation. Grantee shall acknowledge, to the extent feasible and appropriate, the Foundation's funding of the project in all annual reports, publications, bulletins, and public relations activities of the Grantee. The wording of the sign required hereunder shall be approved by the Foundation before construction and installation of said sign. Additionally, the Foundation will be entitled, at its sole option, to exclusive naming opportunities with respect to the project funded by the Foundation.

8. GRANTEE TAX STATUS.

Grantee warrants and represents that it is one of the following: (a) a tax exempt organization under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"), and is not a private foundation as defined in Section 509(a) of the Code, (b) a governmental unit referred to in Section 170(c)(1) of the Code, or (c) a college or university that is an agency or instrumentality of a government or political subdivision of a government, or owned or operated by the same, within the meaning of Section 511(a)(2)(B) of the Code. If grantee is a Section 501(c)(3) organization described in (a), Grantee has provided the Foundation with a copy of IRS determination letter(s) evidencing its status as an eligible grantee and Grantee warrants and represents that such determination letter(s) are currently in full force and effect. Regardless of Grantee; s current tax status, Grantee will notify the Foundation immediately of any actual or proposed change in tax status.

9. GRANT TERMINATION.

In the event of the occurrence of any of the following conditions, the Foundation shall have no obligation to make

further payments under the grant and such events shall serve as grounds for the Foundation, at its option, to terminate the grant in which case the provisions of Section 2.F. shall apply: (i) any use by the grantee of grant proceeds for any purpose other than those specified in Section 170(c)(2)(B) of the Internal Revenue Code; (ii) the grantee ceases to be exempt from federal income taxation as an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code; (iii) the grantee's status as not a private foundation under Section 509(a), its status as an exempt operating foundation under Section 4940(d)(2), or its status as a Section 170(c)(1) or Section 511(a)(2)(B) organization is materially altered; or (iv) in the Foundation's sole and absolute judgment, the grantee becomes unable to carry out the purposes of the grant, ceases to be an appropriate means of accomplishing the purpose of the grant, or fails to comply with any of the conditions hereof. If the grant is terminated prior to the scheduled completion date, the grantee shall, upon request by the Foundation, provide to the foundation a full accounting of the receipt and disbursement of funds and expenditures incurred under the grant as of the effective date of the termination.

11. NO ASSIGNMENT.

The grant may not be assigned or subcontracted to any other party by the grantee without the prior written approval of the Foundation.

12. NO JOINT VENTURE.

The grantee is performing services and duties with respect to the project as an independent contractor and not as an employee, agent, partner of, or joint venturer with the Foundation. The grantee provides, that as between the grantee and the Foundation, grantee is solely responsible for operation and management of the project funded hereunder and that the Foundation has not and will not be involved in any way in such operation and management. Grantee agrees to indemnify and hold harmless the Foundation from liability on account of any injuries, damages, actions, causes of actions, claims, suits, judgments, and costs, including court costs and attorneys' fees, (at the trial, appellate, post-judgment or bankruptcy procedure level) as a result of services performed or not performed, or any negligent act by the grantee arising out of or related to the project, the Foundation's funding of said project, or any action arising out of or related to this document.
