I. EXECUTIVE BRIEF
Motion and Title: Staff recommends motion to:
<b>A) Adopt</b> a Resolution authorizing the use of \$31,129 from the Pollution Recovery Trust Fund (PRTF) to purchase a low level mercury vapor analyzer.
<b>B) Approve</b> a budget transfer of \$31,129 in the Pollution Recovery Trust Fund to enable the purchase of the mercury vapor analyzer.
C) Approve a budget amendment of \$31,129 in the Fire Rescue MSTU Fund for the purchase of the mercury vapor analyzer.
<b>Summary:</b> This resolution will authorize the transfer of \$31,129 from the PRTF to the Fire-Rescue Department to be used to purchase a low level mercury vapor analyzer that will be used by the County's hazardous materials response teams in responding to mercury spills. The Palm Beach County Health Department supports the use of PRTF for this purpose as it will enable emergency response teams to accurately assess the extent of contamination as a result of mercury spills and make recommendations as to whether an area is safe for occupancy. <u>Countywide (SF)</u>
<b>Background and Justification:</b> Elemental mercury, a liquid at room temperature, can vaporize into the air. Mercury vapors are toxic, and pose a health threat at very low levels. As a neurotoxin, children and fetuses are more vulnerable to the exposure of mercury vapors as their nervous systems are still developing.
The hazardous materials response teams in Palm Beach County routinely respond to mercury spills in homes, businesses and public places, and will perform minor cleanup. However, the only method of assessing the effectiveness of the cleanup, and to determine if the area of the spill is safe for occupancy, is to measure the airborne levels of mercury vapor. This requires a very sensitive instrument because the mercury vapors are at very low concentrations. Presently, the Florida Department of Environmental Protection has three mercury vapor analyzers capable of such measurements that it provides for this purpose on a statewide basis. However, there may be a delay in getting one of the mercury vapor analyzers onsite especially if they are in use in other areas of the state. This delay ties up resources of the hazardous materials response teams.

### **Background And Justification (Continued):**

It is proposed that funds from the PRTF be used to purchase a mercury vapor analyzer that will be shared by the four hazardous materials response teams in Palm Beach County. The Palm Beach County Health Department supports this action for the public health and environmental benefits. Palm Beach County Fire-Rescue Department will purchase the analyzer and serve as custodian. The purchase will also include an extended warranty.

### **RESOLUTION NO. 09-**

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF PALM BEACH COUNTY, FLORIDA, AUTHORIZING THE FIRE-RESCUE DEPARTMENT TO UTILIZE FUNDS FROM THE POLLUTION RECOVERY TRUST FUND TO PURCHASE A LOW LEVEL MERCURY VAPOR ANALYZER FOR RESPONDING TO MERCURY SPILLS.

WHEREAS, on April 4, 1989, the Board of County Commissioners adopted Resolution No. R-89-576 which created the Palm Beach County Pollution Recovery Trust Fund for the purpose of receiving monies collected from environmental violations; and

WHEREAS, it is appropriate to utilize monies from the Palm Beach County Pollution Recovery Trust Fund for pollution control activities; and

WHEREAS, mercury is highly toxic affecting the nervous system and other organs, and thus exposure to mercury vapors poses a health threat; and

WHEREAS, pregnant woman and small children are most vulnerable to mercury exposure; and

WHEREAS, the hazardous materials teams in Palm Beach County respond to mercury spills in homes, businesses and public places; and

WHEREAS, it is desirable to determine mercury vapor concentrations after mitigation efforts to verify safe levels; and

WHEREAS, to verify safe levels it is necessary to use a special mercury vapor analyzer capable of accurate measurements at very low levels.

WHEREAS, it is desirable that the hazardous materials response teams of Palm Beach County have local access to a low level mercury vapor analyzer that will enable a more effective response to mercury spills and thus better public health protection.

Whereas the Director of the Palm Beach County Health Department recommends that \$31,129 from the Pollution Recovery Trust Fund be used by the Palm Beach County Fire-Rescue Department to purchase a low level mercury vapor analyzer that will be shared by the county's hazardous material teams in responding to mercury spills.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF PALM BEACH COUNTY, FLORIDA, THAT:

Section 1: The foregoing recitals are herby adopted and ratified.

Section 2: The Board hereby authorizes the Clerk and Comptroller to transfer \$31,129 from the Palm Beach County Pollution Control Trust Fund to the Fire-Rescue Department to purchase a low level mercury vapor analyzer.

Our committee meets quarterly to discuss and review the regional hazardous responses within Palm Beach County. For some time now the four hazardous materials team coordinators have brought up the subject of mercury spills in homes, businesses and public places. When a team responds for a mercury spill the public is usually aware of the high levels of toxicity associated with mercury.

The responders are generally put under pressure to mitigate the situation with citizens and public officials wanting to know how long before the building can be reoccupied, and if it's safe to go back in the building.

The hazardous materials teams will do minor cleanup using commercially available spill kits but have all expressed concern about the inability to verify that mercury vapor levels, if present, are below the EPA Region IV action guidelines. Presently none of the four teams have the instrumentation to quantitatively verify mercury vapor concentrations, nor do they have the funding to acquire the instrumentation.

In conversation with Al Grasso regarding this issue, he mentioned a pollution control trust fund that may provide funding for such instrumentation. The Palm Beach County Hazardous Materials Oversight Committee is respectfully requesting your consideration in this matter regarding the health and welfare of Palm Beach County's citizens.
