I. EXECUTIVE BRIEF

Motion and Title: Staff recommends motion to A) Approve acceptance of the Office of Justice Programs FY 09 Family Drug Courts Program Grant (2009-DC-BX-0115) in the amount of \$484,907 for the period of October 01, 2009 to September 30, 2012; B) Authorize the County Administrator or his designee to execute all related documents and contracts related to this grant on behalf of the Board of County Commissioners; C) Approve a budget amendment of \$206,838 in the Family Drug Court Grant Fund to establish FY 2010 grant budget; and D) Approve the addition of a grant funded Family Drug Court Coordinator position pay grade (30) in the complement.

Summary: The Division of Justice Services, in conjunction with the Department of Children and Families (DCF) Substance Abuse and Mental Health Office applied for and was awarded a grant from the Office of Justice Programs in the amount of \$484,907 to develop a Family Drug Court program. The Family Drug Court, which will use the existing network of service providers, will address substance abuse and other issues affecting the parents and their children in new dependency petitions. It will offer a comprehensive and systematic approach to the treatment of substance abuse problems of parents while limiting the risk of physical and emotional harm to children with the ultimate goal of family reunification. Over the three years, grant funds will be used to pay for a Family Drug Court Coordinator position (\$183,547); training expenses (\$36,660); reimburse DCF in the development of the Service Internet Referral Portal (SIRP), a web based service referral system (\$50,000); enhance the Justice Services Information System (JSIS) to link with SIRP (\$10,000); reimburse Drug Abuse Foundation to link with SIRP and JSIS (\$10,000); psychological assessments of participants (\$67,500); random drug testing (\$69,300); incentive for participants (\$36,000); program review and evaluation (\$14,400); and office supplies (\$7,500). The grant funded position will be approved for the length of the grant and will be eliminated when the grant funding is discontinued. The grant does not require any County cash match; however an in-kind match of 25% is required which will be met by The Center for Family Services, a partner agency. Countywide (GB).

Background and Policy Issues: Child abuse and neglect and substance abuse are inextricably intertwined. An estimated 40%-80% of the 3 million children who come to the attention of the child welfare system each year live in families with alcohol or drug problems, according to numerous surveys of child welfare agencies nationwide. Project Abstract

Palm Beach County seeks to address their leading cause for children entering out-of-home care, child maltreatment linked to parental substance abuse, by the implementation of a Family Drug Court. The targeted population is identified as Palm Beach County residents who are the parent(s) of children in new dependency petitions wherein an evidenced-based screening tool has identified substance abuse as an issue. Activities that will be implemented to achieve the project's goals and objectives are provision of immediate and continuous court intervention that requires participants to participate in evidence based treatment, submit to frequent random drug testing, appear at regular court status hearings, and comply with other court conditions geared to accountability, rehabilitation, long-term sobriety and cessation of criminal activity. Palm Beach County will build upon an existing network of well established collaborations to ensure provision of wrap-around custom tailored services for parents and children, cross agency and interdisciplinary training for the Family Drug Court Team and ongoing data sharing and analysis. Progress toward reaching the project's goals will be measured by systematic data collection, an enhanced Management Information System, ongoing feedback from participants and stakeholders, pre-and post test surveys and well-developed outputs and outcomes.

Statement of the Problem

Child abuse and neglect and substance abuse are inextricably intertwined. An estimated 40%-80% of the 3 million children who come to the attention of the child welfare system each year live in families with AOD problems, according to numerous surveys of child welfare agencies nationwide.¹ Approximately 1 million of these children are confirmed to be abused or

neglected. According to the National Child Abuse and Neglect Data System, more than three children die each day-more than 1,100 each year-as a result of abuse and neglect.

In Florida, during 2007/2008, the Department of Children and Families, Family Safety Office investigated 187,115 cases of suspected child maltreatment. On average more than one-fifth (20.45%) of the total allegations reported involved parental substance misuse. Substance misuse was substantiated 14,487 times statewide. Despite these numbers, only 10,120 parents involved in the Child Welfare System were admitted into substance abuse treatment services.

In Palm Beach County, during 2007/2008, 17.71% of reported cases involved substance misuse in a typical month, though certain months ranged as high as 20.77%. A review of Palm Beach County Child Welfare cases reveals that, upon completion of the investigation, 600 allegations (14.47%) were found to be confirmed cases of maltreatment due to alcohol and/or other drugs. Despite these numbers, only 283 cases resulted in referrals to substance abuse treatment and out of those, it is unknown how many actually complete treatment. Substance misuse was also the overriding reason for children entering out-of-home care (39.8% of those cases).

The Adoption Assistance and Child Welfare Act (AACWA) in 1980 and the Adoption and Safe Families Act (ASFA) in 1997, increased the emphasis on reducing lengths of stay for children in out-of-home care. Both AACWA and ASFA placed requirements for child welfare professionals to ensure timely permanency for children². The most consistent factor in the literature is the impact of parental substance abuse on the likelihood of reunification. The child welfare system, as dictated by ASFA may not allow for sufficient time for substance abusing

parents to overcome their addictions. More collaboration between the child welfare system and substance abuse systems could result in more timely and aggressive treatment options for parents that may result in faster reunifications³. The presence of substance abuse creates an increased need for strong partnerships between the child welfare agency, the court, and other community service providers (CWLA 2001). Alliances with other agencies, especially substance abuse providers, must be formed to provide participants access to recovery, including the ability to link data systems to exchange information electronically.

In 2004, the Circuit 15 Department of Children and Families, Substance Abuse and Mental Health (SAMH) Program Office initiated steps to formalize relationships between substance abuse services and child welfare staff to address child maltreatment linked to substance abuse. In 2007, the Child Welfare Substance Abuse Network (CWSA) Network was formed with the ability to collect and analyze local data, allowing for individualized, culturally competent and evidence-based provision of services. The next logical step to reduce substance abuse related child maltreatment in Palm Beach County is to create a Family Drug Court (FDC) to further offer a comprehensive systemic approach to treating substance-abusing parents, while maintaining the goal of reunification and meeting the requirements of the AFSA. "Drug courts are a vital, essential element of our National Drug Control Strategy. While offering incentives to stay off drugs, they hold individuals accountable and simultaneously deal with the deadly disease of addiction. America is better off because of drug courts." By affording substance-abusing parents an opportunity for family reunification with support and treatment, family dependency

treatment courts decrease the risk of physical and emotional harm to children, ultimately saving child welfare dollars. Our community is committed to taking the steps necessary to further integrate the services of substance abuse evaluation and treatment with child welfare professionals at a personal, organizational, and systems level. The Drug Abuse Foundation, as the lead agency, remains co-located with child investigations and supervision, to assess and refer individuals into an array of substance abuse services which have been designed to meet the needs of the demographic profile.

Impact/Outcomes and Evaluation/Performance Measure Data Collection Plan

In an effort to decrease the incidence of childhood abuse and neglect, intervene in the family risk factors, and reduce the likelihood of negative outcomes for children by addressing the substance abuse of parents and providing services to their children, Palm Beach County proposes to develop and establish a Family Drug Court for parents with substance abuse problems in the child welfare system. The following goal and objectives have been identified:

Through the implementation of the Palm Beach County Family Drug Court, designed to include the use of evidenced based practices and facilitate data collection, child abuse and neglect will be reduced among the program participants. The program goal, objectives and performance measures are inclusive of the grant's mandatory reporting requirements. In order to measure results, data will be collected and entered into the Management Information System by the Family Drug Court Coordinator and analyzed by the Program Evaluator.

Project/Program Design and Implementation

Collaborative Planning

Project planning was geared towards creating an interdisciplinary, coordinated, and systemic approach to working with youth and their families involved in Dependency Court Page 5 of 30

proceedings. The workgroup included representatives of state, county, local, and community-based agencies which would provide support for the program and/or be affected by its operation. Pursuant to a needs analysis, utilizing data from Child Welfare and the SAMH Office of the Department of Children and Families, the workgroup evolved into a Planning Team which sought to design the required components of a Family Drug Court (FDC).

Participants included in the Planning Team were: a representative from the Department of Children and Families Office of SAMH, the Palm Beach County Director of Justice Services, the Unified Family Court Operations Manager, the Delinquency Drug Court Coordinator, the Director of Child and Family Connections (Community Based Care Provider), community treatment representatives, a representative from the Health Care District of Palm Beach County, the Director of the Guardian Ad Litem's Office, attorneys for parents and children involved in the child welfare system, judges, the Housing Partnership of Palm Beach County, the Adult Drug Court Coordinator, faith based partners, the school district and an experienced independent evaluator of evidence based practices.

Significant milestones included identification of existing resources and partnerships, identification of need for program, formation of a consensus regarding program design, mission, target population, eligibility criteria, phases, treatment modalities, program evaluation, sustainability, data collection, identification of MIS, team members, expansion of planning team, formation of implementation committee and identification of advisory board membership.

The formulation of community partnerships has resulted in a long term commitment to this project. In order to promote effective collaboration, information sharing among team members will be endorsed by using consent waivers and Memoranda of Understanding among members,

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and by defining roles and responsibilities of members to provide for ongoing broad-based interdisciplinary planning.

The expertise of the FDC team members is critical to the success of families entering the program. Cross-agency training will begin during the planning stage, continue through implementation and be on-going thereafter, as it is essential to this interdisciplinary approach. Local efforts are already underway as part of the Criminal Justice Mental Health and Substance Abuse Strategic Plan. Team members and interested stakeholders will attend National Association of Drug Court Professionals (NADCP) training events; take courses on subjects such as the child welfare system, child development, cultural competency, substance abuse treatment, dual diagnosis, pharmacology, ethics, confidentiality and the court process, which will be provided by local and national experts.

Substance misuse is the leading cause for child removal in Palm Beach County. The Department of Children and Families referred an average of 1758 parents for Substance Abuse Evaluation between the years of 2006 and 2008, with an average of 1226 individuals assessed. According to the DAF (Drug Abuse Foundation) of Palm Beach County, the specific drugs of choice in Palm Beach County are cocaine, alcohol, and marijuana. Sixty one percent of those referred for evaluation are identified as between the ages of 18 and 30. Over sixty-six percent are white females. Thirty-six percent have less than a twelfth grade education. Nineteen percent have a co-occurring disorder.

Target Population, Screening, and Eligibility

To define the target population, the planning team reviewed child welfare and substance abuse treatment data from Palm Beach County for patterns of substance use (including type of

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substance abused) for parents involved in the child welfare system. In addition, workgroup members identified profiles of potential participants from within these data sets and focused on community problems (i.e. child maltreatment, entry into foster care system, juvenile delinquency, crime, etc.) associated with this population. The target population was ultimately defined as "Palm Beach County residents who are the parent(s) of children in new dependency petitions wherein an evidenced based screening tool has identified substance abuse as an issue." Further eligibility requires that the primary goal for the family must be reunification, the parent(s) must admit to the abuse/neglect allegation(s) and case jurisdiction must be in Palm Beach County. (Disqualifiers include parents who are alleged sexual perpetrators, are incompetent, suffer from an un-stabilized mental disorder (e.g., paranoia, hallucinations, delusions, mania, lack of medical stabilization, failure to follow medical regime, or other functional impairment that would inhibit effective program participation), have an advanced terminal illness, have a history of violent or criminal offenses, or are on methadone maintenance.)

Screening for Family Drug Court participants occurs early on in the process. Once a Child Protective Investigator responds to a suspected child abuse/neglect allegation, (s)he will begin the process of determining potential eligibility. The initial screening tool utilized is the "CAGE", an instrument developed for child welfare workers to identify alcohol or other drug involvement. If substance abuse/use is identified as an issue in the child maltreatment, the parent(s) will be referred to the Drug Abuse Foundation and will receive a substance abuse evaluation within 72 hours. Once it is determined that the abuse/neglect allegation warrants removal of the children and/or court involvement, the Department of Children and Families will hold a multi-disciplinary staffing wherein the case is discussed, needs identified, legal

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sufficiency is determined and the case is prepared for a court hearing and for transfer to the Community Based Care Provider/Dependency Case Manager. The FDC Coordinator will be present at this staffing in order to identify participants. If it is decided that the family is appropriate, the FDC Coordinator and Dependency Case manager together will make contact with the family (within 48 hours) to further determine eligibility and interest.

The average length of time between the substantiation of the case by child welfare and the first appearance in court (shelter hearing) is twenty-four hours; Dependency Petitions must be filed within twenty one days. Within ten days of the Shelter Hearing, the parent(s) must attend mediation, wherein their initial case plan is developed and they have an opportunity to consent to or deny the allegations in the shelter petition. The Arraignment Hearing occurs within twenty eight days of the family's first appearance in court. This hearing allows the consent or denial of the abuse/neglect allegations to be officially entered with the court. The participant's first appearance in FDC will occur at the next FDC docket following the Arraignment, as legal consent to the allegations is necessary for participation in the Family Drug Court. At the initial FDC hearing, the participants will receive an orientation. They will already have received an initial substance abuse evaluation. Enrollment in treatment will occur prior to the next FDC Docket one week later, if it has not already occurred.

The FDC targeted capacity of 100 participants over a three year period was established following analysis of: the caseload for the two FDC dependency case managers (determined by utilizing the Child Welfare League of America's caseload ratios for workers in child welfare program areas); the FDC Coordinator's workload; the availability of the Judge and the Drug Court Team; available resources (such as treatment capacity and ancillary services).

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Clinical Assessment and Service Delivery

Clinical assessment of participants will occur on various levels. When it is determined that substance abuse is an issue, Child Welfare clients are referred to the Drug Abuse Foundation (DAF) for a comprehensive substance abuse and mental health assessment (SAMHA). DAF will perform key activities including making contact with the participant: within 24 hours of the referral (Referral Facilitation); prior to the assessment appointment (Assessment Facilitation); after the assessment appointment (to increase the number of participants who will actually enroll in the treatment modality that was recommended at the time of their assessment, guided by ASAM (American Society of Addiction Medicine) placement criteria) (Enrollment Facilitation); upon enrollment in a specified treatment modality (to remove social barriers and obstacles that might otherwise impede or disrupt the treatment process thereby causing the participant to not enter treatment, to terminate treatment prematurely and/or to be discharged from treatment unsuccessfully) (Treatment Facilitation); post treatment which can last up to 90 days (to support the participant in reintegrating back into the community while supporting them in their recovery and assisting them in working to preventing future relapse)(Aftercare Facilitation). Further definition of the levels of care and treatment structure that FCD participants may receive are outlined in the chart below:

Once the participant has entered treatment abstained from the consuming alcohol and/or drugs for two weeks, a comprehensive battery of psychological assessment procedures may be administered by a psychologist in the Court Psychology Office (as determined by the Family Drug Court Team). The psychological assessment procedures include a review of available records, a clinical interview, and personality measures such as the Minnesota Multiphasic Personality Inventory- Second Edition (MMPI-2) or the Millon Clinical Multiaxial Inventory-Third Edition (MCMC-III), a child abuse risk assessment and parenting capacity measures. Data obtained from the evaluations will provide therapeutic direction in the development of individualized treatment plans and specific information regarding behavioral strengths and weaknesses, cognitive level, level of structure and supervision, identification of faulty coping mechanisms and underlying dysfunctional attitudes, beliefs and values. Court Psychology will also be available to perform assessment on the children in order to customize service referral.

Within 30 days of enrollment in treatment, the participant and family will complete a Social Needs Assessment, which will identify issues and setting focal priorities in order to remove social obstacles and barriers and ensure the participant's successful completion of treatment. Within 45 days, issues identified in the Social Needs Assessment will be addressed by

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developing an Episode of Care Plan, which will detail the services that will be provided to the participant according to the identified needs.

Participants in need of medical/dental assistance will be referred to/served by the Palm Beach County Health Care District, who will assist in the application for Medicaid. Mental health needs of adults and children requiring psychiatric attention may be referred to/served by South County Mental Health Center, the Chrysalis Center, and Parent Child Center.

A science-based, educational program will be made available to families in the FDC, to assist parents in identifying realistic parenting expectations and positive parenting strategies.

Services for Parents:

The Child Welfare Substance Abuse (CWSA) Network is comprised of eight community-based substance abuse programs contracted by the Department of Children and Families to provide an array of substance abuse services to individuals and families involved in the Child Welfare System. Services provided by CWSA members are co-occurring capable according to the Comprehensive Continuous Integrated System of Care (CCISC) model developed by Dr. Kenneth Minkoff and Dr. Christie Cline, and referenced in the Policy Paper on Co-occurring Mental Health and Substance Abuse Disorders in 2002. Individualized treatment plans are developed on the comprehensive bio-psycho-social assessments conducted in accordance with Chapter 65D-30, Florida Administrative Code and will be gender-appropriate, culturally competent inclusive of evidence-based interventions. Oversight and compliance monitoring are conducted annually by the local Department of Children and Families Program Office. A Memorandum of Understanding (attached) formalized the partnership and outlines each agency's

commitment of service provision and cross-system training. Treatment providers that will be used to deliver services and the specific interventions utilized are as follows:

The Drug Abuse Foundation of Palm Beach County, Inc. (DAF): provides residential medical detoxification, residential and outpatient substance abuse services to individuals and families; provides evidence based substance abuse prevention services (Matrix Model, Strengthening Families, Children Program Kit and All Stars).

Center for Family Services, Inc.: provides an extensive array of substance abuse and mental health outpatient individual and group services. The agency has committed to provide additional family counseling services inclusive of early childhood development issues, as in-kind match for the Family Drug Court; utilizes Client-Directed, Outcome-Informed therapy, CBT, MET and Motivational Interviewing techniques.

Comprehensive Alcoholism Rehabilitation Programs, Inc.: operations include a total of 175 available beds in the medical detoxification and residential programs, a homeless assessment center and outpatient treatment services for individuals and families. The agency employs Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) and Motivational Enhancement Therapy (MET).

<u>Drug Abuse Treatment Association, Inc.</u>: provides residential and individual and group outpatient services for youth and their families; family-based, in-home substance abuse services and adolescent residential level II treatment; serves as a link to the school system through Project Success, an evidence based substance abuse intervention program.

Gratitude House, Inc.: is a non-profit, accredited, community-based substance abuse treatment center specializing in treating the chemically dependent female with a special focus on women with children. Their primary responsibility to the Network is the provision of residential and

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outpatient services for women and infants, as well as educational and support for the entire family. The agency utilizes Motivational Interviewing techniques and the Stages of Change Model., in addition to CBT and MET interventions.

Housing Partnership, Inc: provides assistance obtaining and maintaining housing for first time homeowners, after-school programs, supportive housing for the mentally ill and individuals struggling with addictions; and family strengthening and empowerment services.

Oakwood Center of the Palm Beaches, Inc.: operates the "Panda Program", a long-term, Residential Level II substance abuse treatment facility for women and their children up to the age of five. Therapeutic interventions include Stages of Change Model, CBT, MET and Motivational Interviewing techniques.

Wayside House, Inc.: is a 23 bed professional residential and outpatient treatment center serving women with underlying mental health issues. The agency recently opened the Cocoon Center, an outpatient therapeutic environment providing individual and group therapy for children of addicted parents.

<u>Family Preservation Services, Inc.</u>: Individual and family therapeutic interventions, i.e., assessment, outpatient individual, group and family therapy, are available for primary mental health related issues. The agency's therapists are trained in CBT and MET models.

Services for Children:

A culturally competent, comprehensive case plan inclusive of all therapeutic and social support services identified through clinical assessment will be developed for children in the Family Drug Court. Services are available through the following agencies:

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<u>Center of Family Services:</u> provides services through the Home Instruction Program for Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY) and the SAFE Kids Program, a specialized treatment program for child victims of sexual and other forms of abuse, and their families.

<u>Federation of Families of Palm Beach County Inc.</u>: provides parent advocate training, Strengthening Families programming and respite services.

Oakwood Center of the Palm Beaches, Inc.: has a comprehensive system of care for children with severe emotional disturbance and their families. Psychiatric assessment, medication monitoring, targeted case management, and outpatient individual, group and family counseling is available in addition to an in-patient crisis unit. Therapeutic interventions include_CBT, MET, Motivational Interviewing and Trauma Focused approaches.

Parent Child Center: the largest, comprehensive therapeutic center for children and families in Palm Beach County. The agency will provide psychological and psychiatric assessments, mediation management, targeted case management, outpatient individual, group and family therapy. The agency utilizes a Trauma Focused approach and is currently implementing Triple P, an evidence-based parenting program for early prevention and intervention activities.

Services for Families

Recovery support services will be provided through collaboration with Workforce Development who will provide educational, vocational, job preparation and mentoring. Incidental funding will be used to assist with child care and transportation. Permanent, affordable housing will be provided through The Housing Partnership, Inc, a CWSA Network provider. As in-kind match for the FDC, the Center for Family Services will provide the

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Families Achieving Solutions Together (FAST) program, home-based family therapy to families who are under stress and need prevention strategies and early intervention.

Child and Family Connections, Palm Beach County's community based care provider, will dedicate two Dependency Case Managers who will provide primary oversight of the case plan. In line with best practices, the FDC Dependency Case Managers will maintain a 1-15 case load per the Child Welfare League of America's identified best practices.

Non-traditional, wrap-around services are available to support participants in their recovery and ultimately ensure the safety of the children. The SAMH Program Office has committed the CWSA Network to the success of the Family Drug Court. Through the CWSA Network, \$40,000 annually has been allocated to provide additional recovery support services to eliminate the barriers for participation in services.

Program Design and Length

The FDC, consisting of weekly dockets, will be structured around the post-adjudication stage. The anticipated average length of participation, which will commence upon the parent's agreement to participate, will be twelve months in an effort to comply with ASFA requirements.

Participants will be monitored in a five phase program for twelve months. Not all participants will enter in Phase I as phase assignment will be determined by the initial assessment(s) and treatment recommendations. Upon program graduation, participants continue with an aftercare program and the FDC will continue to monitor each participant for up to twelve months. Goals, expectations, and requirements for phase advancement are in the chart below:

The requirements for successful program completion are: negative drug test results for ninety days, completion of all phases and requirements, consistent attendance at all court appearances and treatment team appointments, successful compliance with case plan tasks, and completion of all after care recommendations. Participant's withdrawal, non-compliance with FDC and/or their treatment facility or with requirements that comprise each phase warrants consideration for discharge.

The FDC will be integrated into the dependency court process by early identification and screening, provision of wrap around services for the participants and children, frequent judicial supervision and compliance with all requirements as mandated by Florida Statute 39. By working parallel with the family's case plan the program will promote timely efforts to move children toward their permanency plan and will be in full compliance with the Adoption and Safe Families Act (AFSA) timeframes. Additionally, the FDC Judge will preside over any other open Page 19 of 30

cases (criminal, juvenile delinquency, family, probate, etc.) involving the family in an attempt to provide just and timely resolution of all matters before the court.

Judicial Supervision

Court appearance frequency is established at program commencement as determined by the initial assessment(s), treatment recommendations and Drug Court phases. Modifications may be made to the frequency of court appearances based on the progress of the participant. Exemplary participation and/or advancement to a subsequent phase may result in longer intervals between hearings, as agreed upon by the Drug Court team. Consequently, non-compliance with treatment and/or program regulations may result in an increase in scheduled appearances.

Court appearances will be specified by phase assignment. Participants receiving inpatient treatment will appear in court monthly during residential treatment (Phase I), weekly for 1 month (Phase II), bi-monthly for 1 month (Phase III), and once a month for 2 months (Phase IV). Participants receiving outpatient treatment appear in court weekly for two months (Phase I), bi-weekly for two months (Phase II), once a month for two months (Phase III), and once a month for three months.

The Family Drug Court team will convene weekly, prior to court hearings, to conduct staffings, wherein team members will report on and review the progress of participants. These staffings are an open forum to exchange detailed information and make decisions and/or recommendations regarding phase advancement and rewards and sanctions in preparation for Drug Court hearings. Information presented and discussed at the staffing will be maintained in the Drug Court database. Drug Court team members will be also be present at the FDC hearings.

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Drug Testing

Random urinalysis will be conducted by Drug Testing and Counseling Services, Inc. (DTCS), who provides urinalysis services throughout Palm Beach County, including at the Palm Beach County Courthouse, allowing for on-site testing. The agency utilizes the Simon Twin analyzer, from Dade-Behring Inc. The initial testing and confirmation incorporates the federally approved EMIT protocol. An observed chain of custody procedure is implemented with each sample collected and processed by gender specific trained collectors. To ensure the integrity of the test, each sample is collected in a leak proof container with the participant's information printed on the container and sealed with the participant's information including a bar code for identification. Each sample is placed in a secure refrigerator in a locked room with access granted to lab employees only.

The turnaround time for results varies between one and twenty four hours. Routine testing will include a multi-panel test including: Marijuana (THC), Cocaine, Amphetamines /Methamphetamines, Opiates, Benzodiazepines, but can be altered based on participant's history or local usage trends.

Incentives and Sanctions

A range of sanctions or rewards based on program compliance will be utilized at each hearing. In developing these sanctions and rewards, consideration was given to research that demonstrates that these are effective for parents of children in dependency actions. The table below summarizes compliant and non-compliant behaviors and the corresponding rewards and sanctions.

The Judge assigns the reward or sanction based upon the level of compliance or non-compliance. The number of previous sanctions and the participant's current phase level will be considered. Participant's non-compliance with FDC and/or their treatment facility warrants consideration for program discharge after appropriate engagement attempts have been made. All non-compliant events should be addressed and a sanction should be applied in order to reinforce the participant's belief in natural consequences which enhance the effect of the behavior modification system. Conversely, the court will take care to acknowledge and reward compliant behavior.

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Management Information System and Evaluation

The Family Drug Court will adapt the Palm Beach County Drug Court module of the Justice Services Information System, which currently serves their Adult and Delinquency Drug Courts. It is a desktop application, developed using the Microsoft Technologies Windows Application (VB.NET 2.0), ASP.NET 2.0, .NET Console Application. The system gets a daily feed of electronic drug test results from the testing agency. A Web Application (web site) is made available to treatment agencies to enter participants' treatment notes and assessments. Court appointments, AA/NA visits (submitted & due) and rewards and sanctions, as well as a history of all FDC phases are tracked. Information needed for operational decision-making, ongoing case management, program monitoring and useful evaluation is captured.

Data sharing will be addressed by educating all stakeholders involved in the drug court's operations about relevant confidentiality regulations and how to address these requirements through appropriate waivers. HIPAA allows data to be shared for program evaluation purposes through Memorandum of Agreement (MOA) signed by all systems, showing agreement to participate in the evaluation and willingness to share data. Participants will be asked to sign release forms for data-sharing, which will include agreement to share court, child welfare, and treatment data for evaluation purposes. The necessary consent forms, waiver forms and MOA's will be reviewed by the County Attorney's Office to ensure that local, state and federal confidentiality guidelines will be met.

Data will be captured during the initial screening process, weekly, in court. Internet applications are available to treatment providers, clinical assessors and drug testing agencies to enter participant progress and drug screen results in real time. Progress Reports will be

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submitted on a quarterly basis. For Family Dependency Drug Courts, Florida requires the following Critical Data Elements: total number of persons offered participation in drug court; number of eligible persons who were not admitted to the program and reason for non-admission, along with demographics (i.e. age, sex, race/ethnicity); characteristics of persons admitted to the program, including: age, gender, race/ethnicity, criminal history (including all prior felony and misdemeanor convictions and adjudications withheld), case disposition type, drug(s) of choice, number of dependent children, number of reunifications, including the number of children involved for each participant; amount of time to permanency; number of drug-free babies born annually; costs of drug court operations, and the source(s) of funding for each operational component.

To enhance the FDC information system, a link to DCF's Services Referral Internet Portal (SIRP) will be established. This interface will allow for direct automated referrals to treatment providers as well as instant court access to the current status of those referrals and their results. Moreover, the system will generate reports on the success rates of referrals at the case manager, supervisory, and administrative level. This will improve provider scrutiny ensuring participants see the most effective and responsive providers while also ensuring internal staff accountability. Since every part of the system (court, provider, and case management,) will have access to the system, all parties will operate with a common language and data.

The Palm Beach County Family Drug Court will be jointly operated by Palm Beach County Justice Services and the 15th Judicial Circuit Court Administration, similar to their Adult Felony Drug Court and Delinquency Drug Courts. The Family Drug Court Coordinator will be

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managed by the Director of Justice Services, who works in tandem with the Administrative Office of the Court regarding the operation of all Drug Courts.

An interdisciplinary, non-adversarial work team will be developed by identifying the key stakeholders and developing layers of support, starting with a policy level advisory board consisting of top level policy makers in stakeholder agencies. The policy board will meet regularly during planning and implementation, then quarterly to review progress. These policy makers will ensure appointment of interested staff to participate as Family Drug Court Team members.

The Family Drug Court Team will have weekly staff meetings, which will be attended by the Judge, the Family Drug Court Coordinator, Community Based Care's Dependency Case Manager, the participants' attorneys, the child's attorney (if in foster care), the Guardian Ad Litem, the treatment providers and any other entity that the team feels is appropriate. These meetings will be the means for preparing the weekly drug court sessions. There will also be a monthly meeting, which will include the above named team members. These meetings will be used to assess the status, needs, and progress of the participants, as well as any programmatic concerns or changes.

The Family Drug Court Team will have the following well defined roles:

Family Drug Court Judge: The Judge leads the FDC Team and supervises and reinforces treatment by reviewing reports from the Family Drug Court Coordinator and Dependency Case Managers and discussing treatment obstacles with the Team/participant(s) during the frequent court appearances/staffings. The judge assumes the role of both task master and cheerleader by applying rewards and sanctions. In this setting, the Judge is able to reward successes, and

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provide additional motivation. Conversely, the Judge can sanction noncompliance, thereby discouraging failure.

Family Drug Court Coordinator: This position provides the critical link between the participant, the treatment provider, and the court. The FDC Coordinator is responsible for: offering the program to the parents, attending staffing and court hearings prior to entry to FDC, progress monitoring, crisis and therapeutic intervention, advocating for the participant, and keeping the participant motivated to treatment and recovery throughout the long FDC process. The FDC Coordinator will submit reports to the court containing treatment progress, health issues, housing issues, employment issues, and dependent children's issues. The Family Drug Court Coordinator will assist in preparing and reviewing the plan with the participants and their attorneys. The Family Drug Court Coordinator will staff cases weekly with other team members including; DCF investigators, dependency case managers, treatment representatives, social service representatives and any other involved party.

Community Based Care Provider, Child and Family Connections: Child and Family Connections provides two Dependency Case Managers dedicated to Family Drug Court. Dependency Case Managers are responsible for developing and managing all aspects of the case plan.

Attorneys: The role of the *participants*' attorneys in FDC is to advocate and support to the participant's FDC goals. Attorneys should encourage the participant to continue to cooperate in the court and in treatment, but support sanctions when warranted and necessary. The role of the *child's* attorney is to represent and advocate for foster children in court matters and to ensure that they are receiving the appropriate social and educational services.

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Guardian Ad Litem: The Guardian Ad Litem advocates for and represents the best interests of children in court. They have frequent contact with the children to whom they are appointed and will be an integral part of the Drug Court Team.

Community Substance Abuse Treatment Providers: FDC refers participant(s) to community substance abuse treatment facilities that are licensed by the State of Florida and agree to work within FDC's program guidelines. The relationship between FDC, the court, and treatment providers is essential to program delivery. The treatment providers provide reports to the Family Drug Court Coordinator (via the JSIS MIS) that are submitted to the court. The Family Drug Court Coordinator will keep in constant communication with participants' primary counselors to discuss treatment progress and planning and to identify treatment barriers and facilitate solutions. Education Liaison: The Court Education Liaison will make referrals to the School Based Team for ongoing support at the school site and will report weekly on the youth (behavior/referrals, attendance, grades, participation, etc.). Referrals for services (i.e. tutoring), special programs and information will be provided to the youth and his/her family about educational matters, including registration, re-enrollment and transition, as well as school clubs and activities. The Education Liaison will attend and participate in all staffings and hearings.

Capabilities/Competencies

Palm Beach County has the experience and capability to effectively implement and manage this effort. The Adult Felony Drug Court, established in 1998, was designed with a Bureau of Justice Assistance Planning Grant, and implemented with a Bureau of Justice Assistance Implementation grant. It subsequently became a Mentor Court, visited and consulted with by dozens of other programs from around the country and South America in their planning stages.

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Our success is the basis of our contention that the funds currently being sought will result in a similar successful outcome.

Similarly, our contractors have had successful ventures. The Child Welfare Substance Abuse Network is comprised of eight community based substance abuse programs contracted by the Department of Children and Families to provide an array of substance abuse services to individuals and families involved in the Child Welfare System. A Memorandum of Understanding (attached) formalized the partnership and outlines each agency's commitment of service provision.

The Drug Abuse Foundation of Palm Beach County, Inc. (DAF) (1968) is the lead agency responsible for the assessment, referral, linkage and on-going case management for the Network. The Executive Director (for 21 years) has extensive experience managing federal, state and county grants. The agency's 2009/2010 annual operating budget is \$7,606,865.00.

Comprehensive Alcoholism Rehabilitation Programs, Inc.'s operations include a total of 175 available beds in the medical detoxification and residential programs, a homeless assessment center and outpatient treatment services for individuals and families. The Executive Director and CEO, has 29 years experience managing federal, state and county grants. The agency's 2009-2010 annual operating budget is \$8,000,000.00

Center for Family Services, Inc., (1961) is responsible to the Network for an extensive array of substance abuse and mental health outpatient services. The agency's Executive Director since 1998, has trained with the World Bank and was an Advisor to the Governor on all matters of Exchange Control for the Central Bank of Belize.

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Drug Abuse Treatment Association, Inc., (1966), is a non-profit, community-based substance abuse, service provider specializing in services for youth and their families. Their primary responsibility to the Network will be the provision of family-based, in-home substance abuse services and adolescent residential services. The President and CEO, has led the agency since 1993 and has vast experience managing federal, state and county grants. The agency is CARF accredited and has an annual operating budget of \$6,000,000.

Gratitude House, Inc., is a non-profit, accredited, community-based substance abuse treatment center specializing in treating the chemically dependent woman with a special focus on women with children. Their primary responsibility to the Network is the provision of residential and outpatient services for women and infants, as well as educational and support for the entire family. The Executive Director has twenty-one years of experience in the chemical dependency field with experience in both direct service and administration, including the administration of Federal grants.

Housing Partnership, Inc., (formed 1986), provides assistance obtaining and maintaining housing for first time homeowners, after-school programs, supportive housing for the mentally ill and individuals struggling with addictions, and family strengthening and empowerment services. The Executive Director (10 years) and manages \$13,000,000 annually.

Oakwood Center of the Palm Beaches, Inc. is a comprehensive mental health center that operates the "Panda Program", a residential substance abuse treatment facility for women and their children up to the age of five. The program is part of a comprehensive behavioral health center that has been providing services to adult, families, adolescents and children of central, northern and western Palm Beach County since 1970. The Executive Director is a member of the Florida

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
Council and manages all aspects of the comprehensive behavioral health center and oversees the \$27,000,000 annual budget.

Sustainability Plan

Long term sustainability for the Family Drug Court will be assured through demonstrating the effectiveness and accountability of resources. As evidenced by the vast number of collaborating system partners and elected officials, Palm Beach County is committed to sustaining the Family Drug Court. As the majority of services for participants are carved out of state and county funding or provided as in-kind match, services, cross system training and evaluation activities will be in place and sustainable through Memorandums of Agreement with system partners, leaving only the salaried position in jeopardy. County and state resources are being pursued to fully fund, and based on expected success of the project; expand the number of staff dedicated to ensuring the Palm Beach County Family Drug Court's continued successful operation.

C. Travel

The Family Drug Court Team will send at a minimum, four team members to attend the annual National Association of Drug Court Professionals Conference (NADCP). The location is unknown at this time. Anticipated agenda items include workshops pertaining to skill building and substance abuse treatment strategies. Additionally, the Team will send four team members to the annual Community Anti-Drug Coalition Training Conference (CADCA). The date and location are unknown. Anticipated agenda items include workshops to assist with building collaborative relationships in the community to address substance abuse related issues.

D. Equipment

Fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) of requested funds are to support the development of the Service Internet Referral Portal (SIRP), a web based referral management system to ensure for real time coordination of services.

Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) of requested funds is to enhance the existing Juvenile Services Information System (JSIS) to increase capacity to accommodate the Family Drug Court system partners and establish linkage to the SIRP.

Ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) of requested funds is to enhance the Drug Abuse Foundation of Palm Beach County's current management information system to allow it to interface with the SIRP and JSIS systems.

E. Supplies

Requested funds in this category include office supplies, urinallysis services and incentives for participants.

Office Supplies are calculated at \$300 per month for 36 months = \$10,800 for the grant period, or \$3,600 per fiscal year.

<u>Urinalysis Services</u>: In accordance with the proposed family drug court model, 3300 drug tests per fiscal year at the cost of \$14.00 per test = \$138,600 for grant period, or \$46,200 per fiscal year. Since fifty percent of testing is to be provided through collaborative partnerships, \$23,100 annually is being requested.

<u>Incentives</u>: Incentive for program progress is estimated at \$10.00 per participant (100) per 36 months = \$36,000 for the grant period, or \$12,000 per fiscal year.



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Family Drug Court Coordinator

The essential function of the position within the organization is to coordinate all activities of the Family Drug Court. The position is responsible for case management; developing, implementing and managing the drug court; program budget; developing grant proposals; coordination of training, policy and procedure implementation; and performing related administrative functions. The position works under the supervision of a court manager or Division Director, reporting major activities through periodic meetings.

Examples of Work Performed

(Note: The examples of work as listed in this class specification are not necessarily descriptive of any one position in the class. The omission of specific statements does not preclude management from assigning specific duties not listed herein if such duties are a logical assignment to the position.)

- Develops, implements and manages family drug court within the circuit; serves as liaison for the judiciary, constitutional officers, other criminal justice agencies, treatment providers and various community agencies; manages projects of responsibility in compliance with applicable guidelines and regulations.
- Researches and develops funding opportunities for drug court programs; coordinates and manages court-related state and federal grants and funding issues, including budget and program oversight; prepares and submits required reports.
- Monitors contractual agreements for services supporting the drug court programs, such as
 outpatient and residential treatment or evaluation services; troubleshoots related problems
 and ensures locating and providing of ancillary services.
- Manages the Drug Court Tracking System and reviews system data for accuracy; performs data entry to facilitate reporting and evaluation of drug court programs.
- Establishes policy and procedures for drug court in accordance with state and federal guidelines; implements and updates written drug court program handbooks and manuals.
- Researches, collects and analyzes data of drug court programs; develops and maintains
 working relationships with drug court team members and their agency leaders; assists
 team members with operations of their programs. Coordinates training initiatives and
 opportunities, and disseminates training materials to drug court teams; supervises drug
 court transfers; prepares and files court orders for court programs.
- Attends and/or conducts staff, committee, community board, agency and other
 professional meetings to exchange information; attends technical or professional
 workshops or seminars to improve professional skills.

Parent's Attorneys

The role of the parents' attorneys in FDC is important to the success of the program. Once a parent has agreed to participate in FDC, the attorney should become a genuine advocate of and support to the FDC goals. Attorneys should encourage the parent to continue to cooperate in the court and in treatment, but support sanctions when warranted and necessary. This does not mean that attorneys should not zealously represent their clients. When possible, Children's Legal Services' attorneys and other defense attorneys should cooperate to work effectively with FDC. The parent's attorney is to receive copies of all FDC progress reports concerning their clients and participate as part of the FDC Team.

Roles and Responsibilities for Palm Beach County Family Drug Court Key Positions Judicial Role

The FDC Judge seeks to establish a rehabilitative relationship with the parent through interactions during court appearances. The Judge supervises and reinforces treatment by reviewing reports from FDC Specialists and Dependency Case Managers and discussing treatment obstacles with the parent(s) and the FDC Team during the frequent court appearances. Both positive and negative incentives (i.e. rewards and sanctions) are used to encourage compliance. The judge assumes the role of both task master and cheerleader. In this setting, the Judge is able to reward successes, and provide additional motivation. Conversely, the Judge can sanction noncompliance, thereby discouraging failure.

Attorneys

The role of the parents' attorneys in FDC is important to the success of the program. Once a parent has agreed to participate in FDC, the attorney should become a genuine advocate of and support to the FDC goals. Attorneys should encourage the parent to continue to cooperate in the court and in treatment, but support sanctions when warranted and necessary. This does not mean that attorneys should not zealously represent their clients. When possible, Children's Legal Services' attorneys and other defense attorneys should cooperate to work effectively with FDC. The parent's attorney is to receive copies of all FDC progress reports concerning their clients and participate as part of the FDC Team.

The role of the child's attorney as a FDC Team member is to represent and advocate for foster children and children who are emotionally, developmentally or physically challenged in court matters, to make sure that their permanency goals are reached and to confirm that they are

receiving the appropriate social and educational services.

Dependency Drug Court Coordinator

The FDC coordinator is a major factor in the success of the FDC effort. This position provides the critical link between the parent, the treatment provider, and the court. The FDC Coordinator works hand in hand with the Dependency Case Manager and is responsible for: referrals to and enrollment in treatment services, alcohol and other drug testing, progress monitoring, crisis and therapeutic intervention, engaging and retaining the parent in the dependency court process, advocating for the parent, and keeping the parent motivated to treatment and recovery throughout the long FDC process. The FDC Coordinator submits reports to the court containing treatment progress, health issues, housing issues, employment issues, and dependent children's issues. The FDC Coordinator collaborates with Dependency Case Manager to develop the substance abuse screening/evaluation/treatment and aftercare portion of the Children and Families Case Plan; stating all the requirements for substance abuse intervention. The FDC Coordinator reviews the plan with the parents, the Dependency Case manager and their attorney's. FDC Coordinator staffs cases weekly with other team members.

Child and Family Connections (CFC)

FDC is administered in collaboration with Child and Family Connections, the Community Based Care organization that the Department of Children and Families contracts with to provide Dependency Case Management. CFC will provide two dependency case managers, dedicated to FDC Clients. Dependency Case Managers are responsible for developing and managing all aspects of the dependency case plan. They will be trained in substance abuse

intervention and treatment and work closely with the FDC Coordinator to develop a holistic approach to the parents' recovery. Dependency Case Managers will provide a written report to the court at every hearing or when necessary.

Community Substance Abuse Treatment Providers

FDC refers parent(s) to community substance abuse treatment facilities that are licensed by the State of Florida and agree to work within FDC's program guidelines. The relationship between FDC, the court, and treatment providers is essential to program delivery. The treatment providers provide reports to the FDC Coordinator which are submitted to the court weekly. The FDC Coordinator will keep in constant communication with parents' primary counselors to discuss treatment progress and planning and to identify treatment barriers and facilitate solutions to those barriers as they arise.

Education Liaison

The Court Education Liaison will make referrals to the School Based Team for ongoing support at the school site and will report weekly on the youth (behavior/referrals, attendance, grades, participation, etc.). Referrals for services (i.e. tutoring), special programs and information will be provided to the youth and his/her family about educational matters, including registration, re-enrollment and transition, as well as school clubs and activities. The Education Liaison will attend and participate in all staffings and hearings.





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

CIRCUIT 15 INTEGRATION OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE SERVICES INTO THE CHILD WELFARE SYSTEM

A. Co-Location:

The parties agree the position for the single point of access for substance abuse services be contracted to a community based substance abuse agency, The Drug Abuse Poundation of Palm Beach County, Inc. (DAF) has been designated as the single access point for the Circuit. In accordance with statewide procedures, when possible, the substance abuse services are co-located with staff working within the Child Welfare System.

Family Intervention Specialists: (FIS). Circuit 15 is currently funded to provide three (3) Family Intervention Specialist to perform screening, assessment, referral, linkage and case management for individuals with severe substance abuse disorders. The duties performed are to be in accordance with FIS Guidelines. (Attached) The FIS positions are currently contracted with the Drug Abuse Foundation of Palm Beach County, Inc. In recognizing the need exceeds the demand, DAF has authorized an additional FIS positions to ensure countywide availability.

Substance Abase Intervention Specialist (SIS). In addition to the FIS positions, the Department has allocated funding to support three (3) additional staff, Substance Abase Intervention Specialist (SIS), to ensure timely screening and assessment of parents involved in the Child Welfare System. Their duties are limited to screening, assessment and referral of parents involved in the Child Welfare System.

B. Identification of Alcohol and Other Drug Addiction, and Potential Child Abuse and Neglect:

1. Child Welfare Staff:

### CIRCUIT 15 INTEGRATION OF SUBSTANCE ABUSE SERVICES INTO THE CHILD WELFARE SYSTEM

### A. Co-Location:

The parties agree the position for the single point of access for substance abuse services be contracted to a community based substance abuse agency, The Drug Abuse Foundation of Palm Beach County, Inc. (DAF) has been designated as the single access point for the Circuit. In accordance with statewide procedures, when possible, the substance abuse services are co-located with staff working within the Child Welfare System.

Family Intervention Specialists: (FIS). Circuit 15 is currently funded to provide three (3) Family Intervention Specialist to perform screening, assessment, referral, linkage and case management for individuals with severe substance abuse disorders. The duties performed are to be in accordance with FIS Guidelines. (Attached) The FIS positions are currently contracted with the Drug Abuse Foundation of Palm Beach County, Inc. In recognizing the need exceeds the demand, DAF has authorized an additional FIS positions to ensure countywide availability.

Substance Abuse Intervention Specialist (SIS). In addition to the FIS positions, the Department has allocated funding to support three (3) additional staff, Substance Abuse Intervention Specialist (SIS), to ensure timely screening and assessment of parents involved in the Child Welfare System. Their duties are limited to screening, assessment and referral of parents involved in the Child Welfare System.

### B. Identification of Alcohol and Other Drug Addiction, and Potential Child Abuse and Neglect:

### 1. Child Welfare Staff:

• The Department of Children and Families, Protective Supervision units and/or Child and Family Connections agree to make screening for substance abuse disorders a standard element of every child welfare risk assessment. The screening will incorporate collateral contact information, as well as drug testing, when appropriate. (Please see Florida Department of Children and Familles Investigative Report (Child Safety Assessment) and Initial In-Home Safety Assessment-(Attached).

## 2. Substance Abuse Provider Responsibilities

- Circuit 15 Substance Abuse contracted providers will identify signs of potential child

### Assessment Process

The Drug Abuse Foundation of Palm Beach County, Inc. has been designated as the single point of access for individuals suspected of substance abuse who involved in the Child Welfare System. The agency will provide a Comprehensive Substance Abuse and Mental Health Assessment conducted by an individual holding at a minimum a Master's degree in the Healing Arts and under the supervision of a Qualified Professional.

## Referral Process for Substance Abuse Services

If appointment is scheduled: Within 24 hours of confirmation, "Appointment Notification Letter" is sent to CW staff.

If appointment is not scheduled within 20 days, "Case Closure Notice" will be sent to CW staff.

- 3. Within 3 days from receipt of the completed referral packet, DAF will complete the assessment and forward results to the Child Welfare staff who initiated the referral.

     "No Show Alert" is sent to CW staff within 48 hours.

## E. Care Coordination/Case Management of Substance Abuse Issues

The Circuit 15 Substance Abuse and Mental Health Program Office and their contracted providers will ensure for prompt communication with child welfare staff regarding whether an individual referred by child welfare actually made contact with the treatment modality to which they were referred.

For individuals enrolled in Family Intervention Services (FIS):

Upon completion of assessment, client will be referred and linked with recommended service provider. The following reports will be implemented:

"REFERRAL for Substance Abuse Services"

This form is to be completed by the Drug Abuse Foundation to refer a
participant involved with the Child Welfare System to community based,
substance abuse treatment. Assessment is to be attached.

Upon enrollment into the recommended service, the community based, substance abuse provider will communicate to the Family Intervention Specialist the outcome of the referral and on-going monthly status. The following report will be implemented:

"STATUS REPORT" Child Welfare/Substance Abuse Network
This form is to be completed by community based substance abuse
providers upon admission of Child Welfare involved consumer and
monthly thereafter until discharge.

Individuals enrolled in the FIS services are eligible for financial assistance to eliminate the barriers for entering substance abuse treatment and maintaining a program of recovery. Funds can be accessed through the Drug Abuse Foundation's Family Intervention Specialist.

Upon discharge of a Child Welfare involved consumer, the community-based, substance abuse provider will notify the Family Intervention Specialist. The following reports will be implemented:

### Confidentiality

In accordance with the statutory basis that guides confidentiality for substance abuse, mental health and child welfare systems (Chapter 397.501 (7), F.S.; 42 C.F.R., Part 2; 42 U.S.C. 1320d, 45 C.F.R., Parts 160 and 164; section 394.4615 (1), F.S. and section 39.202, F.S. and HIPAA guidelines) staff will adhere to the following protocols to ensure sharing of information:

- 1. Child Welfare Staff will complete a Release of Confidentiality form prior to the referral to the Drug Abuse Foundation of Palm Beach County. (Attached)
- 2. Drug Abuse Foundation will initiate a Release of Confidentiality form prior to referral to community based substance abuse provider.
- Accepting agency will initiate a Release of Confidentiality for Child Welfare and DAF if appropriate.

### Effective and Accessible Treatment Services

The Circuit 15 Substance Abuse and Mental Health Program Office will make every effort to prioritize individuals involved in the child Welfare System for substance abuse services. Within the financial requirements set forth in statute, Substance Abuse TANF funding will be utilized to allow agencies to work with the entire family unit.

The contracted substance abuse providers have agreed to carve out SAMH contracted services and identify those services for individuals involved in the Child Welfare System. The carved out services will be referred to as the "Substance Abuse Child Welfare Network" and will consist of a continuum of services, i.e. detoxification, out-patient, residential, in-home, etc. Contracted agencies will admit Child Welfare involved clients referred by the Drug Abuse Foundation within 72 hours of contact up to the agreed upon following census:

#### Dear Ms. Saunders:

Congratulations on your recent award. In establishing financial assistance programs, Congress linked the receipt of Federal funding to compliance with Federal civil rights laws. The Office for Civil Rights (OCR), Office of Justice Programs (OJP), U.S. Department of Justice is responsible for ensuring that recipients of financial aid from OJP, its component offices and bureaus, the Office on Violence Against Women (OVW), and the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS) comply with applicable Federal civil rights statutes and regulations. We at OCR are available to help you and your organization meet the civil rights requirements that come with Justice Department funding Department funding.

### Ensuring Access to Federally Assisted Programs

As you know, Federal laws prohibit recipients of financial assistance from discriminating on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, sex, or disability in funded programs or activities, not only in respect to employment practices but also in the delivery of services or benefits. Federal law also prohibits funded programs or activities from discriminating on the basis of age in the delivery of services or

### Providing Services to Limited English Proficiency (LEP) Individuals

In accordance with Department of Justice Guidance pertaining to Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, 42 U.S.C. § 2000d, recipients of Federal financial assistance must take reasonable steps to provide meaningful access to their programs and activities for persons with limited English proficiency (LEP). For more information on the civil rights responsibilities that recipients have in providing language services to LEP individuals, please see the website at http://www.lep.gov.

### Ensuring Equal Treatment for Faith-Based Organizations

The Department of Justice has published a regulation specifically pertaining to the funding of faith-based organizations. In general, the regulation, Participation in Justice Department Programs by Religious Organizations; Providing for Equal Treatment of all Justice Department Program Participants, and known as the Equal Treatment Regulation 28 C.F.R. part 38, requires State Administering Agencies to treat these organizations the same as any other applicant or recipient. The regulation prohibits State Administering Agencies from making award or grant administration decisions on the basis of an organization's religious character or affiliation, religious name, or the religious composition of its board of directors.

The regulation also prohibits faith-based organizations from using financial assistance from the Department of Justice to fund inherently religious activities. While faith-based organizations can engage in non-funded inherently religious activities, they must be held separately from the Department of Justice funded program, and customers or beneficiaries cannot be compelled to participate in them. The Equal from the Department of Justice funded program, and customers or beneficiaries cannot be compelled to participate in them. The Equal from the Regulation also makes clear that organizations participating in programs funded by the Department of Justice are not permitted to discriminate in the provision of services on the basis of a beneficiary's religion. State Administering Agencies and faith-based organizations should also note that the Safe Streets Act, as amended; the Victims of Crime Act, as amended; and the Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Act, as amended, contain prohibitions against discrimination on the basis of religion in employment. Despite these nondiscrimination provisions, the Justice Department has concluded that the Religious Freedom Restoration Act (RFRA) is reasonably construed, on a case-by-case basis, to require that its funding agencies permit faith-based organizations applying for funding under the applicable program statutes both to receive DOJ funds and to continue considering religion when hiring staff, even if the statute that authorizes the funding program generally forbids considering of religion in employment decisions by grantees. by grantees.

Questions about the regulation or the application of RFRA to the statutes that prohibit discrimination in employment may be directed to this Office.

#### **Enforcing Civil Rights Laws**

All recipients of Federal financial assistance, regardless of the particular funding source, the amount of the grant award, or the number of employees in the workforce, are subject to the prohibitions against unlawful discrimination. Accordingly, OCR investigates recipients that are the subject of discrimination complaints from both individuals and groups. In addition, based on regulatory criteria, OCR selects a number of recipients each year for compliance reviews, audits that require recipients to submit data showing that they are providing services equitably to all segments of their service population and that their employment practices meet equal employment opportunity standards.

### Complying with the Safe Streets Act or Program Requirements

In addition to these general prohibitions, an organization which is a recipient of financial assistance subject to the nondiscrimination provisions of the Omnibus Crime Control and Safe Streets Act (Safe Streets Act) of 1968, 42 U.S.C. § 3789d(c), or other Federal grant program requirements, must meet two additional requirements:(1) complying with Federal regulations pertaining to the development of an Equal Employment Opportunity Plan (EEOP), 28 C.F.R. § 42.301-.308, and (2) submitting to OCR Findings of Discrimination (see 28 C.F.R. §§ 42.205(5) or 31.202(5)).

### 1) Meeting the EEOP Requirement

In accordance with Federal regulations, Assurance No. 6 in the Standard Assurances, COPS Assurance No. 8.B, or certain Federal grant program requirements, your organization must comply with the following EEOP reporting requirements:

If your organization has received an award for \$500,000 or more and has 50 or more employees (counting both full- and part-time employees but excluding political appointees), then it has to prepare an EEOP and submit it to OCR for review within 60 days from the date of this letter. For assistance in developing an EEOP, please consult OCR's website at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/eeop.htm. You may also request technical assistance from an EEOP specialist at OCR by dialing (202) 616-3208.

If your organization received an award between \$25,000 and \$500,000 and has 50 or more employees, your organization still has to prepare an EEOP, but it does not have to submit the EEOP to OCR for review. Instead, your organization has to maintain the EEOP on file and make it available for review on request. In addition, your organization has to complete Section B of the Certification Form and return it to OCR. The Certification Form can be found at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/eeop.htm.

If your organization received an award for less than \$25,000; or if your organization has less than 50 employees, regardless of the amount of the award; or if your organization is a medical institution, educational institution, nonprofit organization or Indian tribe, then your organization is exempt from the EEOP requirement. However, your organization must complete Section A of the Certification Form and return it to OCR. The Certification Form can be found at http://www.ojp.usdoj.gov/ocr/eeop.htm.

### 2) Submitting Findings of Discrimination

In the event a Federal or State court or Federal or State administrative agency makes an adverse finding of discrimination against your organization after a due process hearing, on the ground of race, color, religion, national origin, or sex, your organization must submit a copy of the finding to OCR for review.

### **Ensuring the Compliance of Subrecipients**

If your organization makes subawards to other agencies, you are responsible for assuring that subrecipients also comply with all of the applicable Federal civil rights laws, including the requirements pertaining to developing and submitting an EEOP, reporting Findings of Discrimination, and providing language services to LEP persons. State agencies that make subawards must have in place standard grant assurances and review procedures to demonstrate that they are effectively monitoring the civil rights compliance of subrecipients.

#### SPECIAL CONDITIONS

- 7. The recipient agrees to submit quarterly financial status reports to OJP. At present, these reports are to be submitted on-line (at https://grants.ojp.usdoj.gov) using Standard Form SF 269A, not later than 45 days after the end of each calendar quarter. The recipient understands that after October 15, 2009, OJP will discontinue its use of the SF 269A, and will require award recipients to submit quarterly financial status reports within 30 days after the end of each calendar quarter, using the government-wide Standard Form 425 Federal Financial Report form (available for viewing at www.whitehouse.gov/omb/grants/standard_forms/ffr.pdf). Beginning with the report for the fourth calendar quarter of 2009 (and continuing thereafter), the recipient agrees that it will submit quarterly financial status reports to OJP online (at https://grants.ojp.usdoj.gov) using the SF 425 Federal Financial Report form, not later than 30 days after the end of each calendar quarter. The final report shall be submitted not later than 90 days following the end of the grant period.
- 8. The recipient agrees to report data on the grantee's OJJDP-approved performance measures as part of the semi-annual categorical progress report. This data will be submitted on line at OJJDP's Performance Measures website (http://ojjdp.ncjrs.gov/grantees/pm/index.html) by July 31 and January 31 each year for the duration of the award. Once data entry is complete, the grantee will be able to create and download a "Performance Measures Data Report." This document is to be included as an attachment to the grantee's narrative categorical assistance progress report submitted in GMS for each reporting period.
- 9. Any deviation from the timeline provided in the application or revised grant program implementation plan must receive prior approval from OJJDP.
- 10. The recipient may not obligate, expend or draw down funds until the Office of the Chief Financial Officer (OCFO) has approved the budget and budget narrative and a Grant Adjustment Notice (GAN) has been issued to remove this special condition.
- 11. No portion of these federal grant funds shall be used towards any part of the annual cash compensation of any employee of the grantee whose total annual cash compensation exceeds 110% of the maximum salary payable to a member of the Federal government's Senior Executive Service at an agency with a Certified SES Performance Appraisal System for that year.

This prohibition may be waived on an individual basis at the discretion of the Assistant Attorney General for OJP.

Categorical Exclusion for Palm Beach County

The recipient agrees to assist OJJDP to comply with the National Environmental Policy Act (NEPA) and other related federal environmental impact analyses requirements in the use of these grant funds either directly by the recipient or by a subrecipient. The activities covered by this special condition are: a. new construction; b. minor renovation or remodeling of a property either; (1) listed on or eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places or; (2) located within a 100-year flood plain; c. a renovation, lease, or any other proposed use of a building or facility that will either; (1) result in a change in its basic prior use or; (2) significantly change its size and; d. Implementation of a new program involving the use of chemicals other than chemicals that are; (1) purchased as an incidental component of a funded activity and; (2) traditionally used, for example, in office, household, recreational, or education environments.
