I. EXECUTIVE BRIEF
Motion and Title: Staff recommends motion to receive and file: the Community Action Program (CAP) 2009-2010 Annual Report.
Summary: The FY 2010 Community Action Program received funding from the Community Services Block Grant (CSBG), the CSBG-American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA) grant and the Low Income Home Energy Assistance (LIHEAP) grant. The program provides services to low-income residents of Palm Beach County that enable them to become more self-sufficient. These services include education and training, employment, employment support, emergency assistance through eviction prevention and utility payments, nutrition and health services, and referrals.
CAP operates from seven (7) target area centers that are strategically located in high poverty areas throughout Palm Beach County. The Community Action Advisory Board oversees the CSBG and is comprised of 15 members with representation from public, private and low-income sectors. The program collaborates with more than 65 agencies throughout Palm Beach County to provide services to low-income participants. (Community Action Program) Countywide (TKF)
Background and Justification: As set forth by the Community Action Advisory Board PPM# CP-O-001, the Community Action Board must submit to the Board of County Commissioners a report on accomplishments in the past program year. This information must include characteristics of persons assisted by the program, outcomes achieved, success stories, acknowledgement of partnerships and a listing of the financials and other resources used by the program.




Employment

In 2009-2010, the Community Action Program (CAP) helped 24 individuals to obtain employment.

Pre-Apprentice Training


29 participants received state certifications from Apprenticeship Program in September 2010.

One of these students is currently enrolled in Palm Beach State College.





Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program

- LIHEAP applications were processed by CAP, Human Services and Division of Senior Services. These programs serviced nearly 30,000 individuals during the 2009-2010 fiscal year.
- The majority of these families were single women with kids. Approximately 25% of these families were senior citizens
- The program prevented electric service shutoff for more than 6,000 individuals and restored services for more than 3,300 individuals throughout Palm Beach County.
- More than 60% of participants reduced dependence by maintaining their service for more than 6 months after receiving benefits.



LIHEAP Annual Comparison Chart











Demographics (Continued)-Poverty Level
