## I. EXECUTIVE BRIEF

Motion and Title: Staff recommends motion to adopt: A resolution of the Board of County Commissioners of Palm Beach County, Florida, urging the Legislature of the State of Florida to enact a ban on large capacity ammunition feeding devices including a magazine, belt, drum, feed strip, or similar device that has the capacity of, or can be readily restored or converted to accept, more than 21 rounds of ammunition. This ban includes the transfer, possession, or manufacturing of such devices in the state of Florida.

Summary: The federal ban on large capacity ammunition feeding devices (LCAFD) and Semi-Automatic Weapons expired on September 13, 2004. Since that time, several states have enacted bans on LCAFD because of their potential to inflict tremendous harm such as the tragedies in Tucson, Arizona, and Columbine, Colorado. Studies have shown that bans on LCAFD significantly reduce the capacity and lethality of a firearm. Therefore, the Board of County Commissioners of Palm Beach County urges the Legislature to consider and support legislation that would ban LCAFD with a capacity of 21-rounds or greater. Background and Policy Issues: The federal government has not reinstated the ban on assault weapons or LCAFD. Therefore, states and local governments have been enacting various pieces of legislation to address the issue since 2004. The Board of County Commissioners of Palm Beach County is requesting that the State of Florida enact legislation that would ban an LCAFD with a capacity of 21-rounds or greater. Previously, the State has not passed such legislation.

## Resolution No. 2011-\_\_\_\_

RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF PALM BEACH COUNTY, FLORIDA, URGING THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF FLORIDA TO ENACT A BAN ON LARGE CAPACITY AMMUNITION FEEDING DEVICES INCLUDING A MAGAZINE, BELT, DRUM, FEED STRIP, OR SIMILAR DEVICE THAT HAS THE CAPACITY OF, OR CAN BE READILY RESTORED OR CONVERTED TO ACCEPT, MORE THAN 21 ROUNDS OF AMMUNITION. THIS BAN INCLUDES THE TRANSFER, POSSESSION, OR MANUFACTURING OF SUCH DEVICES IN THE STATE OF FLORIDA.

WHEREAS, the Large Capacity Ammunition Feeding Devices (LCAFD) federal ban was enacted in conjunction with the Semi-Automatic Weapon ban on September 13, 1994; and

WHEREAS, the federal ban on LCAFD and Semi-Automatic Weapons expired on September 13, 2004; and

WHEREAS, six states have enacted laws banning LCAFD for use in any firearm since that time: California, Hawaii, Maryland, Massachusetts, New Jersey and New York in various capacities; and

WHEREAS, LCAFD have been used in tragic mass-shootings since that time, including Tucson, Arizona and Columbine, Colorado; and

WHEREAS, studies have shown that bans on LCAFD significantly reduce the capacity and lethality of a firearm; and

WHEREAS, a January 2011 national poll conducted for Mayors Against Illegal Guns found that 58% of Americans support a ban on the sale of high-capacity magazines.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY
COMMISSIONERS OF PALM BEACH COUNTY, FLORIDA, that:

1. Palm Beach County encourages the Legislature of the State of Florida to enact a ban on large capacity ammunition feeding devices (LCAFD) including a magazine, belt, drum, feed strip, or similar device that has the capacity of, or can be readily restored or converted to accept, more than 21 rounds of ammunition, including the transfer, possession or manufacturing of such devices in the State of Florida, except for law enforcement officers. 2. A copy of this resolution be forwarded to the Governor of Florida, members of the Palm Beach County Legislative Delegation, and the Florida Association of Counties.
