1. EXECUTIVE BRIEF

MOTION AND TITLE: Staff recommends motion to:

- A) Ratify the signature of the Chair on the submittal of the following three (3) grant proposals to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE) for the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program: State Solicitation for the period from October 1, 2011, through September 30, 2012, 1) Juvenile Assessment Center (JAC) Security for \$318,000; 2) County-wide Re-entry Services for \$110,000; and 3) Criminal Justice Commission Program Evaluation for \$30,797.
- **B)** Authorize the Criminal Justice Commission's Executive Director, through the County Administrator, to execute electronically all related documents for the FY2012 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program and to execute all necessary forms, documents and the resulting grant agreement as required by the FDLE for FY 2012.

SUMMARY: The Criminal Justice Commission Executive Committee met on July 11, 2011, and approved the recommendations made by the CJC Finance Committee for FY 2012 funds totaling \$458,797. No local match is required for the JAG program. <u>Countywide</u> (DW)

BACKGROUND & JUSTIFICATION: The FDLE, Office of Criminal Justice Grants administers the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program. The JAG Program is a blend of the previous Byrne Formula and Local Law Enforcement Block Grant (LLEBG) Programs which allows local governments to support a broad range of activities to prevent and control crime based on local needs and conditions. Palm Beach County has been allocated \$458,797 in FY2011 federal funds as part of the JAG Program for expenditure in FY2012. The CJC recommends three (3) programs for funding for the period October 1, 2011 through September 30, 2012.

The FDLE requires that at least 51% of the units of local government in Palm Beach County, which represent 51% or greater of the County's population, support and approve the allocation of FY2011 funds for these programs.

FDLE recommends that the Board of County Commissioners assume this responsibility. In the event the county declines to serve in this capacity, the Department will request the governing body of each municipality in the county, in descending order of population, to serve as the coordinating unit of government.

PROGRAM ANNOUNCEMENT FEDERAL FISCAL YEAR 2011

Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) Program

The State of Florida, Department of Law Enforcement (FDLE), anticipates an award from the United States Department of Justice (USDOJ) for \$9,549,906 in Justice Assistance Grant (JAG) funds. FDLE will distribute these funds in accordance with the JAG Countywide distribution provisions of Chapter 11D-9, Florida Administrative Code. This announcement is to notify eligible applicants of program requirements. Please note this Program Announcement includes information from the USDOJ relating several areas of national focus and its priorities to help maximize the effectiveness of the Byrne/JAG funding.

Eligible Applicants

Units of local government are eligible to receive subgrants from FDLE. "Units of local government" means any city, county, town, township, borough, parish, village, or other general-purpose political subdivision of a State and includes Native American Tribes that perform law enforcement functions as determined by the Secretary of the Interior.

Program Strategy and Purposes

JAG blends the previous Byrne Formula and Local Law Enforcement Block Grant (LLEBG) Programs to provide agencies with the flexibility to prioritize and to support a broad range of activities to prevent and control crime based on their own local needs and conditions. JAG funds can be used for state and local initiatives, technical assistance, training, personnel, equipment, supplies, contractual support, and information systems for criminal justice. Local units of government receiving JAG funding have the flexibility to implement projects in any of the seven federally approved purpose areas, listed below.

- 1) Law enforcement programs
- 2) Prosecution and court programs
- 3) Prevention and education programs
- 4) Corrections and community corrections programs
- 5) Drug treatment and enforcement programs
- 6) Planning, evaluation, and technology improvement programs
- 7) Crime victim and witness programs

Any law enforcement or justice initiative previously eligible for funding under Byrne or LLEBG is eligible for JAG funding.

Coordination Efforts

Each county is allocated a sum of money for use by all local governments within the county. This amount is determined through a funding algorithm established in the administrative rule.

Chapter 11D-9.005, Florida Administrative Code, requires that units of government in each county reach consensus concerning the expenditure of these funds, including the projects to be implemented and the agency responsible for such implementation. Maximum coordination is required to meet this program requirement, and the Department requests the county board of commissioners to serve as the coordinating unit for all local governments within the county. The Chairman, Board of County Commissioners, in each county so notified is requested to return to the Department a statement of certification indicating the county's willingness to serve. This certification must be returned within 30 days from the date of receipt of notification. In the event the county declines to serve in this capacity, the Department will request the governing body of each municipality in the county, in descending order of population, to serve as the coordinating unit of government.

Each county or coordinating unit of government is encouraged to form a criminal justice coordinating/planning group to identify and implement criminal justice priorities for the county, to plan strategies to address those priorities, to identify areas of greatest need, and to review all possible sources of revenue to make sure that funds go to the programs or issues that need them most.

Furthermore, FDLE requires that units of government in each county reach consensus concerning the expenditure of the JAG funds, including the projects to be implemented and the agency responsible for such implementation. Each county must document this consensus by submitting letters from at least 51 percent of the units of government which also represent at least 51 percent of the population located in said county.

Match Requirements

There is no match requirement under the guidelines of the JAG program.

DOJ/Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA) Priorities

BJA wishes to ensure that recipients are aware of several areas of national focus and priority and to encourage recipients to maximize the effective use of JAG funds. The following is a brief list of key priorities:

- 1) Counterterrorism and Information Sharing/Fusion Centers
- 2) Evidence-Based Programs or Practices
- 3) Economic Crime
- 4) Reentry and Smart Probation
- 5) Indigent Defense
- 6) Children Exposed to Violence
- 7) Interoperable Communications

This is for informational purposes only; do not apply for any funds through this solicitation. Recipient must still submit application for funding through SIMON.

Application Requirements and Deadlines

Once the Certificate of Participation form designating the coordinator for your county is received, the Office of Criminal Justice Grants will send this individual further information regarding the application process.

Applicants must apply on-line using FDLE's grant management system. The deadline for the on-line submission is <u>5:00 P.M., Friday, July 22, 2011</u>. In addition, applicants must print out the completed application and submit two (2) hard copies (both with *original signatures*) no later than <u>5:00 P.M., Friday, July 29, 2011</u>. A separate application must be submitted for each proposed project. Applications should be mailed or hand delivered to the Florida Department of Law Enforcement, Office of Criminal Justice Grants, 2331 Phillips Road, Tallahassee, Florida 32308, Attention: Clayton H. Wilder, Administrator.

Applications must be accompanied by letters of approval representing agreement among at least 51 percent of all units of local government representing at least 51 percent of the county population as to the allocation of dollars to each project in the county.





An average of 6,000 juvenile offender cases per year has been processed cooperatively through the JAC. Some of these are initiated by law enforcement bringing the juveniles to the site upon arrest; the remainder is given a notice to report with their parents for intake at the JAC. The State Attorney intakes all juvenile cases at the Juvenile Assessment Center and determines appropriate disposition, such as diversion out of the court system into programs including Teen Court (peer sanctions), direct file to adult court, or processing through regular Juvenile Court. The value of the JAC is its coalition of the State Attorney, DJJ, and diversion programs. It is a one-stop intake center. This increases the cooperation between city and county law enforcement and state agencies all required to handle juveniles, thereby significantly increasing the compliance by the juvenile and family. The JAC is open 24/7, 365 days a year to recieve and serve youth. Security is required at all times, 2 officers, 3 shifts per day.

CJC is a partner in the JAC and is requesting to allocate \$318,000.00 from the BYRNE/JAG towards security at the JAC for FY 2012. It is projected that the total annual cost of security will be \$455,556.00. The balance will come from other funding sources. Both CJC and PBSO and JAG grants have

paid for secuirty at the JAC in the past but neither have this item in their 2012 budgets it total. In the

past, CJC used federal grant funds to subsidize the cost of security, similar to 2011. PBSO is faced with a \$25 million dollar cut for 2011 and as a result is no longer funding projects that are not a core mission or a mandate, inlcuding JAC security.

An EEOP for PBSO was approved by the Office of Civil Rights, DOJ for two years on 9/27/10.

Problem Identification

Upon release, the reentry population and the communities to which they return face a wide array of challenges. The reentry population is in need of health care, housing, employment, income, and a wide range of other services. Unfortunately, the communities to which they return are often the communities least capable of meeting these reintegration needs. The flow of people between these communities and prison and jails destabilizes the communities of return and creates substantial barriers to providing ongoing health, employment, housing and educational services to a population in great need of these services.

In recent years, reentry in Palm Beach County has received increased attention as public policy leaders are searching for innovative ways of decreasing cost of incarceration while maintaining public safety. As a result, various projects have been funded through the Palm Beach County Criminal Justice Commission that address the offender reentry populations.

Project Summary (Scope of Work)

Reentry and reintegration refer to both a philosophic approach to criminal justice and to a process of community reintegration. As a philosophy reentry refers to an approach to the criminal justice system that works towards the successful reintegration of an individual from the point of adjudication within the system. Therefore, as a process, reentry begins at the time of adjudication and is completed when a person is successfully reintegrated back within their community. By focusing on community reintegration, reentry seeks to identify and meet the needs of the individual at each point of the process in a way that supports success in the community. Furthermore, reetnry and reintegration is defined as a process, beginning at the time of adjudication, which plans for and provides the necessary services and supports to enable the formerly incarcerated individual to reenter the community, achieve stability and successfully reintegrate back into family and community life and to complete probation without being reincarcerated.

The reentry initiative with Gulfstream Goodwill Industries Inc. moves into its fifth year. The purpose of this program is to provide case management and support services to the formerly incarcerated from the western and coastal communities. These communities include Belle Glade, Pahokee, South Bay, Delray and West Palm Beach. Reentry is part of the overall prevention program of the Criminal Justice Commission. These communities have been selected for reentry services because of the large body of research that identifies these communities as portals where large number returning citizens reside. Employees such as a case manager and employment counselor are hired with the funds.

The strategy includes providing comprehensive services in communities which have a sizeable number of returning citizens. They have a disproportionate number of formerly incarcerated adults and juveniles in need of services. This is coupled with a large number of unemployed persons and a large number of high school dropouts and teenage

parents. Gulfstrea Goodwill Industries Inc. has been successful in providing these services throughout the state of Florida and in Palm Beach County. They are part of an extensive countywide effort to bring evidence based services and results to clients. The overall outcome is to reduce the number of clients who return to jail thereby reducing the recidivism rate. In addition, increasing the employment rate is another long term outcome. They provide support to the Weed and Seed efforts as well as the County-wide Task Force.
