## **I. EXECUTIVE BRIEF**

**Motion and Title:** Staff recommends motion to adopt: a Resolution supporting U.S. Senate Bill 2429, the Restoring Resilient Reefs Act of 2019 or similar legislation.

**Summary:** On October 22, 2019, the Board of County Commissioners directed staff to prepare this Resolution to show Palm Beach County's support of U.S. Senate Bill 2429, the Restoring Resilient Reefs Act of 2019, sponsored by Senator Marco Rubio, or similar legislation. Broward and Miami-Dade Counties have already passed resolutions supporting U.S. Senate Bill 2429. U.S. Senate Bill 2429 provides a five-year authorization focused on restoration activities, directing federal funding and technical assistance to areas where coral reefs have been impacted, and allowing for access to emergency funds for rapid and effective response to coral reef emergencies. **Background and Justification:** The Florida Reef Tract runs parallel to the Florida coastline from Monroe to Martin County and supports 71,000 jobs within the region, generating over \$6 billion annually in positive economic impact. In 2014, a coral disease that started in Miami spread north and south along the Florida Reef Tract and harmed over 50 percent of the coral species. In 2000, the Coral Reef Conservation Act established the National Ocean and Atmospheric Administration Coral Reef Conservation Program to protect, conserve, and restore the Nation's coral reefs.

#### RESOLUTION NO. R2019-\_\_\_

RESOLUTION OF OF COUNTY THE BOARD COMMISSIONERS OF PALM BEACH COUNTY, FLORIDA URGING THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO REAUTHORIZE THE CORAL REEF CONSERVATION ACT OF 2000; SUPPORTING UNITED STATES SENATE BILL 2429, THE RESTORING RESILIENT REEFS ACT OF 2019 OR SIMILAR LEGISLATION; PROVIDING FOR TRANSMITTAL OF THIS RESOLUTION TO THE CHAIR OF THE UNITED STATES COMMITTEE ON COMMERCE. AND TRANSPORTATION AND SCIENCE. TO THE UNITED STATES MEMBERS OF CONGRESS REPRESENTING PALM BEACH COUNTY RESIDENTS; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY AND AND AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Florida Reef Tract runs parallel to the Florida coastline from. Monroe County north to Martin County, is a valuable national resource that protects our shores and beaches by reducing wave energy from storms and hurricanes, and provides a vital marine habitat for over 6,000 species; and

WHEREAS, this habitat is essential to Palm Beach County's tourism industries, diving and commercial fisheries, and supports over 71,000 jobs within the region, which generates over \$6 billion in positive economic impact annually; and

WHEREAS, protection of Florida's coral reefs is essential for ensuring the continued protection of our shorelines, coastal economies, coastal food sources, and biomedical opportunities that are a direct result of our coral reefs; and

WHEREAS, it has been determined that coastal ocean waters are under great user pressure and suffer from water quality degradation that has compromised the resiliency of the Florida Reef Tract and its habitat; and

WHEREAS, in 2014, a coral disease of unknown origin harmed over 50 percent of the coral species present in the Florida Reef Tract; and

WHEREAS, the coral disease became an epidemic that caused near total mortality on several vulnerable species present on the Florida Reef Tract, resulting in an increasing threat to our fragile ecosystems that support our fisheries and protect our coasts; and

WHEREAS, approximately ten percent of our coral reefs have degraded beyond recovery, and 30 percent are in critical condition; and

WHEREAS, without necessary funding those coral reefs in critical condition could die completely within the next few years; and

WHEREAS, a collaborative, multiagency/multidisciplinary emergency response

team of experts is essential to address the critical condition of coral reefs; and

WHEREAS, inaction will ensure near extinction of these susceptible species throughout the Florida Reef Tract; and

WHEREAS, the National Ocean and Atmospheric Administration Coral Reef Conservation Program was established in 2000 by the Coral Reef Conservation Act to protect, conserve, and restore the nation's coral reefs by maintaining healthy ecosystem function; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 2429, the Restoring Resilient Reefs Act of 2019 or similar legislation, would revive and modernize the Coral Reef Conservation Act of 2000, 15 years after its expiration; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 2429 provides a five-year authorization with an explicit focus on restoration activities where natural disasters and human activities have degraded reef ecosystems, and directs federal funding and technical assistance so states and impacted communities can drive priorities and management of coral reef ecosystems; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 2429 offers new avenues for the provision of emergency funds to ensure rapid and effective responses to coral reef emergencies including disease outbreaks, invasive species, coral bleaching, natural disasters, vessel groundings, hazardous spills, and coastal construction accidents; and

WHEREAS, Senate Bill 2429 codifies and updates the U.S. Coral Reef Task Force, and provides the Secretary of the Interior with the authority to provide scientific expertise, technical assistance, and financial assistance for management and restoration activities consistent with the legislation.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF PALM BEACH COUNTY FLORIDA, that:

Section 1: The foregoing recitals are hereby adopted and ratified herein.

Section 2: Palm Beach County urges the United States Congress to pass Senate Bill 2429, the Restoring Resilient Reefs Act of 2019 or similar legislation, and reauthorize the Coral Reef Conservation Act of 2000. Section 3: The Board of County Commissioners hereby directs the Office of Legislative Affairs to transmit copies of this Resolution to Sen. Marco Rubio, Sen. Rick Scott, Sen. Roger Wicker, Chair of the United States Committee on Commerce, Science, and Transportation, U.S. Rep. Darren Soto, and to the other members of the Palm Beach County Delegation.
