I. EXECUTIVE BRIEF

Motion and Title: Staff recommends motion to approve: a Budget Amendment of \$5,289,908 in the General Fund to recognize the federal allocation received by the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office under the Fiscal Year (FY) 2020 Presidential Residence Protection Assistance Grant (PRPA).

Summary: On March 4, 2021, the Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office (PBSO) received a federal grant award from the U.S. Department of Homeland Security (DHS)/Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) as reimbursement for the extraordinary law enforcement personnel costs incurred for protection activities directly associated with the designated residence of the President during the period October 1, 2019 through September 30, 2020. The Catalog of Federal Domestic Assistance number is 97.134 and the Agreement number is EMW-2020-GR-00252-S01. There is no match requirement associated with this award. No new positions are needed. Countywide (LDC)

Background and Justification: The Presidential Residence Protection Assistance Grant (PRPA) provides federal funds to reimburse state and local law enforcement agencies (LEAs) for law enforcement overtime personnel and fringe costs incurred while protecting a non-governmental residence of the President that is designated or identified to be secured by the United States Secret Service during the period October 1, 2019 through September 30, 2020, in accordance with Section 530 of the Department of Homeland Security Appropriations Act, 2020 (Pub. L. No.116-93).



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Article I - Summary Description of Award

The Palm Beach County Sheriff's Office is awarded a total federal allocation in the amount of \$5,289,907.19 under the FY 2020 Presidential Residence Protection Assistance Grant Program (PRPA) for necessary expenses pursuant to the recipient's approved application. The purpose of the PRPA program is to reimburse state and local law enforcement agencies for extraordinary law enforcement personnel costs incurred while protecting any non-governmental residence of the President that is designated or identified to be secured by the United States Secret Service (USSS) in accordance with section 530 of the Department of Homeland Security Appropriations Act, 2020.

Article II - USA PATRIOT Act of 2001

Recipients must comply with requirements of Section 817 of the Uniting and Strengthening America by Providing Appropriate Tools Required to Intercept and Obstruct Terrorism Act of 2001 (USA PATRIOT Act), Pub. L. No. 107-56, which amends 18 U.S.C. sections 175-175c.

Article III - Universal Identifier and System of Award Management

Recipients are required to comply with the requirements set forth in the government-wide financial assistance award term regarding the System for Award Management and Universal Identifier Requirements located at 2 C.F.R. Part 25, Appendix A, the full text of which is incorporated here by reference.

Article IV - Nondiscrimination in Matters Pertaining to Faith-Based Organizations

It is DHS policy to ensure the equal treatment of faith-based organizations in social service programs administered or supported by DHS or its component agencies, enabling those organizations to participate in providing important social services to beneficiaries. No. 93-112 (1973), (codified as amended at 29 U.S.C. section 794,) which provides that no otherwise qualified handicapped individuals in the United States will, solely by reason of the handicap, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any program or activity receiving federal financial assistance.

Article XVI - Limited English Proficiency (Civil Rights Act of 1964, Title VI)

Recipients must comply with Title VI of the Civil Rights Act of 1964, (42 U.S.C. section 2000d et seq.) prohibition against discrimination on the basis of national origin, which requires that recipients of federal financial assistance take reasonable steps to provide meaningful access to persons with limited English proficiency (LEP) to their programs and services. - 3. Recipients must submit timely, complete, and accurate reports to the appropriate DHS officials and maintain appropriate backup documentation to support the reports.

Article XXXV - Civil Rights Act of 1968

Recipients must comply with Title VIII of the Civil Rights Act of 1968, Pub. L. No. 90-284, as amended through Pub. L. 113-4, which prohibits recipients from discriminating in the sale, rental, financing, and advertising of dwellings, or in the provision of services in connection therewith, on the basis of race, color, national origin, religion, disability, familial status, and sex (see 42 U.S.C. section 3601 et seq.), as implemented by the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development at 24 C.F.R. Part 100. The prohibition on disability discrimination includes the requirement that new multifamily housing with four or more dwelling units-i.e., the public and common use areas and individual apartment units (all units in buildings with elevators and ground-floor units in buildings without elevators)-be designed and constructed with certain accessible features. The objective of the FY 2020 PRPA Grant is to reimburse extraordinary costs incurred by law enforcement agencies while protecting the residences of the President. Based on the review of your application, FEMA has verified that the claimed extraordinary costs are consistent with the stated program objective.
