I. EXECUTIVE BRIEF

Motion and Title: Staff recommends motion to approve: On preliminary reading and advertise for public hearing on November 21, 2023 at 9:30 AM: AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF PALM BEACH COUNTY, FLORIDA, AMENDING CHAPTER 2, ARTICLE V, DIVISION 5 OF THE PALM BEACH COUNTY CODE (ORDINANCE 88-16, AS AMENDED BY ORDINANCES 89-3, 90-38, 92-14, 92-25, 93-1, 93-35 95-6, 2014-003, AND 2016-017) PERTAINING TO THE PALM BEACH COUNTY CRIMINAL JUSTICE COMMISSION, AMENDING SECTION 2-216 (CREATED), AMENDING SECTION 2-217 (OBJECTIVES), AMENDING SECTION 2-218 (AUTHORITY), AMENDING SECTION 2-219 (OPERATION), AMENDING SECTION 2-220 (STAFF COOPERATION AND SUPPORT), AND AMENDING SECTION 2-221 (ADMINISTRATION); PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF LAWS IN CONFLICT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR INCLUSION IN THE CODE OF LAWS AND ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR CAPTIONS; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

Summary: The CJC seeks to amend Chapter 2, Article V, Division 5 of the Palm Beach County Code of Ordinances to include an expanded private sector membership reflective of the County and diversity in community voice. Therefore, the CJC is making the following recommended amendments to the CJC Ordinance:

- 1) Modify the membership of the CJC by reducing the public sector members from 21 to 18 by removing a) Supervisory Special Agent, Federal Bureau of Investigation, West Palm Beach, b) Senior Agent, Drug Enforcement Administration, West Palm Beach, and c) Resident Agent in Charge, Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco and Firearms (ATF), West Palm Beach Field Office, U.S. Treasury Department;
- 2) Modify the membership of the CJC by increasing the private sector members from 11 to 17 by maintaining the ten (10) members who will be nominated by the Palm Beach County Economic Council, of which consideration should be given to one (1) representative from CareerSource and one (1) representative from the Health Care District of Palm Beach County; and by increasing the one (1) member at large to six (6) members at large, which will include one (1) local clergy, one (1) returning citizen, one (1) crime survivor, one (1) student between the age of seventeen (17) and twenty-two (22) years-of-age, one (1) person who will be nominated by, and will represent, the Black Chamber of Commerce, and one (1) person who will be nominated by the Criminal Justice Commission and approved by the Board of County Commissioners; and
- 3) Additional amendments clarify the nomination process and update the CJC Ordinance in keeping with uniform policies and procedures for the Palm Beach County Commissioners.

On September 26, 2023 these recommended amendments were presented to the CJC and supported unanimously. The recommended amendments were also presented to the Palm Beach County Economic Council and there was no opposition. Currently, the CJC is the largest advisory board to the Board of County Commission (BCC) and among the longest standing boards. **Countywide** (HH)

In 1988, the BCC created the CJC by ordinance to develop innovative processes for addressing criminal justice issues. County government has a large stake in preventing crime, ensuring public safety, and controlling criminal justice system costs. The BCC reasoned that the most effective way to address these issues was through a collaborative criminal justice system. The CJC's role is to research current and emerging issues and advise the BCC of the most effective methods of addressing these issues. The CJC is organized into two parts: 1) CJC members; and 2) CJC staff. The CJC was established by Ordinance on August 16, 1988 to study all aspects of the criminal justice and crime prevention systems within the federal, state, county, municipal, and private agencies in Palm Beach County. Currently, the CJC is composed of 32 members, 21 from the public sector and 11 members from the private sector. The CJC was originally funded by the Economic Council and appointed all private sector members. The CJC operations and staffing are now fully funded through the BCC. The CJC makes recommendations to the BCC on policies and programs; provides overall coordination to law enforcement and crime prevention efforts; ensures through data research the county operates an efficient, cost effective, and timely criminal justice system; and its work effects the reduction of crime on a permanent basis in Palm Beach County. These efforts have been accomplished by establishing task forces and subcommittees, adopting bylaws, research partnerships, and hiring personnel to pursue the mission and objectives of the CJC. The CJC department staff is managed under the direction of County Administration. The Executive Director is considered a County employee and Department Head. The Executive Director has the authority to hire additional administrative, professional, and clerical County employees to support the CJC subject to BCC approval.

ORDINANCE OF THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS **OF PALM BEACH** COUNTY, FLORIDA, AMENDING CHAPTER 2, ARTICLE DIVISION 5 OF THE PALM BEACH COUNTY CODE (ORDINANCE 88-16, AS AMENDED BY ORDINANCES 89-3, 90-38, 92-14, 92-25, 93-1, 93-35 95-6, 2014-003, AND 2016-017) PERTAINING TO THE PALM BEACH COUNTY CRIMINAL **JUSTICE** COMMISSION, AMENDING SECTION 2-216 (CREATED), AMENDING SECTION 2-217 (OBJECTIVES), **AMENDING SECTION** 2-218 (AUTHORITY), **AMENDING SECTION** 2-219 (OPERATION), AMENDING SECTION 2-220 (STAFF COOPERATION AND SUPPORT), AND AMENDING SECTION 2-221 (ADMINISTRATION); PROVIDING FOR REPEAL OF LAWS IN CONFLICT; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; PROVIDING FOR INCLUSION IN THE CODE OF LAWS AND ORDINANCES; PROVIDING FOR CAPTIONS; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

- WHEREAS, the coordination of all aspects of the law enforcement and crime prevention efforts in Palm Beach County, Florida is important to Palm Beach County; and
- WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Palm Beach County, Florida is empowered and has the duty to take such action as is necessary for the coordination of an efficient, cost effective and timely criminal justice system, and to effect the reduction of crime in Palm Beach County, Florida; and
- WHEREAS, it is necessary to amend Chapter 2, Article V, Division 5 of the Palm Beach
 County Code of Ordinances.
- NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY

COMMISSIONERS OF PALM BEACH COUNTY, FLORIDA, that:

- 35 <u>SECTION 1. ORDINANCE AMENDMENT</u>
- 36 Sections 2-216, 2-217, 2-218, 2-219, and 2-220 of Chapter 2, Article V, Division 5 of the Palm
- 37 Beach County Code are amended to read as follows:

38 39 Sec. 2-216. - Created.

- 41 There is hereby established an advisory commission to be known as the "Palm Beach County
- 42 Criminal Justice Commission," herein referred to as the "Criminal Justice Commission."
- I. Membership. The Criminal Justice Commission shall be comprised of eighteen (18) public sector members and seventeen (17) private sector members for a total commission

1	of thirty-five (35) members in accordance with the policies and procedures established
2	by the Board of County Commissioners for advisory commissions as follows:
3 4	A. Public Sector Membership.
5	1. Mayor or Commission member of the Palm Beach County Board of County
6	Commissioners.
7	2. Palm Beach County Sheriff.
8	3. State Attorney, 15th Judicial Circuit.
9	4. Public Defender, 15th Judicial Circuit.

18	13. Chief, West Palm Beach Police Department.

26	B. Private Sector Membership.
27 28	(2) (1) Ten (10) persons will be nominated by the Palm Beach County Economic
29	Council, of which consideration should be given to one (1) representative from
30	CareerSource and one (1) representative from the Health Care District of Palm Beach
31	County. Nominees do not have to be members of the Economic Council, and said
32	nominations must be submitted to the Board of County Commissioners of Palm Beach
33	County, Florida for approval. One (1) person will be nominated to represent the Black

- 1 Chamber of Commerce and one (1) person will be nominated to represent the Hispanic 2 Chamber of Commerce. Each chamber will nominate its representative.
- 3 (3) Five (5) at-large members of the local community, including: _one (1) local clergy;
 4 one (1) returning citizen; one (1) crime survivor; one (1) student between seventeen (17)
 5 and twenty-two (22) years of age; and one (1) member of the community at large shall
 6 be nominated by the Criminal Justice Commission and approved by the Board of County
 7 Commissioners.

- (4) Member Nominations. The nomination process shall begin ninety (90) days prior to the expiration of a member's term, or immediately in the event of an unplanned vacancy. The Economic Council, Black Chamber of Commerce, and Hispanic Chamber of Commerce shall be notified and requested to provide nominations for appointment. An approved board appointment form, with attached resume, must be completed for all nominees prior to transmittal to the BCC. These members shall be representative of all segments of Palm Beach County, Florida.
- (5) Attendance. Private Sector Members shall be automatically removed for lack of attendance. Lack of attendance is defined as failure to attend three (3) consecutive meetings or a failure to attend more than one-half of the meetings scheduled during a calendar year. Participation for less than three-fourths of a meeting shall be the same as a failure to attend a meeting. Members removed pursuant to this paragraph shall not continue to serve on the Criminal Justice Commission and such removal shall create a vacancy.
- II. Maximum Number of Boards. The maximum number of Boards that an individual member appointed by the Board of County Commissioners may serve on at one (1) time shall be three (3), except that no individual may serve on more than one (1) board, if doing so would violate Article II, Section 5(a) of the Florida Constitution, which prohibits dual office holding.
- III. Terms of Office. Private Sector members shall be appointed for a three-year term, with said term commencing on January 1 for the first year of appointment and expiring on December 31 of the third year. Beginning on or after March 1, 2013, no private sector member shall be appointed or reappointed to the Criminal Justice Commission for more than three (3) consecutive three-year terms. Existing members' terms shall end on December 31st of the year in which their term expires.

- 1 IV. (Vacancies. Vacancies occurring during a term shall be filled for the unexpired term, and
- 2 shall not count toward the member's term limits.
- 3 V. (Residency. All members of the Criminal Justice Commission must be residents of Palm
- 4 Beach County at the time of appointment or nomination and while serving on the Criminal
- 5 Justice Commission. Exemptions to this requirement are allowed when circumstances
- 6 warrant outside technical/professional representation, or if statute or other rule specifies.
- Appointed members of the Criminal Justice Commission shall serve at the pleasure of the
- 8 appointing body.
- 9 VI. (Qualification as a Candidate. Criminal Justice Commission members shall not be prohibited
- from qualifying as a candidate for elected office.
- 11 VII. (Sunshine Law and State Code of Ethics. Criminal Justice Commission members shall
- comply with the Sunshine Law and State Code of Ethics. However, that portion of a meeting
- of a duly constituted Criminal Justice Commission at which members of the Commission
- discuss active criminal intelligence information or active criminal investigative information
- that is currently being considered by, or which may foreseeably come before, the Commission
- is exempt from F.S. § 286.011, as amended or replaced and § 24(b), Art. I of the Florida State
- 17 Constitution, as amended or replaced, provided that at any public meeting of the Criminal
- Justice Commission at which such matter is being considered, the Commission members
- publicly disclose the fact that the matter has been discussed. Reasonable public notice of all
- 20 Criminal Justice Commission meetings shall be provided. All meetings of the Criminal
- Justice Commission shall be open to the public at all times and minutes shall be taken at each
- 22 meeting.
- 23 VIII. (Palm Beach County Code of Ethics. Criminal Justice Commission members appointed under
- subsection (b)(1) and (2) of this section are to comply with the applicable provisions of the
- Palm Beach County Code of Ethics as codified in Sections 2-441 through 2-448 of the Palm
- 26 Beach County Code.
- 27 IX. (Annual Narrative Report. The Criminal Justice Commission shall submit an annual narrative
- report to the Board of County Commissioners.
- 29 Sec. 2-217. Objectives.

- 31 The Criminal Justice Commission is established to study all aspects of the criminal justice and
- 32 crime prevention systems within the federal, state, county, municipal and private agencies within
- 33 the County. This purpose shall include the study of the health and human services and educational

- 1 systems, among others, as they pertain to criminal justice or crime prevention. The Criminal
- 2 Justice Commission shall make recommendations to the Board of County Commissioners on
- 3 policies and programs designed to accomplish the following objectives:
- a. To Ensure the coordination of law enforcement and crime prevention efforts in the

- b. To Ensure an efficient, just, and cost effective criminal justice system in the County;

- 8 c. Effect the reduction of crime in the County on a permanent basis.

- 12 The Criminal Justice Commission shall have the following authority and powers:

- 17 (c) To adopt from time to time rules and bylaws providing for the governance of the

 19 vote of the members of the Criminal Justice Commission;

- (e) To review and comment on all grant requests for programs and systems within the scope of the Criminal Justice Commission;

Members of the Criminal 11 Justice Commission shall serve without compensation, but may be eligible for travel 12 reimbursement for only those expenses which are incurred for travel outside Palm Beach 13 County which is necessary to fulfill Criminal Justice Commission member 14 responsibilities provided sufficient funds have been budgeted and are available as set forth in Countywide Policy and Procedures Memoranda (PPM) CW-O-038. Any 15 16 approved travel reimbursement shall be subject to those actual expenses at the rate or 17 rates established by State law and County travel policy. Approval authority for preauthorized Criminal Justice Commission member travel is designated to the County 18 19 Administrator and Deputy County Administrator and shall be in accordance with PPM 20 CW-F-009. 21 (b) The Criminal Justice Commission shall comply with the quorum requirements of Palm Beach County Ordinance No. 2021-009, as amended or replaced. The chairperson may 22 call a meeting or a meeting may be called upon the written request of three members 23 24 made to the executive director. 25 (c) The Criminal Justice Commission shall operate with such funding and staffing as the 26 Board of County Commissioners shall approve from time to time. 27 28 Sec. 2-220. - Staff cooperation and support. 29 30 The staff of the Board of County Commissioners, including but not limited to the County 31 Administrator, the County Attorney, the Public Safety Department and all other departments of 32 the County, are hereby charged with the responsibility to furnish to the Criminal Justice 33 Commission such records, documents, reports and other data on criminal justice matters which,

in the opinion of the Criminal Justice Commission, are reasonably necessary in order that the

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2 needed. 3 Sec. 2-221. - Administration. 4 5 The Criminal Justice Commission shall perform its duties through collaboration between 6 the County, municipality, and state criminal justice agencies, along with other intersecting 7 system agencies, such as education, health, behavioral health, human services agencies and 8 related community-based and non-profit organizations. The Board of County 9 Commissioners shall employ an executive director who shall be responsible for executing 10 the CJC's authority and work activities to achieve the mission and objectives of the 11 Criminal Justice Commission. The executive director shall be responsible for resource 12 allocation, operations, budgeting, and personnel. The executive director shall hire such 13 other administrative, professional and clerical assistance as necessary to carry out its duties 14 authorized by this article, and as provided for in the Criminal Justice Commission's budget, 15 reviewed and approved by the Board of County Commissioners. The County 16 Administrator shall have oversight of the executive director who will be selected by the 17 Criminal Justice Commission and County Administrator and approved by the Board of 18 County Commissioners. The goals and performance evaluations of the executive director shall be accomplished jointly by the County Administrator and the Criminal Justice 19 20 Commission. The Public Safety Department may provide financial oversight in managing 21 agreements, contracts, revenues and expenditures for the Criminal Justice Commission, as needed. SECTION 2. REPEAL OF LAWS IN CONFLICT: 22 All local laws and ordinances in conflict with any provisions of this Ordinance are hereby 23 24 repealed to the extent of such conflict. 25 **SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY:** 26 If any section, paragraph, sentence, clause, phrase, or word of this Ordinance is for any reason held by a Court of competent jurisdiction to be unconstitutional, inoperative, or void, such 27 28 holding shall not affect the remainder of this Ordinance. 29 **SECTION 4. INCLUSION IN THE CODE OF LAWS AND ORDINANCES:** 30 The provisions of this Ordinance shall become and be made a part of the Palm Beach 31 County Code. The sections of this Ordinance may be renumbered or relettered to accomplish 32 such, and the word ordinance may be changed to section, article, or other appropriate word. 33 **SECTION 5. CAPTIONS:** 34 The captions, section headings, and section designations used in this Ordinance are for 35 convenience only and shall have no effect on the interpretation of the provisions of this 36 Ordinance. 37 SECTION 6.
