I. EXECUTIVE BRIEF

Motion and Title: Staff recommends motion to approve:

A) a First Amendment to Community Based Agency Contract with the American Association of Caregiving Youth, Inc. (AACY) (R2024-1249), for the period October 1, 2024 through September 30, 2025, to serve an additional 12 youth (total 550) and provide expanded programming and activities during the summer of 2025, and by increasing the \$210,000 Contract by \$28,661 to a new total contract amount not to exceed \$238,661 (\$98,661 for FY2025 and \$70,000 each for FY2026 and FY2027); and

B) a Budget Transfer of \$28,661 in the General Fund from the Evidence-Based Programming Unit (Unit 1451) to fund the additional cost associated with summer programming in year one (1) of the Contract.

Summary: In September 2024, the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) approved a Community Based Agency Contract with the American Association of Caregiving Youth (AACY) to provide services for the Caregiving Youth Project (CYP). AACY has identified additional caregiving youth and activities for the summer months of FY2025. AACY will increase the number of youth served in FY2025 only, from 538 to 550 and provide additional targeted educational and recreational activities for middle and high school caregiving students, including virtual and in-person groups supporting the transition from middle to high school, Florida Atlantic University (FAU) summer day camp, health & nutrition education, cooking classes, home safety and fall prevention, and stress and anxiety management. CYP programming and activities provide social and emotional support and opportunities for caregiving youth to socialize with their peers. AACY will continue to seek additional funding in future years to meet the growing demand. In FY2024, AACY exceeded its projected number of youth served by 487 youth, serving a total of 687 compared to the projected 200, and met 100% of its outcome goals. After completion of each contract year, a report will be developed detailing AACY's progress in meeting performance measurements. Countywide (HH)

Background and Justification: On September 17, 2024, the BCC approved 20 Community Based Agency contracts from a Notice of Funding Opportunity the Youth Services Department issued on February 26, 2024. AACY's contract in the Educational Supports Action Area was included. The contract's services provide support to caregiving youth in middle and high school through AACY's professional services in school, out-of-school, and at home. The program promotes social and system change by integrating healthcare (body), education (mind), and community (spirit) to create a solid foundation of support services for this silent, hidden, and deserving youth population.

FIRST AMENDMENT TO COMMUNITY BASED AGENCY CONTRACT

This First Amendment is made as of July 8, w25, by and between Palm Beach County, a Political Subdivision of the State of Florida, by and through its Board of Commissioners, hereinafter referred to as the COUNTY, and American Association of Caregiving Youth, Inc., a not-for-profit corporation authorized to do business in the State of Florida, hereinafter referred to as the AGENCY, whose Federal I.D. is 65-0866677.

WITNESSETH:

WHEREAS, the parties entered into a Community Based Agency Contract (Contract) dated September 17, 2024, (R2024-1249) in the amount of \$210,000, to fund the Caregiving Youth Project, from October 1, 2024, through September 30, 2027; and

WHEREAS, the parties desire to increase the Contract by \$28,661 for fiscal year 2025, for a new total not to exceed amount of \$238,661.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the mutual promises contained herein, the COUNTY and the AGENCY agree as follows:

- 1. The foregoing recitals are true and correct and incorporated herein by reference.
- 2. **ARTICLE 3 PAYMENTS TO THE AGENCY**, Paragraph A is hereby replaced with the following:
 - A. The COUNTY shall pay to the AGENCY for services rendered under this Contract not to exceed a total amount of TWO HUNDRED THIRTY-EIGHT THOUSAND SIX HUNDRED SIXTY-ONE DOLLARS (\$238,661) over a three (3) year period of which NINETY-EIGHT THOUSAND SIX HUNDRED SIXTY-ONE DOLLARS (\$98,661) is budgeted in FY2025 with an anticipated annual allocation of SEVENTY THOUSAND DOLLARS (\$70,000) in each subsequent fiscal year for the term of this Contract. The AGENCY will bill the COUNTY on a monthly basis, or as otherwise provided, at the amounts set forth in the attached Exhibit B-1 (Unit Cost of Service Rate and Definition) for services rendered toward the completion of the attached Scope of Work. Where incremental billings for partially completed items are permitted, the total billings shall not exceed the estimated percentage of completion as of the billing date.
- 3. **Exhibit A** is hereby replaced in its entirety with **Exhibit A-1**, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
- 4. **Exhibit B** is hereby replaced in its entirety with **Exhibit B-1**, attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference.
- 5. All other provisions of the Contract not modified in this First Amendment remain in full force and effect.

Overview:

The American Association of Caregiving Youth program will provide middle and high school age youth ongoing extracurricular support in school, out of school, and at home. As a result, they are more likely to remain in school, progress to the next grade level, improve grades, develop social skills, and build resiliency to overcome obstacles. Caregiving youth sacrifice their education, health, well-being, and childhood to provide care for family members who are ill, injured, elderly, or disabled. In partnership with schools, the CYP model is already successful in 10 Palm Beach County middle schools, as demonstrated by reducing the external barriers to learning incurred by children, through no fault of their own, and as a result of the health conditions of a family member(s).

Evidence-based model or promising practice:

Promising Practice - Caregiving Youth Project Model

Observed Need/Risk Factor(s) that will be addressed:

According to the What Works Survey, more than 10,000 middle and high school students in Palm Beach County have a dual caregiving role. They assist in many levels of care for loved ones; however, with limited resources, the CYP focuses on those in the most intensive situations, who provide at least 20 hours a week of assistance. They are otherwise a hidden, vulnerable, and at-risk population. These forgotten youth often sacrifice their education, health, well-being, and childhood to perform adult-sized responsibilities of providing care for chronically ill, injured, elderly, or disabled family members who are of any age.

Services:

The AGENCY will provide the following services:

- Community Education To support caregiving students, CYP educates teachers (meetings), other students (Lunch and Learn sessions), the legislative path (meetings), and the general population (seminars, conferences, media, grant writing, etc.). Additionally, CYP provides copies of "I am a teen caregiver. Now what?" including publications and the Caregiving Youth Resource Guide to school staff and the community to help them better understand.
- Tutoring For students who need extra academic help, CYP offers tutoring through a certified teacher and tutors.
- Skills Building Sessions A six-week foundation course in 6th grade followed by a grade appropriate advancing curricula three times/year for 7th and 8th graders and monthly in high school. The course is administered at the schools by CYP Family Specialists. CYP uses a copyrighted AACY-developed curriculum.
- Lunch and Learn Sessions Twice/month in middle school and once/a month in high school for each lunch period to educate the staff and students about one of the top ten diagnoses. This is a time when students learn about top diagnoses, are able to ask questions, may self-refer and begin the eligibility process.
- Camp Treasure Is a time for students to spend the day/night away from their caregiving duties and be with others who are also caregivers. They get a chance to make friends, communicate with those going through the same things, relax knowing that their care receiver is being taken care of, and more-overnight camp for middle schoolers and summer day camp for both middle and high schoolers.
- Fun and Educational Events In person and virtual allow the students time to learn a skill, try a new activity, engage with others who are also caregivers, and time to enjoy and be teenager for a day. That may sound like a small thing, but for Caregiving Youth, it rejuvenates them and makes them feel less alone.
- Family Events outings to provide time for the entire family to be with others who are also struggling with being caregivers, including parents who can talk about the difficulties of knowing their children are carrying a heavy burden. The toll it takes on a parent is emotionally draining. Family Specialists may provide one-on-one time with participant and family during the event.
- Mentorship MACY (Mentor A Caregiving Youth) gives the youth one-on-one attention from someone who is there because they care and want to provide them with a fun activity, like a movie or lunch at a restaurant. Many of the students create a special bond with their mentors, allowing them to speak about what is going on in their lives.
- Family Assessments Family Specialists and Care Manager will assess and follow up with their students and on a needs basis provide linkages to resources to support the family/student/situation.
- Family Help Special Projects many collaborating partners assist and the American Association of Caregiving Youth, Inc. will work to secure special funding for non-budgeted needs. Examples include ramps for wheelchairs, mold removal, medical equipment, laptops, appliance replacement, utility assistance, and more.
- Respite Care/Cleaning temporary relief from responsibilities of caregiving or cleaning to be a teenager, time to catch up on fun with friends, catch up on school work/sleep and more.
- Individual Support and/or Caregiving Coaching providing one-to-one sessions to help with caregiving circumstances and feelings.
- FAU Summer Day Camp Is time for middle and high school Caregiving Youth to

experience a day of activities which include but are not limited to, a high ropes obstacle course challenge, swimming, workshop, educational presentation to assist and empower students with caregiving responsibilities, socializing and peer bonding, lunch, snacks and hydration, a day of break from caregiving responsibilities. (FY25 July – September).

- Middle and High School Activity Groups Middle and high school students throughout the county will have the opportunity to engage in recreational, educational and emotional supportive activities with caregiving peers. (FY25 July September).
- Virtual/In-Person Activity- Caregiving Youth will participate in a virtual or in-person activity to gain new experiences pertinent to their caregiving role and needs such as: health & nutrition education, cooking classes, home safety & fall prevention, over- the -counter medication management, stress/anxiety management, back to school supplies drive and distribution, Preparation from middle to high school and other recreational peer bonding respite opportunities, and art workshops etc. (FY25 July September).

Outcomes:

The following outcomes will be tracked:

- 416 of 550 (75%) Youth receive extracurricular support, and advance to the next grade level or achieve on-time graduation as evidenced by academic records for FY25.
- 416 of 550 (75%) Youth build resiliency to overcome obstacles related to educational goals, life skills, and social skills as evidenced by resiliency assessment for FY25.
- 404 of 538 (75%) Youth receive extracurricular support, and advance to the next grade level or achieve on-time graduation as evidenced by academic records for FY26 & FY27.
- 404 of 538 (75%) Youth build resiliency to overcome obstacles related to educational goals, life skills, and social skills as evidenced by resiliency assessment for FY26 & FY27.

Services:

- Community Education To support caregiving students, CYP educates teachers (meetings), other students (Lunch and Learn sessions), the legislative path (meetings), and the general population (seminars, conferences, media, grant writing, etc.). Additionally, CYP provides copies of "I am a teen caregiver. Now what?" including publications and the Caregiving Youth Resource Guide to school staff and the community to help them better understand.
- Tutoring For students who need extra academic help, CYP offers tutoring through a certified teacher and tutors.
- Skills Building Sessions A six-week foundation course in 6th grade followed by a grade appropriate
 advancing curricula three times/year for 7th and 8th graders and monthly in high school. The course is
 administered at the schools by CYP Family Specialists. CYP uses a copyrighted AACY-developed
 curriculum.
- Lunch and Learn Sessions Twice/month in middle school and once/a month in high school for each lunch period to educate the staff and students about one of the top ten diagnoses. This is a time when students learn about top diagnoses, are able to ask questions, may self-refer and begin the eligibility process.
- Camp Treasure Is a time for students to spend the day/night away from their caregiving duties and be with others who are also caregivers. They get a chance to make friends, communicate with those going through the same things, relax knowing that their care receiver is being taken care of, and more-overnight camp for middle schoolers and summer day camp for both middle and high schoolers.
- Fun and Educational Events In person and virtual allow the students time to learn a skill, try a new activity, engage with others who are also caregivers, and time to enjoy and be teenager for a day. That may sound like a small thing, but for Caregiving Youth, it rejuvenates them and makes them feel less alone.
- Family Events outings to provide time for the entire family to be with others who are also struggling with being caregivers, including parents who can talk about the difficulties of knowing their children are carrying a heavy burden. The toll it takes on a parent is emotionally draining. Family Specialists may provide one-on-one time with participant and family during the event.
- Mentorship MACY (Mentor A Caregiving Youth) gives the youth one-on-one attention from someone who is there because they care and want to provide them with a fun activity, like a movie or lunch at a restaurant. Many of the students create a special bond with their mentors, allowing them to speak about what is going on in their lives.

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- Family Assessments Family Specialists and Care Manager will assess and follow up with their students and on a needs basis provide linkages to resources to support the family/student/situation.
- Family Help Special Projects many collaborating partners assist and the American Association of Caregiving Youth, Inc. will work to secure special funding for non-budgeted needs. Examples include ramps for wheelchairs, mold removal, medical equipment, laptops, appliance replacement, utility assistance, and more.
- Respite Care/Cleaning temporary relief from responsibilities of caregiving or cleaning to be a teenager, time to catch up on fun with friends, catch up on school work/sleep and more.
- Individual Support and/or Caregiving Coaching providing one-to-one sessions to help with caregiving circumstances and feelings.
- FAU Summer Day Camp Is time for middle and high school Caregiving Youth to experience a day of
 activities which include but are not limited to, a high ropes obstacle course challenge, swimming, workshop,
 educational presentation to assist and empower students with caregiving responsibilities, socializing and peer
 bonding, lunch, snacks and hydration, a day of break from caregiving responsibilities. (FY25 July –
 September).
- Middle and High School Activity Groups Middle and high school students throughout the county will have the opportunity to engage in recreational, educational and emotional supportive activities with caregiving peers. (FY25 July September).
- Virtual/In-Person Activity- Caregiving Youth will participate in a virtual or in-person activity to gain new
 experiences pertinent to their caregiving role and needs such as: health & nutrition education, cooking class,
 home safety and fall prevention, over- the- counter medication management, stress/anxiety management, back
 to school supplies drive and distribution, Preparation from middle to high school and other recreational peer
