Proposed Emergency Medical Services Ordinance Revisions





- FL Statute Ch. 401.25 authorizes Counties to adopt ordinances that provide standards for issuing Certificates of Public Convenience and Necessity (COPCN) for providing ALS services as well as ALS and BLS transportation services.
- Palm Beach County Emergency Medical Services (EMS) Ordinance outlines requirements for COPCNs in accordance with State guidelines.
- Palm Beach County EMS Ordinance also provides authority to the county to regulate areas and operation of services provided by COPCN holders.





### **Background - Since 2017**

Date	Action
ober 17, 2017	Current EMS Ordinance was adopted by the BCC.
ember 4, 2018	BCC revised the EMS Ordinance to modify the Special Secondary Service providers required entity experience and added conditions that require after 6 months it will be determined by the Primary Provider that the entity has demonstrated the ability to meet the public safety goals and operating requirements.
ember 21, 2021	BCC adopted a revision to the EMS Ordinance to allow special secondary service applicants that do not have audited financial statements to instead submit reviewed financial statements along with a written acknowledgment from the affected Community Association confirming and acknowledging that the applicant does not have audited financial statements.
uary 2022	County staff begins ordinance reviews.
ember 2023	EMS Ordinance Revision Committee formed.
7, 2024	BCC directed staff to provide an update on EMS Ordinance, specifically on the Secondary COPCN process.
ober 22, 2024	BCC adopted a revision to the EMS Ordinance to establish a process for opening an additional Secondary Provider COPCN application period if there is a public safety need to add additional Secondary Providers and allow for the issuance of additional Secondary Provider COPCNs, prior to the end of the current six (6) year term outlined in the EMS Ordinance.
uary 11, 2025	BCC directed staff to present proposed EMS Ordinance revisions at an upcoming workshop.

## **Emergency Medical Services Ordinance Revision**





#### Section 13-18: Definitions

#### **General Changes**

- Definitions were added/updated to align with Florida State Statutes and to align with current EMS Program best practices within Palm Beach County.
- · Entire document was updated to reflect any changes to the definitions.

#### Significant Changes

- Subscription Service Program
  - Definition of Subscription Service Program was removed from the ordinance.
  - Removing this term does not impact current secondary service provider having agreements with HOA's to provide transports to medical appointments and does not prohibit any secondary providers from responding to emergency medical calls upon the request of a Primary Service Provider.





#### Section 13-20: COPCN and Endorsements Required

#### **General Changes**

- Language was added to clarify that Secondary Service Providers must contact the Primary Service Provider when requested for medical assistance that warrants Transport to an emergency room.
- Each COPCN shall now indicate a start date; valid date is already included.

#### Significant Changes

- Secondary Service Providers located in Palm Beach County may apply for Air Ambulance Service Endorsement; however, they may only provide said services when Palm Beach County Primary Service Provider(s) are not available or determines that additional Air Ambulances are needed.
  - If the request for service is not available through PBC or a Secondary Service Provider COPCN air ambulance holder, a private entity outside the county may be called.





#### Section 13-20: COPCN and Endorsements Required (Continued)

#### Significant Changes

- Allows a Fire Department that does not provide Primary Provider Services to apply for a Special Secondary Service Provider COPCN to serve the community within their jurisdiction. The Fire Department will still need to establish an MOU with the Primary Provider.
- Private entities may continue to apply for a Primary Service Provider COPCN. However, the municipality/jurisdiction must have an agreement with the private entity to provide EMS services.





#### Section 13-21: Exclusions From COPCN and/or Permit Requirements

#### **General Changes**

Added language to include volunteer ambulance exemptions to align with FL Statute Section 401.25

#### Significant Changes

None





#### Section 13-22: Application for a COPCN

#### **General Changes**

- · All application requirements were added to the ordinance.
- Modified requirement for applicant to provide proof of satisfactory completion of all vehicle and staff inspection for the last three (3) years instead of six (6).





#### Section 13-22: Application for a COPCN (continued)

#### **General Changes**

- Requirement to provide the specific type of COPCN with the required Service Endorsements as well as the specific Area(s) or Community they intend to serve.
- Modified Public Notice timeframe for COPCN application to no later 210 days (7 months) and no less than 150 days (5 months) and removed any time frames associated with when applications will be accepted.
- Existing Primary Service Providers in good standing within the County will be able to re-apply using an abbreviated COPCN re-certification.

#### Significant Changes

None





#### Section 13-24: Board Approval Required for COPCN

#### **General Changes**

None

#### Significant Changes

Modified that the Board may grant or modify a COPCN <u>at any time</u> to facilitate Pilot Program Services.
 Current language only allows this outside of the application period.





#### Section 13-25: Rights and Duties

#### **General Changes**

None

#### Significant Changes

• If Primary Service Provider is unable to respond to their area, the contiguous Primary COPCN holder is required to respond, within reason.





#### Section 13-26: Vehicle Permits

#### General Changes

 Revised vehicle inspection procedures to allow staff to conduct inspections randomly and/or on a routine basis, which is consistent with State EMS Office practices.

#### Significant Changes

None.





#### Section 13-28: Provision of patient outcome data.

#### **General Changes**

 Clarifying language was added to explain that outcome patient data is collected to support its use by EMS provider agencies.

#### Section 13-33: Enforcement

#### **General Changes**

TBD

#### Significant Changes

Enforcement – A remedial action plan may be required when average response time requirements
are not met over a minimum time period of 1 month versus 3 months.





### **Recap of Significant Ordinance Revisions**

Subscription Service Program - Remove the definition for Subscription Service Program and/or include grandfather language.

Municipal Fire Departments – Special Secondary Service Provider - Allow municipal fire departments that are not Primary Service Providers to apply for a Special Secondary COPCN to deliver non-transport ALS services until the Primary Provider arrives.

Air Ambulance Secondary Providers - Allow PBC private entities to apply for an Air Ambulance Secondary COPCN to provide interfacility transports.

Pilot Program Services - Allow the BCC to grant or modify a COPCN at any time to facilitate Pilot Program Services.

#### Primary Service Providers -

- a) Require Primary Service Providers to respond to calls within a contiguous Primary Service Provider's area, within reason.
- b) Private entities may <u>continue</u> to apply for a Primary Service Provider COPCN. However, the municipality/jurisdiction must have an agreement with the private entity to provide EMS services.

Air Ambulance Turnout Time - Remove the Air Ambulance turnout/response time requirement due to safety concerns.

Secondary Interfacility Transport Response - Modify response time standards for Secondary Service Providers performing interfacility transports.

Enforcement – A remedial action plan may be required when average response time requirements are not met over a minimum period of 1 month vs. 3 months.





# Items for BCC Consideration that are not part of proposed revisions to current EMS Ordinance

- L. Automatic Vehicle Locator (AVL) Requirement
  - Should we require Secondary Services Providers to have an AVL system in place for COPCN application? (Currently, we ask for the provider to identify whether they have one.)
- 2. Experience Requirement for Secondary Providers
  - Should we implement a requirement for a minimum number of consecutive years of ALS Transport Service
    experience for Secondary and Special Secondary Service Providers? (Currently, experience is only required for
    supervisory staff, but not for companies.)
- 3. Mid-Term Application Process
  - · Should we retain the mid-term application process for Secondary Service Providers?
- 4. Interfacility Transports Do we continue to prohibit governmental entities from providing interfacility transfers? (Currently, governmental entities are prohibited from providing interfacility transfers, unless contacted through 911.)
