Summary: On March 7, 2025, the Community Services Department (CSD) issued a NOFO for FAA funding for Fiscal Year (FY) 2026. Proposals were accepted for the action areas of BHSUD and Economic Stability/Mobility (ES/M).

The BHSUD action areas align with the Board of County Commissioners (BCC) strategic priority of addressing substance use and behavior disorders. These priorities were developed in collaboration with the Behavioral Health, Substance Use and Co-Occurring Disorders (BHSUCOD) Advisory Board and community input during the development of the Behavioral Health and Substance Use Disorder Plan 2024 (2024 Plan). Public comment periods were held in March and May 2024, and BCC approved the 2024 Plan on October 22, 2024.

The ES/M action areas align with the BCC's strategic priority of economic development and are based on data and feedback collected during the Community Conversations meeting held on December 11, 2024, which helped establish funding priorities for the ES/M category. Funding for these allocations is included in the County Administrator's proposed FY 2026 budget and is subject to approval by the BCC in September 2025. Final FAA contracts, including outcomes and performance measures, will be presented to the BCC after contract negotiations are complete. Countywide (HH)

Background and Policy Issues: The CSD issued the NOFO for two (2) of the three (3) FAA competitive service categories: BHSUD and Economic Stability/Self-Sufficiency (ESS). The BHSUD NOFO included three (3) priorities: Support Services, Community Education and Engagement, and Deep-End Treatment.

The ESS NOFO includes three (3) priorities: Economic Stability, SOFI, Self-Sufficiency, and two (2) subcategories: Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities and Seniors.

The BHSUD area, under FAA funding, includes service categories designed to provide necessary services and interventions for young adults (ages 19-24), adults, and families experiencing behavioral health challenges, mental health issues, co-occurring psychiatric and substance use disorders that impair overall functioning and quality of life. The service categories within the BHSUD areas are: Support Services, Community-Based Treatment and Services, and Deep-End Treatment.

The Support Services category includes crisis support, case management/care coordination, recovery support (i.e., peer services, drop-in recovery community centers, and recovery community organizations), housing supportive services, and supportive employment.

The Community-Based Treatment and Services category includes outpatient services to individuals, group and/or family counseling/therapy, non-residential (including adolescents aged 15-18), medical services, Medication-Assisted Treatment (MAT), Medication-Assisted Recovery (MAR), in-home or on-site day treatment (including Partial Hospitalization Programs (PHP), and Intensive Outpatient Programs (IOPs), psychiatric care and medication management, support groups, and other supportive activities.

The Deep-End Treatment category includes crisis stabilization, medical detox, inpatient, residential (levels 1, 2, & 4), and room and board (levels 2 and 3).

The FAA, ES/M, and NOFO included the categories of Economic Stability, SOFI, Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities, and Seniors. Programs and services within these categories are expected to implement strategies and best practices that demonstrate positive change toward the Department's goal of stabilizing clients in crisis and supporting their movement along the self-sufficiency continuum toward upward mobility.

The Economic Stability category is designed to help households, both with and without children, maintain stability in their homes through emergency support. This emergency support is intended to be short-term, focused on immediate financial stabilization rather than long-term programming or case management. Examples of such emergency assistance include providing emergency payments or managing programs for day laborers or migrant workers.

The SOFI category seeks to build or create pathways for economic mobility for families with children ages 0-17 who are living below 50% of the Area Median Income (AMI), with a particular emphasis on families at or below 30% of AMI. This program is designed to eliminate barriers that prevent families from obtaining and maintaining meaningful employment that enables them to afford both their essential needs and wants. The Self-Sufficiency category shares the same overall goal as SOFI, but is specifically designed to support households without children.

The Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities sub-category is designed to maintain or increase the independence of individuals with intellectual or developmental disability. Support may include helping individual achieve one or more of their personal goals through services such as day programming, skills training, employment placement, and other supportive activities.

The Seniors sub-category is designed to provide support to individuals aged 60 and older who are living with dementia, Alzheimer's, or other cognitive-related conditions.

The proposals submitted in the BHSUD, ES/M, and NOFOs were initially reviewed to ensure they met the minimum threshold requirements. Two (2) proposals were deemed ineligible for failing to meet these requirements. The remaining 59 proposals were then reviewed by trained Review Panels. The Support Services proposals under the BHSUD and NOFO were reviewed by Panel 4, Community-Based Treatment Services proposals by Panel 5, and Deep-End Treatment Services proposals by Panel 3.

The ES/M and NOFO proposals for Economic Stability were reviewed by Panel 1, Intellectual and Developmental Disabilities, and Seniors were reviewed by Panel 2, and ES/M and SOFI were reviewed by Panel 3.

20 proposals are being recommended for FAA-BHSUD funding, and 23 are being recommended for FAA-ES/M funding.

FY 2026 FINANCIALLY ASSISTED AGENCIES (FAA) FUNDING HIGHLIGHTS AND RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY

July 8, 2025

OVERVIEW - BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SUBSTANCE USE DISORDERS AND ECONOMIC STABILITY/MOBILITLY NOFOs

- The funding priorities for Financially Assisted Agencies (FAA) Behavioral Health and Substance Use Disorders NOFO program area were Support Services, Community-Based Treatment and Services, and Deep-End Treatment. The Support Services subcategories were: Crisis Support (i.e. Mobile Crisis), Case Management/Coordination, Peer Support, Housing Supportive Services, and Supportive Employment; Community-Based Treatment Services subcategories were Outpatient Services (Counseling/Therapy Services, Non-Residential, Psychiatric care & Medication Management, Support groups, MAT/MAR), and In-home or Onsite Day Treatment (including Partial Hospitalization Programs (PHP), Intensive Outpatient Programs (IOPs)); and Deep-end Treatment that includes Crisis Stabilization, Detox, Inpatient, Residential, Residential-Levels 1, 2, & 4, Room and Board-Levels 2 & 3.
- Marginalized communities were prioritized within the following areas: Tri-city Glades, Riviera Beach, West Palm Beach, Lake Worth Beach, and Delray Beach. Substance use and behavioral health disorders are significant public health issues that impact people across all demographics. Marginalized groups, including racial and ethnic communities, LGBTQIA+ individuals, those living in poverty, and people with disabilities, face disproportionately high rates of substance use and behavioral health disorders. Additionally, marginalized communities have disproportionally lower rates of access to treatment or healthcare services, higher rates of incarceration and recidivism, as well as facing cultural barriers and stigma.
- The funding priorities for Financially Assisted Agencies (FAA) Economic Stability program area were Economic Stability, Intellectual Developmental Disabilities, Securing our Future Initiative (households with children) (SOFI), Self-Sufficiency (households without children) and Seniors.
- The funding priorities for Economic Stability are to ensure households (with and without children) remain stable in their homes with emergency support provided. The emergency support is not intended to be long-term programming or case management but rather provide short-term activities to stabilize the household financially. This could include providing emergency payments or managing a day labor or migrant program.
- The Self Sufficiency Securing Our Future Initiative and Self Sufficiency (SOFI) Category funding priorities are to seek, to build, or create pathways for economic mobility for families with children ages 0-17 who are living below 50% of the Area Median Income (AMI) with a special emphasis on families that are at 30% AMI. The program is designed to remove barriers that families experience in order to gain willful employment that will pay for what they need and want. The Self Sufficiency category maintains the same goal as SOFI; however, the program is designed to support households without children.
- The funding priorities for the subcategory of Intellectual/Developmental Disabilities are to maintain and increase independence of individuals experiencing an intellectual or developmental disability. This could include assisting the individual with achieving one or more of their personal goals through day programming, skills training, employment placement, and other supportive services.
- The funding priorities for the Senior category were Adult Day Care Services and Caregiver Services and are designed to provide support to individuals with Dementia, Alzheimer's, or cognitive-related conditions, ages 60 and above.
- The Outcomes for funded programs are finalized during contract negotiations. Staff utilize outcome
 performance and data reports during monitoring site visits and throughout the year to ensure
 agencies have a clear understanding of the performance expectations of the contracted services.
 Service effectiveness reports are utilized when considering future funding. An outcome
 performance report is posted on the Community Services Department's website annually.

- The Continuous Quality Management program has been included in all projects funded under the BHSUD NOFO priorities. This allows agencies to use 5% of their award for a project that will improve their program outcomes.
- As is currently part of FAA contracts, all Nonprofits First certified agencies receiving funding in FY 2026 will be eligible for reimbursement of certification renewal fees within their contract. They may set aside the necessary amount, as an administrative expense, in the final approved allocation if they are not able to pay for it out of their existing agency budget. Staff continues to work with Nonprofits First to streamline the program monitoring process in order to avoid possible duplication of administrative review conducted through the certification process. In FY 2016, the Non-Profit First Certification became optional for FAA agencies that provide documentation of certification from another funding or oversight body recognized by their industry or if the agency has received two (2) consecutive monitoring reports from FAA with no findings. There are currently three (3) agencies that have been granted an exemption.

NOTICE OF FUNDING OPPORTUNITY (NOFO)

Notice of Funding Opportunities (NOFO) were issued for two (2) of the three (3) FAA competitive service categories: Behavioral Health and Substance Use Disorders (BHSUD) and Economic Stability/Mobility (ES/M). The BHSUD NOFO included three (3) priorities: Recovery Supports, Community Education and Engagement, and Deep-End Treatment. The ESS NOFO included three (3) priorities: Economic Stability, Economic Mobility/Securing Our Future Initiative (SOFI), Self-Sufficiency, and two (2) subcategories: Intellectual Developmental Disabilities and Seniors.

Behavioral Health and Substance Use Disorders NOFO

 Partners represented during the NOFO process included Boys Town of South Florida, COMPASS, Drug Abuse Foundation, Drug Abuse Treatment Center, Housing Partnership, Integrated Health Systems Riviera, Jeff Industries, South County Mental Health Center, and Wayside House.

A notice for the BHSUD NOFO process, guidelines, and criteria was entered into the Palm Beach County Vendor Self Services (VSS) system prior to the proposal being made available to the public. Proposal details and required forms were available to the public on March 7, 2025. All potential proposal applicants had the option to attend a Technical Assistance Conference in person or virtual on March 12, 2025. All proposals were due back to the Community Services Department through the online application website no later than 12:00 p.m. on April 7, 2025.

• In response to the BHSUD NOFO – Seven (7) agencies submitted proposals for Support Services projects, representing ten (10) different programs. Staff is recommending funding for five (5) agencies representing eight (8) different programs. Six (6) agencies submitted proposals for Community-Based Treatment Services projects, representing six (6) different programs. Staff is recommending funding all five (6) agencies representing the six (6) Community-Based Treatment Services programs. Three (3) agencies submitted proposals under the Deep-End Treatment Category, representing six (6) different programs.

Economic Stability/Mobility (ES/M) NOFO

- Partners represented during the NOFO process included Alzheimer's Community Care, Catholic Charities, Career Source, Coalition for Independent Living Options (CILO), El Sol, Family Promise of Southeast Florida, Farmworker Coordinating Council, Florence Fuller Child Development Centers, Gulfstream Goodwill Industries, Habilitation Center for the Handicapped, Housing Partnership, Pathways to Prosperity, The Arc of the Glades, The Arc of Palm Beach County, The Glades Initiative, United Way of Palm Beach County, and Vita Nova Village.
- A notice for the NOFO process, guidelines, and criteria was entered into the Palm Beach County Vendor Self Services (VSS) system before the proposal was made available to the public. Proposal details and required forms were available to the public on March 10, 2025. All potential proposal applicants had the option to attend a Technical Assistance Conference in person or virtual on March 19, 2025. All proposals were due back to the Community Services Department through the online application website no later than 12:00 p.m. on April 10, 2025.
- In response to the ES/M NOFO Twelve (12) agencies submitted proposals for Economic Stability/Mobility projects, representing thirteen (13) different programs. Staff is recommending funding for five (5) agencies representing six (6) different programs. Five (5) agencies submitted

proposals for Intellectual/Developmental Disabilities projects, representing eleven (11) different programs. Staff is recommending funding for five (5) agencies representing ten (10) different Intellectual/Developmental Disabilities programs. Five (5) agencies submitted proposals under the Securing our Future Initiative (SOFI), representing five (5) different programs. Staff is recommending funding for four (4) agencies representing four (4) different Intellectual/Developmental Disabilities programs. One (1) agency submitted two (2) proposals for the Senior programs, and Staff is recommending funding for both programs.

NOFO Process

- A formal review process is established for the submitted proposals. A review panel was created for each of the service categories and tasked with reading and providing comments based on the approved criteria. Each panel was comprised of at least two (2) subject matter experts and at least one (1) Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) member served on BHSUD and ES/M panels. The subject matter experts represented a combination of funding partners, service providers and service experts in the county and had no affiliation with any proposal submitted. All reviewers were thoroughly trained prior to the panels.
- Any members of the public who attended the review panels were given time for public comments
 prior to the review deliberations. Once all public comments were heard, there was no further
 interaction between the review panel members and the audience.
- All proposals were scored on the six (6) proposal sections: Project Narrative, Evaluation Approach,
 Prior Outcomes and Response to Community Data, Data Management, Partnerships, Resources
 and Collaboration and Budget. Once proposals were scored, review panel members ranked all of
 the proposals according to how critical their services were for the system of care and their
 responsiveness to the funding priorities. A Ranking Guide, mirroring the funding priorities, was
 provided to the review panelist as a resource and was included in the NOFO guidance.
- Staff consolidated all panel review comment forms and score sheets. Staff reviewed suitability of funding in compliance with Board direction using a funding logic considering the most competitive, critical, cost effective, quality services that align with established funding priorities.
- Contracts are now a multi-year, three-year cycle. This was completed incrementally over the last three (3) years as service categories went through the competitive procurement process. The Economic Stability/Self Sufficiency contracts will be for three (3) years.

There were several steps in the review process:

- 1. Department staff completed an internal review of the basic eligibility criteria, which included the following:
 - a. Receipt of proposal by deadline;
 - b. Certificate of Corporation from Florida Department of State, Division of Corporations at sunbiz.org, dated within twelve (12) months of the due date of the Proposal/Application. The certificate must state on its face that the Proposer is 'active';
 - c. Proof of 501c3 status;
 - d. Attendance at the mandatory Bidder's Conference or review of the recording
- 2. Department staff presented an overview of their assessments on the proposals' Evaluation Approach and Budget sections to the review panel. The criteria used by Department staff to evaluate the proposals mirrored the criteria in the NOFO Guidance and the Review Panelist Proposal Score Sheet.
- 3. Department staff also reviewed the program and fiscal performance history of the applicants that currently receive FAA funding with the review panelists.

FAA BUDGET INCREASE
